

Cork city and clergy mark Bishop Colton's 20th anniversary

At the start of the meeting of Cork City Council on Monday, 25th March, the Lord Mayor of Cork, Councillor Mick Finn, extended his warm congratulations to the Church of Ireland Bishop of Cork, the Right Reverend Dr Paul Colton, on the occasion of the 20th anniversary, that day, of his ordination and consecration as Bishop. Bishop Colton was consecrated in Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin on the Feast of the Annunciation, 25th March, 1999 and has served since in Cork, Cloyne and Ross.

Earlier in the day, the Lord Mayor attended the regular Monday Eucharist at noon in St Fin Barre's Cathedral, Cork. To mark the occasion, the Bishop was celebrant.

What Bishop Colton did not expect was to see the clergy of the United Dioceses of Cork, Cloyne and Ross gathered among the usual congregation, together with his colleagues from the Diocesan Office, and a number of close friends. The Director of Music at St Fin Barre's Cathedral, Mr Peter Stobart, was present to play some carefully chosen hymns for the occasion, and an organ voluntary afterwards.

Another surprise, at the end of the Service and before the dismissal, was when the Archdeacon, the Venerable Adrian

Wilkinson, spoke on behalf of the clergy of the Diocese, and then, on their behalf, the Dean of Cork, the Very Reverend Nigel Dunne, presented Bishop Colton with a gift the clergy had commissioned: a pectoral cross. Made in Cork Silver by a silversmith adjacent to St Fin Barre's Cathedral, the pectoral cross was designed by Cathedral parishioner, Ruth Mahony, who was art teacher at Ashton School, Cork when the Bishop was a student there in the 1970s. The cross is one that features in the mosaics of the Cathedral floor, surmounted by a descending dove (representing the Holy Spirit) which is seen in a number of places in the Cathedral, including in the Pentecost window. The same cross and dove feature on the principal ciborium in the Cathedral used in the administration of Holy Communion.

Bishop Colton said, "I am so overwhelmed by all this and so grateful. The pectoral cross is such a thoughtful gift and brings together so richly so many aspects of this special place in Cork, and of what Christian ministry is. Thank you so much to everyone, and to all the countless people who have sent messages and also sent kind greetings on social media, a phenomenon that didn't exist when I was consecrated bishop in 1999. How rapidly times have changed and are changing: very exciting!

"I am especially grateful to the Archdeacon and to the Dean of Cork for springing the surprises - it's not often they catch me out, and to the wonderful clergy of this remarkable Diocese for their beautiful gift."

After the Service a light lunch was served in the ambulatory and even some tourists visiting the Cathedral came to join in the celebrations.

Official opening of Methodist Church's Edgehill House

Plastic snake performance at St Patrick's

You are invited to the cathedral in Dublin on 4 April at 6.45pm for the culminating performance of a community project on plastic waste. As a response to the environmental challenge that presents itself as the 'snake of our time' the Cathedral community commenced an initiative with the support of Dublin City Council to address the sheer volume of single use plastic consumed daily. Where better to begin than with our young people?

Artist and lead facilitator Annie Holland engaged young pupils in three locations in Dublin 8: Francis Street CBS,



YMCA, Aungier Street & CMS Learning Centre to collect the single use plastic they use daily and collectively build a large snake. Throughout the engagement the participants discussed and explored the issues related to the volumes of plastic, and how they can best address and reduce this kind of waste filling our oceans and landfill sites.

Alongside this series of activity sessions, composer Eoghan Desmond created a piece of music to articulate the messages from the young people.

On April 4 the snake will wind its way through the Nave of Saint Patrick's, carried aloft by the creators with pupils from surrounding schools singing the lyrics – metaphorically banishing the snake from our communities and then presenting solutions to the gathered audience.

Theologians compile resource to help ordinands and seminarians learn about gender justice



A new educational resource to help Anglican theological colleges, seminaries and training programmes teach about just relationships between males and females is being developed by the International Anglican Women's Network (IAWN). An international theological working group, drawing members from across the Communion, met in Limuru, Kenya, earlier this month, to work on the study materials, "God's Justice: Just relationships between women and men, girls and boys".

The group had been convened by the IAWN "when it was recognised that the training, formation and equipping of

church leaders and ministers in aspects of gender justice are essential as they prepare to show and tell the Gospel of Jesus Christ in Sacrament and Word and in the lives they live," the IAWN said in a communiqué following the meeting.

The materials will be offered "as a component or module which can 'stand-alone' or be incorporated into existing curricula and training schemes for women and men who are preparing for ministry, lay or ordained, or who are continuing to develop their ministerial education", the communiqué said. "Contributions to the study materials have been made by theologians from different contexts in the Communion. Their reflections invite critique and conversation in the context of engaged and respectful theological communities."

The theological working group finalised a draft of the study materials, which will be presented to the Anglican Consultative Council (ACC-17) when it meets in Hong Kong next month.

Pope Francis signs Apostolic Exhortation to young people during pastoral visit to Loreto

On the Feast of the Annunciation, Pope Francis signed his Apostolic Exhortation for the Synod on Young People, the Faith, and Vocational Discernment. "Christus vivit – Christ lives" is a letter to the world's young people that represents the fruit of the October Synod. The Vatican will release the full text in the near future.


which the Virgin Mary lived when the Angel Gabriel announced that she was to give birth to Jesus.

During his visit to Loreto, Pope Francis spoke about the Exhortation and explained that there are 3 sections to the document, which mirror 3 phases of the Synod process. To explain this further, he outlined this process whilst referencing the story of the Annunciation.

"The first moment, that of *listening*, is manifested by the words of the angel: 'Do not be afraid, Mary, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall name him Jesus.' It is always God who takes the initiative in calling people to follow Him", said the Pope.

He went on to explain that young people need to find moments of quiet and stillness to listen to God's call and that God's voice will not be heard amongst noise and agitation.

Instead, quiet and stillness will help young people discover that "His plan for our personal and social life is not



perceived by remaining on the surface, but by descending to a deeper level, where moral and spiritual forces act. It is there that Mary invites young people to come down and tune in to God's action."

Then comes the phase of discernment, which is "expressed in Mary's words: 'How will this happen?' Mary does not doubt; her question is not a lack of faith; on the contrary, she expresses her own desire to discover God's 'surprises'. In her there is attention to grasping all the demands of God's plan for her life, to knowing it in its facets, to make one's collaboration more responsible and complete."

Pope Francis said this is the proper attitude with which to follow God's call in our lives, since this attitude allows people to discover not only what God's plan is for their lives, but also how God's grace will help them to develop the skills and abilities needed to live out his call for them.

"Decision is the third step that characterizes every Christian vocation, and it is made explicit by Mary's response to the angel: 'Let it be done to me according to your word.' Her 'yes' to God's plan of salvation, implemented by means of the Incarnation, is the handing over to Him of her whole life. It is the 'yes' of full trust and total openness to God's will," said the Pope.

He highlighted the Virgin Mary as the model Christian disciple and suggested that today's young people try to imitate her example as they search for God's plan for their lives.

The Pope pointed out that Mary had lived a multitude of family relationships.

She was a daughter, a fiancée, a bride and a mother, so all young people, no matter what their role in life and calling from God, can find an example and inspiration in her.
