

Church of Ireland supports repeal of Republic's blasphemy law



Stephen Fry was investigated but not prosecuted under the Republic of Ireland's blasphemy legislation

The Church of Ireland has issued a statement supporting the repeal of the Republic of Ireland's blasphemy law.

The legislation was used by the Garda to investigate comedian Stephen Fry last year.

Rt Rev Kenneth Kearon, Bishop of Limerick and Killaloe, The Church and Society Commission of the Church of Ireland, said that the church found the current reference to blasphemy in the Irish constitution "largely obsolete".

A referendum on the issue takes place on October 26.

"We recognise that there is grave concern at the way blasphemy laws have been used to justify violence and oppression against minorities in other parts of the world," he said.

However, the human right of faith communities to contribute to public debate on issues of importance without being subjected to attack or ridicule "must be acknowledged and respected" he said.

The church would have preferred to have seen a proposal to replace the blasphemy section of the constitution "with an article protecting freedom of religion and freedom of speech in accordance with the European Convention on Human Rights" he added.

Part of Article 40.6.1 in the Irish constitution states: "The publication or utterance of blasphemous, seditious, or indecent matter is an offence which shall be punishable in accordance with law."

It rose to prominence last year when a complaint was made over Mr Fry making critical comments about God during an interview on RTE, leading to a criminal investigation. No prosecution was brought.

Gay Byrne asked what Mr Fry would say to God if he died and had to confront him. In his imaginary conversation with God, Fry said he would tell Him: "How dare you create a world in which there is such misery that is not our fault? It's not right.

"It's utterly, utterly evil. Why should I respect a capricious, mean-minded, stupid God who creates a world which is so full of injustice and pain?"


Five years ago 14 churches, including the Catholic Church, Church of Ireland, Presbyterian Church and Methodist Church, endorsed a submission to government on the issue which said "the current reference to blasphemy in the Constitution of Ireland is largely obsolete".

Divine Healing Ministries have two important services at St Anne's Cathedral, Belfast in November and also a united Day of Prayer in Downpatrick involving all denominations.


The first special service is on Monday 12 November 12, 8pm, when the speaker will be world famous evangelist, churchnewsireland@gmail.org Page 3

Youth delegation in Rome for live questions and answers session on the Synod

Eleven youth ministry directors from across Ireland have flown to Rome for a series of meetings with Archbishop Eamon Martin and Bishop Donal McKeown who are attending the Synod on Young People, Faith and Vocational Discernment from 3 to 28 October on behalf of the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference. The youth ministry directors are accompanied by Emma Sisk of the Catholic Communications Office.

The Irish delegates met yesterday, Wednesday, at the Irish College, Rome, where they were updated by the bishops on the progress of the Synod. They discussed the implications of the Synod in the Irish context of evangelisation and the challenge of faith promotion amongst young people.

The Irish delegation also hopes to meet with representatives of the Bishops' Conference of England and Wales to share further experiences and insights from the Synod. The meetings will conclude with a session that explores the feasibility of building a national support network for young ministry and young adult ministry in Ireland.

A live question and answers from the Irish College will be streamed on Facebook between 6pm and 8pm (Irish time) today to discuss the Synod. Follow ADYC (Armagh Diocesan Youth Commission) and the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference on Facebook to submit questions and join the live discussion.

Evangelical C of E bishops offer olive branch to GAFCON

Evangelical bishops in the Church of England have offered a hand of friendship to GAFCON – the international Anglican grouping emerging as a potential future alternative to the Anglican Communion.

In an unexpected overture, 13 bishops have written a letter declaring that it is 'really important' for them 'to stay in good relationship' with their 'orthodox Anglican brothers and sisters' in GAFCON, and say they hope their initiative in reaching out 'can mark the beginning of better communication and liaison between us'.

At the same time, the bishops make it clear they have no intention of



leaving the Church of England at the moment, stating: 'We hope that you will understand our continuing commitment to [it], which we see as privilege, gift and calling, and that you will hear our request to work together closely as partners in the Gospel as we journey into God's future.'

The olive branch to GAFCON comes just days after an earlier letter from evangelical bishops warning the Church of England not to liberalise its sexual ethics. While there is some overlap in signatories, the list of those signing is not identical.

The bishops behind this second letter say they are writing in response to GAFCON's 2018 assembly in Jerusalem, and the 'Letter to the Churches' which was produced there. They express agreement with GAFCON's view of the crisis in Anglicanism: 'The analysis of the current tragic situation in the Anglican Communion which is set out [in GAFCON's letter]... is one which resonates with our experience as Bishops in the Church of England... We cannot disagree

with the GAFCON diagnosis concerning the tear in the fabric of the Communion.'

And referring to GAFCON's call for liberal provinces not to be invited to the next global conference of bishops at Lambeth in 2020, the bishops say 'representations will need to be made' to Justin Welby 'by all orthodox Anglicans, in

order to indicate the strength of feeling on this issue'. They also 'resonate' with GAFCON's wish for its new conservative Anglican provinces in North America and Brazil to be invited.

The bishops say they see it as their 'present calling' to 'remain committed to the Church of England'. But they also admit: 'There may come a time when the Church of England... departs from the biblical and apostolic Faith – and this might occur for any number of reasons.' At the moment, however, they say 'the core doctrine of the Church of England remains unchanged'.

They add: 'There is some popular misrepresentation of the current House of Bishops which alleges that we are heterodox; we recognise the fears, but our personal conversations and experience lead us to the conclusion that [this] perception is far from the normative reality.'

The letter goes on to 'recognise that the GAFCON movement is something that has united Anglican Churches across the world who are looking for a different shape for a global Communion', but adds: 'We regret that no recognition is given in the letter to those who in good conscience believe it is right to stay within their current Anglican structure.'

Archbishop Foley Beach, Primate of ACNA and Chairmandesignate of GAFCON, is currently on a tour of the UK. It is not clear whether he or the letter-writers have been in touch with one another yet to meet face to face.

The letter from the bishops says: 'We would welcome the opportunity to engage more fully in conversations with

GAFCON UK about its polity, how it sees itself in relation to the Church of England, and about its missional strategy and purpose.'

The bishops say they were grateful for the invitation to attend GAFCON 2018. But they state that a problem in doing so was the requirement to sign an extra declaration of faith in addition to that which they had already made for the Church of England.

'Perhaps,' they say, 'there is room for some accommodation on this issue for those of us who would like to attend future GAFCON events'. They also ask for 'liaison between us' as GAFCON's networks are developed in England.

Signatories to both letters this week are the Bishops of Peterborough, Willesden, Durham, Blackburn, Ludlow, Plymouth and Carlisle, and Rt Rev Mark Rylands, formerly Bishop of Shrewsbury and now an assistance bishop in the Diocese of Exeter. Signatories to the first letter but not the second are the Bishops of Birkenhead, Maidstone, Lancaster, and the retired Bishop of Shrewsbury; signatories to the second letter but not the first are the Bishops of Winchester, Lewes, Guildford, Basingstoke, and Southwell & Nottingham.

One reason for some of the difference is that the signatories of this new letter do not include those bishops who attended GAFCON in Jerusalem – it comes specifically from evangelical bishops who did not attend. The full text of the letter is being posted on the website of the Church of England Evangelical Council.

New Christian Aid report questions HSBC's green claims

HSBC has been accused of greenwashing by Christian Aid as the charity publishes a new report highlighting the bank's refusal to rule out coal financing in Vietnam, Bangladesh and Indonesia.

Today HSBC is hosting a <u>Make My Money Green event</u> as part of Green GB Week, and yet in its flagship energy policy it keeps the door open to financing the dirtiest fossil fuel in parts of Asia.

Last month fellow bank Standard Chartered announced a global ban on financing coal, undermining HSBC's claims to be a sustainable leader that is concerned about climate change.

The report dismantles HSBC's claims that more coal power is needed to address the developmental needs of these countries, drawing on independent evidence from a variety of sources and the views of local people. Nguy Thi Khanh, from Vietnam, is founder of the Green Innovation and Development Centre. She said:

"Remarkably HSBC's commitment excluded my own country, along with Indonesia and Bangladesh. My daughter, along with the rest of Vietnam, it seems, doesn't have the right to breathe clean air like the rest of the world.

"'Too poor, too foreign, let them breathe sulphur dioxide and smog', the policy might as well read. 'They're only Vietnamese.'

"Such lazily racist double standards are made all the more galling by the bank's attempt to hide its greed behind a thin veneer of condescending concern for the provision of 'cheap' power in Vietnam.

"The argument that Vietnam needs more coal is nonsense. According to the recently launched Blueprint for Vietnam's Clean Energy Future, if all the health and environmental costs of coal power are factored in, renewables are already cheaper than coal in Vietnam."

The report points out that in light of the recent report by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, warning of the consequences of global warming exceeding 1.5C, financing brand new coal plants in countries like Vietnam is not only reckless and irresponsible but will not address poverty either.

Helen Collinson, Campaign Lead at Christian Aid, said: "For people without access to energy in these countries living far from the grid, renewables offer a much cheaper, less damaging and future-proof form of electricity.

"The cost of renewables has fallen faster than not just the predictions of the International Energy Agency but even those of Greenpeace as well. The clean energy systems of the future are what these countries need, not yet more polluting fossil fuel infrastructure of the past.

"If not investing in coal is good enough for the rest of the world, why isn't it good enough for Vietnam, Bangladesh and Indonesia? A number of charities and policy institutes have provided evidence to HSBC demonstrating that coal is

not needed to tackle energy poverty and yet they refuse to close this loophole."

She added: "If HSBC really cared about 'making their money green' they could start by ruling out new coal financing in every country, like Standard Chartered have done."

World Bank President Jim Kim said in 2016: "If Vietnam goes forward with 40GW of coal, if the entire region implements the coal-based plans right now, I think we are finished...That would spell disaster for us and our planet."

It is exactly this kind of disaster that HSBC is facilitating by keeping the door open to funding new coal projects in this region.
