




Abp of Dublin appeals for end to recurrent violence in the city

The Archbishop of Dublin, Diarmuid Martin condemns the level of violence in the capital city in recent weeks and says those who 'traffic in evil' will no longer be able to exploit religious services

In a strongly worded statement at the conclusion of Mass on

Monday in Dublin's Pro-Cathedral, the Archbishop said violence in the city "had taken on an unprecedented level of depravity with shootings taking place unscrupulously near schools and shopping centres, leaving families terrified and children witnessing brutality that will leave scars on their lives for years."

The perpetrators and sponsors of such violence, he said, "merit nothing but rejection and distain. They belong behind bars and their business of death must be undermined and destroyed."

Over the last few weeks there has been a spate of murders in Dublin. Many are linked to drug gangs operating in the city. The Archbishop appealed to anyone who can provide information about what he called "this sickening underworld to have the courage and the decency to come forward in the interest of all."

Archbishop Martin also appealed to civil and community leaders to show a united and uncompromising response. The Archbishop stressed that, "where it can be ascertained that individuals hold direct responsibility in this traffic in evil they will no longer be allowed to exploit religious services in the Archdiocese of Dublin to enhance their image."

Minister with a passion for Gaelic takes up new role in Malawi

Few countries in the world enjoy a closer friendship. The links between Scotland and Malawi can be traced to the



1840s when legendary explorer and Christian missionary David Livingstone arrived in Africa.

Now a Church of Scotland minister is poised to try and deepen the relationship a bit further by exploring parallels between Scotland's Gaelic culture and Malawi's vernacular.

Rev Dr Kenneth Ross (photo above) officially takes up his new role as the Kirk's new mission partner in Malawi next month and is very keen to develop his knowledge of the language and culture.

The former parish minister of the five Netherlorn Churches near Oban in Argyll is learning Chichewa, a language native to Zambia, Malawi, Mozambique and Zimbabwe.

Relational

Dr Ross, 60, said: "Most people think going from Argyll to Malawi is chalk and cheese - completely different.

"But these are both places that have a very strong heritage of language and culture, which to some extent have become marginalised with the advancement of English.

"In Scotland, we have realised that we will lose a lot if we lose the Gaelic language and culture and it is worth putting in a good effort to revive it.

"Gaelic and Chichewa are both very relational languages and it will be interesting to work on those connections."

Dr Ross, who will be commissioned into service at a church gathering in Oban on Monday, said acapella singing is a strong tradition in Malawi.

"It can be extremely beautiful and haunting in the way the Gaelic psalms are in Scotland," he added.

Scottish Christians decided to embark on missionary work in Malawi in honour of Dr Livingstone, who was born in Blantyre in Lanarkshire in 1813.

The Church of Scotland founded a mission named Blantyre in 1876 and by 1957 there were 67 Scottish missionary families in the country, manning a large network of schools and hospitals.

Today, the Kirk has a partnership with the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian (CCAP) in Malawi.



For Dr Ross, moving to the Zomba region is a homecoming because he lived there with his family from 1988-1998.

He helped to establish the first theology degree at the University of Malawi Chancellor College.

Dr Ross, who was made an OBE in 2013 for services to the community in Malawi and to Scottish-Malawi Relations, will be based at Zomba Theological College.

"My role is in response to requests from partner churches in Africa who want to strengthen theological education," he explained,

"They see it as a key part in the formation of leadership which will take them into the future.

"I will be training people to be ministers and also people who take theology in other directions."

Dr Ross will also support the Nile Theological College in South Sudan, the Giffen Institute of Theology in Kanyama refugee camp, Kenya; and the beginnings of a theological department in the Igreja Evangelica de Cristo em Mocambique.



Annual RUC George Cross Day Service in First Omagh

The Right Reverend Monsignor Christopher O'Bryne, the Most Reverend Dr Richard Clarke, Archbishop of Armagh, The Rev William Davidson, Methodist President, and The Right Reverend Dr Charles McMullen PCI Moderator were

present at the 17th Annual RUC George Cross Day Service in First Omagh Presbyterian Church on Sunday afternoon.

The 302 officers who gave their lives in the line of duty were remembered in the very moving and dignified service.

A challenging sermon was preached by William Davison President MCI.

For Dr Charles McMullen on his last Sunday in office as Moderator there was the sense of turning full circle as he was back in his home town of Omagh.

Sudan's military calls snap elections after brutal crackdown

Sudan's ruling military council calls for snap elections within 9 months, a day after troops carried out a deadly crackdown on a protest camp in the capital, Khartoum.

Streets in the Sudanese capital, Khartoum, were deathly quiet on Tuesday, one day after security forces brutally dispersed demonstrators participating in a months-long sitin.

Protest organizers say at least 35 people died in Monday's crackdown.

After clearing the camp outside the military headquarters, the Transitional Military Council (TMC) broke its accord with opposition groups, calling snap elections.

The Sudanese Professionals Association, the main protest organizers, had called for a longer transition period, with elections in 3 years.

The group accused the military of perpetrating "a massacre" as it broke up the camp on Monday. A spokesman for the TMC said troops were in pursuit of unruly elements who had fled the protest site.

Calls for restraint

Reports emerged of security forces entering a hospital in Khartoum and shooting fleeing protesters.

The United Nations has strongly condemned the crackdown. Stephane Dujarric, a spokesman for the Secretary-General, said Antonio Guterres "condemns the use of force to disperse protesters at the sit-in site, and he is alarmed by reports that security forces have opened fire inside medical facilities."

The Secretary-General urged all parties to "act with the utmost restraint" and to uphold the human rights of all citizens, including "the right of freedom of assembly and of expression."

'Military coup'

The head of the military council, General Abdel-Fattah Burhan, said Tuesday the military would form an interim government to prepare for elections.

Protest organizers quickly denounced the snap poll, saying the council has proved that "they are a military coup."

Unrest has rocked Sudan since December, when rising bread prices and food shortages sparked sustained protests, which resulted in the armed forces removing President Omar al-Bashir in April.

Cut off from the centre of Khartoum, protesters could be seen building barricades in the suburbs, according to the Associated Press.

June 5 - Today in Christian history

June 5, 754: English monk Boniface, missionary to Germany, dies with 50 other Christians in an attack by angry pagans. The missionary, famous for smashing pagan idols, also established a monastery at Fulda that is still the center of Roman Catholicism in Germany.

June 5, 988 (traditional date): Rus's Grand Prince Vladimir orders his people to be baptized into the Orthodox Christian faith. He personally oversaw the baptism of the majority of the population of Kiev, the capital of his realm.

June 5, 1191: England's Richard I (the Lion-hearted) of England sets sail for Muslim-controlled Acre in the Third Crusade. After helping Philip II, king of France, capture the city, Richard took Jaffa and negotiated Christian access to Jerusalem, also Muslim-controlled.

June 5, 1305: Bertrand de Got, who as Pope Clement V (1305-1314) moved the seat of papal power to Avignon, France, is born in Villandraut, France.

June 5, 1414: Bohemian reformer Jan Hus appears before the Council of Constance. Instead of allowing him to state his beliefs, the council only permitted him to answer trumped-up charges of heresy. Hus was condemned and burned the following July.

June 5, 1661: English mathematician and physicist Isaac Newton is admitted as a student to Trinity College, Cambridge. But the "greatest scientific genius the world has ever known" actually spent less of his life studying science than theology, writing 1.3 million words on biblical subjects.
