Education in Northern Ireland is beyond crisis, C of I bishop

Education in Northern Ireland is "beyond crisis," a Church of Ireland bishop has said.

The Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, the Right Reverend Ken Good, made his comments in a speech on Saturday at the Church's general synod.

"Little is happening to prevent the fabric of our education system from unravelling," he said.

Bishop Good was also critical of a lack of political leadership in Stormont, describing it as the "dead hand".

His speech came only days after more than 500 school principals warned that pupils were suffering due to the ongoing political stalemate.

'Declining morale'

He told the synod that a number of dangers were threatening to "undermine and even destabilise the whole school system".

These included a lack of vision, lack of money and declining morale among both staff and school governors.

He said that schools were facing a number of serious problems including more children with mental health issues

and an increasing number of pupils who needed support for special educational needs.

Bishop Good said that only significant transformation could begin to address those problems.

"The lack of political leadership in Stormont is the dead hand," he said.

"It means there's no-one in charge who can take decisions about this transformation vision.

"The education system in Northern Ireland is in financial crisis too.

"The squeeze is becoming more and more serious and the consequences are becoming more and more hazardous."

Bishop Good said there were still a number of positive things in education, including the number of school governors from the Church of Ireland and the number of schools taking part in shared education.

He also said that the main Protestant churches and Roman Catholic trustees were still working towards creating some jointly-managed church schools.

However, he warned that the problems in education meant that a generation of pupils were being failed.

"The long-term picture is not healthy and we need to see action now to build a better future for our children and young people," he said.

Knock matchmaking service for Catholic couples closes

A matchmaking service for Catholic couples is closing after 50 years following a decline in demand.

The Knock Marriage Introductions in County Mayo claims to have been responsible for 960 marriages.

The service, based at the Knock Shrine, was set up by Fr Michael Keane in 1968.

Current director, Fr Stephen Farragher, said online dating agencies and apps have now made it possible to meet someone "at the touch.

"Back in 1968, Ireland was a different place than it was today," he commented

"Fr Michael Keane saw the extent of loneliness and isolation, particularly as a result of emigration and also due to the fact that people didn't even have phones and landlines."

In its heyday, the service was responsible for 30 marriages a year, said Fr Farragher.

But in recent years, there had been a noticeable decline in demand for the service which made it no longer viable, he added.

"Seven years ago, we had 10 marriages in the course of a particular year. In the last few years, it has varied from three to four marriages a year," he said.

As the money from annual client subscriptions decreased, the service had to be supplemented in recent years by donations from dioceses around Ireland.

Three Irish concerts by leading US college band

One of the best university college bands from the American midwest will play a free concert at Christ Church Cathedral on May 29.

The Bethel University Wind Symphony from Minnesota is made up of more than 45 wind, brass and percussion instrument players, many of whom are music students at the university in St Paul.

They will play a selection of Irish and Scottish airs including Amazing Grace, Loch Lomond and four Scottish dances as well as Cotillon, a suite of dance tunes, especially suited to wind instruments and first performed by the BBC Symphony Orchestra in 1939.

The concert will also feature a selection of American tunes including marching songs The Circus Bee and the classica American The Stars and Stripes Forever and American folk tunes including The Cry of the Wild Goose.

Recent overseas tours included Korea, England, Wales and the Czech Republic, and this year the Wind Symphony



has decided to do a tour of Ireland and Scotland.

"These tours offer a wonderful opportunity to open up the world to students, creating a deep sense of community among the participants and giving our musicians an opportunity to focus deeply on our craft," explains Stephen B Thompson, the orchestra's conductor and professor of music at Bethel University.

Moderator praises new prison officers

The Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, Rt Rev Dr Charles McMullen, has encouraged new prison officers just starting out in their career, to see their new occupation not just as a job, but as a vocation. He was speaking in Belfast on Friday (17 May) at their passing out parade.

Dr McMullen said that 'vocation' was perhaps an 'old fashioned' word today, but it underlined a deep sense of calling. Reflecting on his own journey, he spoke about the peace that he had found once he had accepted the call on his life and had begun training for the ministry.

"I pray you will experience the same in your chosen walk of life. It will also not be without its misunderstandings, setbacks, frustrations and disappointments, but each experience can make us either bitter or better," he said.

"As time goes on, we can lose that sense of youthful vision and idealism we once had as we set out on the journey. There will be times as well when we will wonder if we are

making any lasting impact, or difference, because much of what we do is routine, invisible and intangible. All I can do is urge you never to forget your sense of calling and the difference that you will be able to make on people's lives for good."

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland has ministered in prisons to prisoners and staff in a number of locations and facilities across Ireland for many years. The Church currently has both full and part-time chaplains serving in HMP Maghaberry, Woodlands Juvenile Justice Centre in Bangor, Hydebank Wood College and the Northern Ireland Women's Prison on the outskirts of Belfast and Mountjoy Prison in Dublin. The appointment of a part-time PCI chaplain to join the chaplaincy team at HMP Magilligan is pending.

Highlighting this important work that the Church is engaged in he said, "A chaplain is a listening ear, a pastoral heart and a wise mind – someone who helps re-connect all the broken and dislocated pieces of life...Chaplains are not only available to prisoners, but to all who would want to use their services."

In his address, the Moderator spoke of his visit to Maghaberry last summer, where he met chaplains, prison officers and some prisoners. He said that was deeply impressed by the caring ethos he experienced. "I came away not in any way depressed but encouraged by the genuine attempts being made to help those serving time to move on from their offences and face a future with renewed hope and confidence. The regime I experienced is humanitarian and progressive."

Dr McMullen continued, "That is not in any way to minimise the seriousness of offences and the need for corresponding custodial sentences, because we must never forget the impossibly high cost of crime for victims and the often lifelong shattering consequences."

He also highlighted another important aspect of the Church's work within the criminal justice system - Thompson House. Since 1984, the hostel in north Belfast has provided supported housing to ex-offenders who have been referred by the Probation Board for Northern Ireland as being in need of approved accommodation.

Speaking to the new officers, their families, senior members of the prison service and guests, the Moderator highlighted a section from Matthew's Gospel (25: 34-45). Here, Jesus tells his disciples of the time when he will judge the world and how in small acts of kindness they had honoured him, such as feeding the hungry, looking after the sick and visiting those in prison. "As you support people to change and care for them in custody, there is a very definite pastoral role in your work," Dr McMullen said.

Today in Church History

May 20, 325: Emperor Constantine convenes the first Ecumenical Council in Nicea (now Iznik), Bithynia, to discuss Arianism, a heresy arguing that Christ was subordinate to God the Father. "I entreat you," Constantine said at the opening of the Council of Nicea, "to remove the causes of dissension among you and to establish peace." The council attempted to resolve the bitter conflict by anathematizing Arius (Arianism's founder) and ordering the burning of all his books, but the conflict continued to rage for decades.

May 20, 1277: Pope John XXI dies when his castle ceiling collapses on him. The name was a mistake—there was never a John XX.

May 20, 1506: Christopher Columbus, who saw himself as a missionary, not just an explorer, dies impoverished in Spain at age 55. "I hope in our Lord that it will be the greatest honor to Christianity that, unexpectedly, has ever come about," he concluded in the log of his first voyage to the Americas (see issue 35: Christopher Columbus).

May 20, 1690: John Eliot, English missionary to the Native Americans of New England and publisher of the first Bible printed in America, dies.

May 20, 1960: Six months before John F. Kennedy, a Roman Catholic, is elected president of the United States, the Southern Baptist Convention condemns the election of Catholics to public office. "When a public official is inescapably bound by the dogma and demands of the church," it declared, "he cannot consistently separate himself from these.

May 19, 804: Alcuin of York, an English scholar who became an adviser to Charlemagne and the most prominent figure in the Carolingian Renaissance (the rebirth of classical learning under Charlemagne), dies. He also devised a handwriting system using both small and capital letters for easier reading.

May 19, 1805: Joshua V. Himes, best known for promoting William Miller's Second Advent movement, is born. Miller predicted the Second Coming between 1843 and 1844. When this did not happen, many followers ...

However, during the Troubles many bombs went off around it, causing considerable damage. However under the leadership of the Rector, Canon Edgar Turner supported by the then Bishop of Connor, Arthur Butler, despite threats of closure, it survived and is a very unique and thriving Anglican Church in the heart of our city.
