

Diversity and Variety of Gifts celebrated at Dublin Pentecost Confirmation



The newly confirmed people, clergy, vergers and choir of Christ Church Cathedral following the Service of Confirmation on the Feast of Pentecost.

Forty—one young people and adults from nine parishes in Dublin & Glendalough were confirmed in Christ Church Cathedral on the Feast of Pentecost (Sunday June 9).

Archbishop Michael Jackson presided at the service which saw the cathedral filled to capacity as family, friends and parishioners gathered to support the candidates.

The candidates came from the parishes of Celbridge and Straffan with Newcastle–Lyons, Crumlin and Chapelizod, Drumcondra, Santry Glasnevin and Finglas, St Ann with St Mark and St Stephen, St Catherine's Thomas Street, St Catherine and St James with St Audoen, Tallaght and Whitechurch.

Addressing those to be confirmed the Archbishop said that Christianity teaches us that behind the variety of gifts that people have, there is the same Spirit. Drawing on 1 Corinthians 12:4 'Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit' he encouraged them to use their talents.

"While different people have different abilities and capacities, different personalities and instincts, different ways of doing things, different ways of being who they are, a community that is properly Spiritual has a common direction of travel. Its specific talents have a common origin and a common core and a common goal: The Spirit of God. Holy Scripture tells us that talents are to be used and not hidden, enjoyed by us, invested in others not buried for ourselves or lost out of fear. But Holy Scripture is also not shy to tell us that such proper use also brings personal benefits; and this is realistic because we need to do things for ourselves as well as for other people. Doing for others needs to be offset by doing for ourselves," he said.

Archbishop Jackson added that the diversity of all the confirmation candidates was celebrated on Pentecost.

"We celebrate the open access we have to God the Father through Jesus the Son and in the Holy Spirit; and we await the further expression of this on Trinity Sunday. But for today we rejoice in The Spirit:

'When the day of Pentecost had come, the disciples were all together in one place.' (Acts 2.1) – in the togetherness of variety itself. I suggest that confirmation – and your confirmation here and now today – puts you right in the path of such freedom to be children of God; to do everything of which the prophet Joel speaks: prophesy, see visions, dream dreams whoever we are: young and old alike and together. This gift is now in your hands. I encourage you to use it and enjoy it," he concluded.

Evangelism key in Pastoral Plan launched for the Diocese of Waterford & Lismore

At Mass to celebrate Pentecost Sunday in the Cathedral of the Most Holy Trinity, Waterford, Bishop Alphonsus Cullinan launched the Pastoral Plan for the diocese 'Go Make Disciples (2019 – 2024)'.

The Pastoral Plan sets out a programme of development and renewal in the diocese over the next five years. It is an expression of faith in the power of the Holy Spirit who 'makes all things new' and of our hope that under the guidance of the Spirit our parishes will be alive and hearts set on fire.

The Pastoral Plan has emerged from a process of dialogue and consultation, initiated by the Diocesan Pastoral Council, and conducted in a number of venues throughout the diocese during 2018.

Launching the plan Go Make Disciples Bishop Cullinan said, "Peoples' hopes and dreams for our local Church were recorded at the 'listening sessions'. Parishioners are emphatic that change is needed; it will not do to continue as before if we are to address the many challenges that face the Church in her mission today. People identified the absence of youth in our churches, the ageing and dwindling congregations, the serious decline in vocations to priesthood and religious life, and, of course, the enormous challenge posed by the rapid process of secularisation in our society. It is clear that these are issues that need to be urgently addressed in a new pastoral plan. People are proud of their Catholic faith and believe that we have Good News to share, but we must read the signs of the times, listen to what the Spirit of God is saying to us, and then plan how we are going to share that Good News now and in the future."

Bishop Cullinan continued, "Reflecting on the feedback from the parishioners in light of Pope Francis' vision for the Church today, it becomes clear that a radical transformation of ecclesial culture from maintenance to mission is called for in our parishes and diocese. Pope Francis has called for a missionary Church and for *all* members to become missionary disciples. Hence the title of our pastoral plan: *Go Make Disciples*. This title came from the Diocesan Pastoral Council."

Four themes or core strategic directions are identified to realise this vision. These are:

- 1. Becoming an evangelising Church
- 2. Creating communities of faith characterised by hospitality, belonging and acceptance
- 3. Enhancing the quality of our liturgical celebrations and providing opportunities for spiritual growth
- 4. Remodeling leadership and governance structures to serve the mission of evangelising and transforming the world.

Core objectives and actions to implement the strategies are outlined under each theme. Evangelisation is the key to this transformation of culture. The Alpha Programme will be rolled out in parishes to rekindle faith in Jesus as Our Lord and Saviour and thus to rediscover what it means to be a disciple. A Director of Adult Faith Formation will be appointed to support adults in their faith journey. To lead the programme for the evangelisation of youth and to coordinate ministry to youth, a Director of Youth Ministry will also be appointed.

Bishop Alphonsus spoke of a new development in leadership in the diocese, saying, "In order to better manage this evangelical approach we will need greater emphasis on team ministry in new pastoral units across the diocese, where small groups of parishes, their clergy and trained lay people will work in teams.

"Evangelisation should lead people to the faith community. Throughout the pastoral plan, the vision is one of building a Christian community of disciples where all feel welcome and have a sense of belonging and where liturgy connects with the real lives of people."

A disciple of Christ is called to 'go', to reach out to others, and to transform the world in solidarity with others. A number of objectives are outlined in Theme 4 to serve this mission of transformation. A Diocesan Commission for Justice and Peace is to be established which will advocate on behalf of marginalised groups, including the homeless, and to encourage actions to respect the environment and counteract the threat of global warming.

Bishop Cullinan concluded, "I entrust this new Diocesan Pastoral Plan entirely to the care of Our Mother Mary, conscious that we are totally dependent on the Holy Spirit who goes before us, opening our hearts and minds. God wants us to be missionary disciples, to work through us, to love Him above all things and then to bring others closer to Christ through His Church."

Priest attacks 'militant republicans' after Londonderry trouble

A parish priest has hit out at "militant republicans" in Londonderry who he claims are trying to position themselves as "saviours of the community" following trouble in the Creggan area at the weekend.

Creggan parish priest Fr Joe Gormley, speaking after a spate of incidents in the city following a funeral for a teenager whose body was found inside a burning stolen car in the Galliagh area last week, asked: "Do we want vigilante policing or do we want normal, accountable policing?"

There were violent scenes in the Creggan area on Friday following the funeral of 18-year-old Caoimhin Cassidy, whose body was found on June 1 in a stolen car that caught fire after it struck a lamp post in the Galliagh area.

After the funeral, there were several incidents of dangerous driving captured on video and posted to social media.

Angry locals could be seen throwing objects at a car being driven at high speed around a roundabout.

Later that day, there were reports of an altercation at the Bligh's Lane area in Creggan, where "between 40-50 youths" had congregated.

A male teenager was later found by a police patrol "lying on the grass in the area of Hollyhall Road with the junction of Creggan Road" with "puncture type wounds" to his shins.

And around 30 minutes after midnight, it was reported to police that "a number of masked men had smashed windows at the front and rear of a property" in the Culdaff Gardens area.

There have been questions raised about the lack of police presence in the area.

Several sports teams cancelled events in the area on Friday, while delivery drivers for several local businesses refused to go into the Creggan area.

George Magowan, a director at the Creggan based 'healthy living trust', said there are questions for the PSNI.

Speaking on BBC Radio Foyle earlier yesterday, Mr Magowan said: "I didn't see no police response at all. Personally I didn't. I've got a lot of unanswered questions. There's questions that need answered and only they can answer them, so we'll see what happens."

But Fr Joe Gormley said the trouble in Creggan raises wider questions.

He also aimed criticism at "militant republicans" for trying to take advantage of the situation.

"Let's face it and let's be quite blunt about it," he said on BBC Radio Foyle. "The PSNI didn't want to come into the area because they didn't want to exacerbate a difficult situation.

"The PSNI — they're damned if they do, they're damned if they don't. If they were to come into the area, some of those militant republicans would have easily orchestrated a riot. They're manipulating people's minds here to set themselves up as saviours of the people, which they're not. They have their own narrow agenda."

Asked about the lack of police presence in the area, Fr Gormley said: "That's a question I can't answer for the police and I don't want to be a spokesperson for the PSNI. I'm not going to do that. Are we going to have normal policing or are we not? That's the big question. Do we want vigilante policing or do we want normal, accountable

policing. There was no accountability to that the other day. Just as there's been no accountability for the murder of Lyra McKee."

His hobbies include Playstation, photography, reading, Star Trek, and 'mostly coffee!' He says his sporting endeavours are generally limited to the Wii, so Aaron and Melanie go walking for fitness.

"Melanie and I are sad to leave Antrim of course," Aaron said. "We've built up many good friendships and don't intend on losing them. My greatest blessing has been to build up God's people and start from scratch a youth group called Next Steps.

"However, I look forward with excitement and anticipation to the next chapter as the rector of Christ Church, Derriaghy, and St Andrew's, Colin, and to discovering how I am to serve God and the parish."
