



Methodist representatives to attend Plenary Meeting in Dublin Castle

On July 4th in Dublin Castle, the Taoiseach, Leo Veradkar, has invited representatives from a wide range of Churches, Faith Communities and Non Confessional Organisations to join in a Plenary Meeting which he will chair.

This Meeting will serve as a platform to discuss a wide range of important issues, which are fundamental to

achieving diversity and effective integration.

This structured dialogue process arose from the Government's commitment to seek wideranging consultation on public policy and from the provision in an Article of the Lisbon Treaty for State dialogue with churches, faith communities



and other non-confessional bodies.

This Article would appear to imply a permanent sustained on-going structured dialogue with the Churches and the bodies mentioned.

When Pope Francis was in Ireland, the Taoiseach spoke of A New Covenant between Church and State - this proposed dialogue represents a platform to consider how this might evolve.

Each of the participants were asked to submit up to three questions to be considered for the dialogue.

The 3 questions chosen for discussion were:

- (a) Effective Structured Dialogue
- (b) Inclusive and Diverse Communities
- (c) Education.

The Methodist Church in Ireland will be represented by Dr, Fergus O'Ferrall, a former Lay Leader of the Methodist Conference and Ms. Liz Parkin, Lay Secretary of the Council on Social Responsibility (Southern Executive)

Irish papers apology and damages to seminarians

Leading Irish newspapers The Irish Times, The Irish Examiner were due to issue formal printed apologies to one of the two young seminarians falsely accused last year in a fake seminarian sex scandal story emanating from the Irish College in Rome. Large damages are also believed to be part of the deal signed days before a hearing was to begin in the High Court.

Last May 2018 when the story (<u>https://</u> <u>www.irishcatholic.com/only-the-irish-catholic-stood-up-for-</u> <u>the-wrongly-accused-rome-seminarians/</u>

) broke, The Irish Catholic was the only newspaper that uncovered the truth of the story, finding that claims that the two seminarians were dismissed from the Irish College in Rome to be false, that claims of a sexual nature were false

and that claims it happened after a conference were untrue as the conference never happened. While some media outlets took down the story soon after it was shown to be false, The Irish Times stood over the story until now.

A source close to one of the men said he was delighted with the outcome and to be able to finally clear his name. However the source also said that it could have easily been sorted out a year ago by the Irish College authorities in Rome or by the Archbishop of Dublin. "All he wanted was a

simple correction of the record, that he left the Irish College in Rome of his own accord and was not kicked out or found to have been involved in some sexual activity with another seminarian. But the rector Msgr Ciaran O'Carroll refused." The source also said that the young former seminarian believes that the Archbishop of Dublin Diarmuid Martin did nothing to help clear the young men's names despite pleading from the young man and others. "Archbishop Martin talks about fostering vocations and looking after seminarians and his priests. This young man gave four years of his life to the seminary and was hung out to dry, the Archbishop did a Pontius Pilate," claimed the source. Both the Archbishop of Dublin and Msgr Ciaran O'Carroll, Rector of The Irish College, refused to comment when contacted by The Irish Catholic last year.

It is believed that lawyers for one of the seminarians has previously criticised media outlets for reporting the allegations without trying to contact the young men involved or seek independent confirmation of the story. Ironically, last year days after the articles appeared, Pope Francis for his World Communications Day message called on journalists to stand up for those with no voice, and in this case, especially when the national media ignore their voice and those with a duty of care for them refuse to come to their aid.

Presbyterian Church mission link with Myanmar

On 10 July 1840 the newly formed Presbyterian Church in Ireland (PCI) met in General Assembly for the first time. The churchnewsireland@gmail.org Page 5

third piece of business sanctioned the sending of two ministers to India as missionaries, it then resolved to establish the Assembly's Board of Directors for Home and Foreign Mission. Nearly 180 years on PCI's commitment to global mission remains undiminished, as Pip Florit, the denomination's Mission Support Officer for Partnerships, spends 10 days with PCI's latest Global Mission Partner, the Presbyterian Church in Myanmar (PCM).

Based in PCM's headquarters in the city of Tahan in the north-west of the country near the Indian border, Pip explained that along with other Presbyterian churches from

New Zealand, Malaysia, Singapore and others from Europe, they will learn about the work of PCM's Mission Department, Women's Department and Theological Education Board. Pip will also see some of this work first hand on visits to Tahan Theological College and Agape Hospital, which is run by the Church.

"Our goal for the trip is to discover how we can best partner with the Presbyterian Church in Myanmar going forwards, looking at what support they may need, what potential future co-operation we could engage in and just as important, what we can learn from each other," she said.

"We have previously given grants to PCM, mostly as scholarships for students in a variety of disciplines from PhDs and Masters degrees in theology to music, so the visit will also be an opportunity to see how these grants have been used and the benefit they've had for the Church."

Due to the political situation in Myanmar from the late 1960s, it wasn't possible to develop a strong relationship with PCM. Initial contact began in the early 1980s and with the political and economic reforms that led to the ending of more than five decades of military dictatorship in 2016, PCM's General Secretary, Rev Ling Zaw, was able to attend the General Assembly in Belfast that year. Today the Presbyterian Church in Myanmar is recognised as one of PCI's Global Mission Partners.

Rev Uel Marrs, Secretary to PCI's Council for Global Mission, explained that previously it had been difficult for the Irish Presbyterian church to relate to the Presbyterian Church in Myanmar on the ground. "As a result we

supported PCM through grants and scholarships, which enabled church leaders to train elsewhere in the region.

"We were able to maintain the relationship at a distance and as political changes led to Myanmar's first civilian government in nearly 50 years, the first official PCI visit to Myanmar in a long time took place in 2017. The Church is a small denomination in a majority non-Christian country and we are committed to building our relationship with them, and with our other Global Mission Partners around the world, supporting them to build God's Kingdom," he said.

The <u>Council for Global Mission</u>, which is responsible for overseas mission, sending personnel and developing global mission partnerships, has partnership links with indigenous churches, united mission agencies and Christian institutions in more than 20 countries around the world. PCM is one of 15 denominations recognised by the General Assembly as a PCI Global Mission Partner, and one of 6 churches in Asia.

Explaining how the relationship with PCM, and others, aims to be mutually beneficial, Uel said, "From the foundation of PCI, proclaiming the gospel in word and deed has been at the heart of who we are and a part of our DNA. While our commitment to sending personnel and developing mission overseas remains undiminished, new opportunities to engage in global mission continue to appear. Pip's visit to Myanmar is the most recent example of this," Uel said.

"In Asia, for example, as the 20th century unfolded, China and India closed their doors to western missionaries. The last PCI mission worker left China in 1950. As a result, the concept of working in partnership with like-minded churches,

united mission agencies and Christian institutions has developed over time.

"When we talk about partnership, it is primarily with a view to mission. Partnership for us is not just about a business relationship, but has a richer meaning. As we build up relationships and friendships it speaks of ever deepening fellowship with our brothers and sisters in Christ.

"It is not just about what we can give, it is about what we can learn. It is a well-known saying, but the hand that is open to give, is the hand that is best placed to receive. Our relationships, therefore, ought to be reciprocal, interdependent and utterly dependent on God. We very much look forward to this partnership bearing fruit." Uel said.

July 01 - Today in Christian history

July 1, 1643: The Westminster Assembly convenes for the first time in the Henry VII Chapel of Westminster Abbey. Five years later it published the Westminster longer and shorter catechisms, which the Anglican church rejected, but the Presbyterians accepted.

July 1, 1824: The Presbyterian church ordains Charles Grandison Finney, the father of modern revivalism.

July 1, 1899: Three traveling businessmen meet in a YMCA building and decide to form an organization to distribute Bibles. The Christian Commercial Men's Association of America, later renamed the Gideons, placed their first Bibles in a hotel nine years later.

July 1, 1896: Abolitionist writer Harriet Beecher Stowe dies. She averaged nearly a book a year, but Uncle Tom's Cabin remains her legacy. Even one of her harshest critics

acknowledged that it was "perhaps the most influential novel ever published . . . a verbal earthquake, an ink-and-paper tidal wave".
