

Students breathe new life into historic city centre church With 'ONE Dublin' Gospel music services



A group of visionary and energetic university students from across Dublin have come together to re–establish regular worship in St Thomas's Church of Ireland Church, which stands at the gateway of O'Connell Street into Dublin's North East Inner City.

Established first in 1758 and then rebuilt and uniquely paid for by the Irish Free State Government after its destruction

in the Civil War of 1922, the historic Anglican church on Cathal Brugha Street lies in an area which the current Government acknowledges has suffered from 'decades of under-investment'.

The Student Gospel Music Services, called 'ONE Dublin', begin on Sunday 21st October at 7.30pm. Music will be led by Discovery Gospel Choir and worship and preaching will be led by members of the Anglican Chaplaincy Team at Third Level (ACT3), a network of Church of Ireland Chaplains

working in Dublin Universities.

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divisions and see our capital city flourish in a new way."

The Revd Rob Jones, Chaplain in Dublin Institute of Technology and chairperson of ACT3, says, "It's been amazing to see the transformative impact that students can make to local communities and the city as a whole. 'ONE Dublin' will reflect and encourage that dynamic with uplifting and energising Gospel Music and Praise."

'ONE Dublin' Services will take place on Sunday 21st October (Harvest), Sunday 18th November (Remembrance) and Sunday 9th December (Advent) from 7.30–9.00pm in St Thomas's Church, Cathal Brugha Street, Dublin 1.

Pope Francis 'didn't do enough on clerical sex abuse during Irish visit'

Most Irish people believe Pope Francis did not do enough to address clerical abuse during his recent visit, researchers have said.

The pontiff made his first papal trip to the Republic in August and his many protests and public pronouncements on the wrongdoing helped define the visit.

But a research study from Queen's University Belfast said only 30% of Irish people believed he did enough, although half of practising Catholics concurred.

QUB researcher Dr Gladys Ganiel said: "Francis' visit to Ireland has revealed a lot about how people in Ireland think about the Catholic Church.

"Even a pope as popular as Francis cannot distract from the widespread dismay about the way that the church has handled clerical sexual abuse.

"At the same time, this survey shows clear evidence that Francis' pontificate has had a positive impact on a significant minority of people's perceptions of the Catholic Church, both since his visit to Ireland and since he became pope in 2013."



A URC minister the Revd Philip Woods has been appointed the Presbyterian World Mission's Associate Director for Strategy, Program and Recruitment.

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She said indifference was the main reason why attendance at some of the papal events, including the farewell Mass at Phoenix Park in Dublin, was lower than expected.

Dr Ganiel designed the survey, which received 840 responses. She is a research fellow from the Senator George J Mitchell Institute for Global Peace, Security and Justice at Queen's.

Key findings included:

31% agreed the visit had been "a healing time for victims and survivors of clerical sex abuse", 36% disagreed and 24% said neither/nor or had no opinion;

23% agreed the visit had been "a healing time for LGBTQI people and their families", 40% disagreed and 37% said neither/nor or had no opinion

66% said their opinion of the Catholic Church has not changed since Francis became pope in 2013, with 22% saying their opinion had become more favourable;

50% agreed that Pope Francis's visit was good for the Catholic Church in Ireland and Ireland as a nation, and 75% of practising Catholics agreed with this statement;

80% did not attend any of the events surrounding the papal visit, 51% because they were simply not interested and 30% said they disagreed with how the Church has handled abuse.

For practising Catholics, 39% said the main reason why they did not attend any of the events was because the travel/walk was too difficult, 22% said they were not interested and 18% said they disagreed with how the church handled abuse.

Dr Ganiel added: "For all the respondents except practising Catholics, indifference seems to have trumped anger about abuse as a reason for not attending – although abuse is still the next most significant factor."

Historic Iona Abbey gears up for final refurbishment push

The Iona Community is gearing up for the final stage of the redevelopment of its historic Iona Abbey base.

Founded by Rev George MacLeod during the Great Depression, the Community rebuilt the medieval abbey and developed a communal life together that has proved highly influential in modern worship, spirituality and social activism.

During 2018, accommodation and facilities on the island of lona have been made more accessible for visitors: bathrooms have been replaced to suit people with disabilities, a lift has been installed and lighting has been improved to create a safer environment in the 1930s accommodation.

The volunteers and staff on the island have now started packing up the building so that phase two of the project

can begin: linking the centre to the island's renewable energy resources, installing a sustainable heating system, replacing electrics and refurbishing the bedrooms, bathrooms and the refectory.

The Community has raised more than £3.3 million for the work on the island including more than 1,300 individual donations, ranging from £2 to an unexpected £882,000 from the Ark of the Covenant Church through the Charity Commission. Over \$1 million was donated from friends and foundations in the USA.

It needs a final £400,000 by the end of 2018 so that the residential and community space can reopen in time for Easter 2020.

The Iona Community's co-leader Rev Kathy Galloway said: 'The generosity of our members, friends and associates has made this progress possible, and we now just need help crossing the line of our fundraising campaign.

'The Iona Community welcomes around 1500 guests to the island each year, and we want to welcome people from all walks of life for generations to come.

'Raising the final £400,000 will mean we can complete and equip the living and community space and minimise the impact our closure has on the island's economy.'


She said that at the moment many rooms were too cold to use past October and before March.

Pope said to be ready to accept Kim Jong Un's invitation - official

Pope Francis is understood to be ready to accept an invitation to visit North Korea, a senior South Korean official has told reporters.

Lee Hae-chan was quoted by the Seoul-based Yonhap news agency as saying he had been led to belief the pontiff wishes to travel the North Korea in early 2019. The chairman of the ruling Democratic Party told colleagues: "I heard that there is talk that Pope Francis wants to visit North Korea next spring".



Last week, the South Korean president's office said leader Moon Jae-in was told by Kim Jong Un that the Catholic leader would be "enthusiastically" welcomed in Pyongyang.

Following a similar invitation for the then-Pope John Paul II to visit North Korea, the Vatican said a papal trip would only be possible if Catholic priests were accepted there.

North Korea has consistently been named in Open Doors' annual World Watch List as the country where persecution against Christians is worst.

It is expected a formal letter of invitation from the North Korean premier will be given to Pope Francis when Mr Jaein meets the pope at the Vatican later this week.

The news comes four months after a much-anticipated visit between Kim Jong Un and US President Donald Trump in Singapore.
