3). With both junior and senior competitions, participating amateur choirs were drawn from Dublin, Meath, Wicklow and Tipperary.

The competition exists to encourage the performance and enjoyment of hymnody and each choir sang two hymns or religious songs. Both the chief organizer, Nicole Robinson and the judges, the Revd Dr Anne–Marie O'Farrell, Bishop Trevor Williams and Joyce Williams were impressed with the quality of the performances from all the entrants.

The winning youth choir was Ossia Youth Choir who were presented with the William Young Memorial Trophy. Dolce were the overall winners in the senior section and were awarded with the Alfie and Pam Branagan Memorial Cup.

This was their second year in a row to scoop the title. Anam were the winners of the judges' discretionary prize of the Audrey Flood Maharry Memorial Cup.

Church drawings digitized


The project to digitize, catalogue and make available online the Church of Ireland's collections of architectural drawings of churches housed in the RCB Library has reached another significant landmark, with the completion of imaging ten albums of early 19th—century drawings of churches, amounting to some 1,500 drawings. All digital copies of these drawings which cover a total of 591 different church buildings have now been uploaded to the searchable database and are now freely available for viewing and searching.

The six earliest albums contain drawings by the architect of the Board of First Fruits, James Pain (c.1779–1877), and record churches in the dioceses of Cashel and Emly, Cloyne, Cork and Ross, Killaloe and Kilfenora, Limerick and Ardfert, and Waterford and Lismore.

The four later albums contain the drawings by Joseph Welland (1798–1860) who trained in the office of John Bowden, the first architect employed by the Board of First Fruits. When Bowden died in 1822, Welland inherited some of his practice and also became architect for the province of Tuam.

Two of his albums cover the ecclesiastical province of Tuam and part of the province of Armagh and contain drawings of churches in the dioceses of Killala, Achonry, Ardagh, Elphin,

Kilmore, Meath, Tuam, Clonfert and Kilmacduagh.

Collectively the albums provide a key source for understanding the Board of First Fruits church buildings in the period, 1780s to 1820s, many of which were subsequently repaired, rebuilt or extended from the later 1830s to the late 1860s.

The RCB Library is most grateful to architectural historian Dr Michael O'Neill for his painstaking and enthusiastic work for over eight years to make sense of the Church of Ireland's immensely rich architectural collections and ensure they can be appreciated by a worldwide audience.

March 11 & 10 in Christian history

March 11, 843: Eastern churches officially reintroduced and sanctioned icons, after an 89-year controversy that occasionally turned violent.

March 11, 1513: Leo X is elected pope. His eight-year tenure, marked by gross excesses and immorality, would culminate his 1520 excommunication of Martin Luther.

March 11, 1812: Fire engulfs missionary William Carey's print shop in Serampore, India, destroying his massive polyglot dictionary, two grammar books, sets of type for 14 eastern languages, and whole versions of the Bible. Undaunted, Carey said, "The loss is heavy, but as traveling a road the second time is usually done with greater ease and certainty than the first time, so I trust the work will lose nothing of real value . . . We are cast down but not in despair." News of the fire also catapulted Carey to fame, bringing in abundant funds and volunteer labour .

March 11, 1965: White Boston minister James J. Reeb dies after being beaten during a civil rights demonstration in Selma, Alabama.

March 10, 1302: Pope Boniface VIII sentences Italian poet and politician Dante Alighieri, author of the Divine Comedy, to be burned to death for political reasons. He avoided the fate by living in exile, but he never saw his wife again.

March 10, 1528: Balthasar Hubmaier, called by his enemies "head and most important of the Anabaptists," is burned at the stake in Vienna after being deemed a heretic by a Roman Catholic court. In addition to his writings against Lutherans and Zwinglians, he penned one of the earliest arguments for religious toleration. Though other Anabaptist leaders rejected his pleas for a tolerant Christian government and judicious use of the sword, they adopted his arguments for adult baptism, tolerance, and free will.

March 10, 1681: Charles II makes English Quaker William Penn sole proprietor of the colonial American territory known today as the state of Pennsylvania. Penn gave legal rights not only to Native Americans but also to persecuted Christians like the Mennonites.

March 10, 1748: John Newton, the captain of a slave ship, converts to Christianity during a huge storm at sea. He had been reading Thomas a Kempis's The Imitation of Christ, and was struck by a line about the "uncertain continuance of life." He eventually became an Anglican clergyman, the author of the famous hymn "Amazing Grace," and a zealous abolitionist.

March 10, 1880: Commissioner George S. Railton and seven women arrive in New York City to establish the Salvation Army in the United States.

March 10, 1898: George Mueller, English philanthropist and evangelist, dies. He, in his 93 years helped more than 10,000 English orphans.

March 10, 1913: Harriet Tubman, known as "Grandma Moses" for her work rescuing slaves and guiding them to the north on what was dubbed "the Underground Railroad," dies. Her 19 rescues (of about 300 slaves) were successful, she said, because God showed her the way. "'Twant me, 'twas the Lord," said the diminutive woman who herself escaped slavery. "I always told him, 'I trust to you. I don't know where to go or what to do, but I expect you to lead me,' and he always did".
