# Habitat for Humanity helps Shankill Road parish create community space

Habitat for Humanity Northern Ireland is working in partnership with St Michael's Parish Church, off the Shankill Road, on a new community

building project which will serve people across west Belfast.

Habitat volunteers of all backgrounds are helping to refurbish St Michael's parish hall in Craven Street. To date, volunteers have included young people taking part in Habitat's cross-community ChangeMakers Programme which explores social justice and active citizenship with 16-18 year olds.

Carrickfergus Grammar School and St Dominic's Grammar School for Girls are just two of the schools who have worked together onsite. Work is closely supervised by trained professionals and includes cleaning, sanding, painting and basic construction.

Jenny Williams, Chief Executive of Habitat NI, said: "Since our founding in 1994, breaking down barriers between divided communities has been at the heart of our work. Thousands of volunteers have worked on Habitat community-building projects, in Northern Ireland and around the world. In our experience, when volunteers from different backgrounds engage in practical projects, like this one, meaningful relationships are developed based on understanding.

"We are very excited about this partnership with St Michael's Parish. When the leadership of the church committed to invest in improving their hall they focused not only on the building but on what could be achieved through the project. It is about much more than four walls and a roof; it is bringing people together to help build a strong, inclusive community," Mrs Williams continued.

Social action projects, advertised across west Belfast, will be hosted in the newly refurbished halls. These will include activities such as a Christians Against Poverty job club and support with free debt counselling services; budgeting and money management courses, a life-skills course; a 'Dinner Time Drama' group for primary aged children; and a social and sports group for older people.

The Rev Canon James Carson, Minister-in-Charge of St Michael's said: "Our church's vision is to serve the local community. Our hope is that this project will have a positive impact on the health and wellbeing of people of all ages; actively demonstrating God's love by bringing people together to build relationships and trust, and restore hope."

St Michael's parish halls were built around 1980. Over the years they have become dated, and one of the largest rooms, the Moore Room, had become something of a 'dumping ground' according to Heather Carson, Parish Development Officer.

Now it is painted and tidied up, the Moore Room will have something of a re-birth, and will be used for many of the activities outlined above. "Having this space is key to our community outreach," said Heather.

Pupils from a total of nine schools will have taken part in the project at St Michael's by the time it is complete.

## Presbyterians asked to pray for US election

Church leaders in the USA have called on Scots to pray for the country amid growing tensions over the presidential election between Donald Trump and Hillary Clinton.

The Presbyterian Church USA (PCUSA), The Church of Scotland's American partner organisation, has issued a call to the faithful to pray for peace and a "non-violent transition from one president to the next".

The Right Rev Dr Russell Barr, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland who is currently in the USA on official business, said he was "quite taken aback" by the mood in the country and has backed the call.

He added that people in Scotland would "understand something of the anxieties and concerns" of their American neighbours due to the impact of the Scottish Independence referendum in 2014 and the European Union membership referendum in June this year.

A letter signed by key officials within the Presbyterian Mission Agency, which has been sent to partner churches across the world, states: "On November 8, 2016, we will hold a national election for many government offices, including the presidency of the United States.

"Tensions and animosity are increasing here, and people are divided bitterly.

"Families have been torn apart, communities are at odds with each other and in some places, violence is threatened.

"In these remaining days leading up to our election and the transition of power that will occur thereafter, we ask your prayers for our nation and our church.

"We urge you to pray for peace and a non-violent transition from one president to the next, and one Congress to the next."

## Anglicans and Orthodox agree on resolution of key doctrinal difference

The official dialogue between the Anglican Communion and the Oriental Orthodox Churches have reached further agreement on the theological understanding of the Holy Spirit. The Anglican Oriental Orthodox International Commission met last week in Lebanon, Beirut, to consider their consideration of the Holy Spirit, which began last year in Wales.

Last year, the <u>AOOIC communiqué</u> recommended the omission of the Filioque clause – the words "and the son" which western churches added to "...which proceeds from the Father" in the Nicene Creed without international consensus. The Anglican co-chair of the Commission, Bishop Gregory Cameron from St Asaph in Wales, <u>said at the time</u> that it had "long been a source of contention between Western and Eastern Christians."

In their communiqué issued at the end of last week's talks, the members of the AOOIC said that "having completed its work on the Procession of the Holy Spirit at its 2015 meeting, the Commission continued its reflection on the second part of its Agreed Statement on pneumatology, 'The Sending of the Holy Spirit in Time (Economia).'

"This second part considers the action of the Holy Spirit in the life and mission of the Church making it one, holy, catholic and apostolic. The Co-Chairs signed the second part of Agreed Statement that will be sent to our churches for reflection and comment, after which the Commission will produce the full statement, 'The Nature and Work of the Holy Spirit,' in its final form."

# Catholics and Lutherans must 'move beyond controversies of the past', says Pope Francis

Pope Francis urged Catholics and Lutherans to take decisive steps toward unity and "move beyond" the controversies that have divided western Christianity.

However, the Pope nevertheless offered no new openings to the idea of sharing Communion before full unity is achieved.



"We Christians will be credible witnesses of mercy to the extent that forgiveness, renewal and reconciliation are daily experienced in our midst," the Pope said on October 31 during an ecumenical prayer service in the Lutherans' Lund cathedral, which was built as a Catholic cathedral in the 11th century.

With the prayer service, Pope Francis and leaders of the Lutheran World Federation launched a year of activities to mark the 500th anniversary in 2017 of Martin Luther's efforts to reform the Church.

concrete ways to express and strengthen the doctrinal agreements reached by Catholic and Lutheran theologians over the past 50 years. The most appropriate way to mark the anniversary, they said, was with common prayer and renewed commitments to working together to help the poor and promote justice.

The Lutherans agree, but many also saw the joint commemoration as a moment to recognize that the joint agreements on issues of faith over the past 50 years mean it is appropriate now to expand occasions when eucharistic sharing is possible.

The Catholic Church has insisted that regular sharing of the Eucharist will be possible only when divided Christians have attained full unity.

In his homily at the Lund cathedral, the Rev Martin Junge, general secretary of the Lutheran World Federation, expressed his hope for shared Communion sooner.

+++ Fire closed Exeter Cathedral - The Bishop of Exeter has praised the "heroic" efforts of firefighters who have spent the past few days fighting a major fire in a historic building on Exeter's Cathedral Green in the south-west of England. The cathedral was forced to move Sunday's services to the Chapter House as emergency services continued to fight the fire that has reduced the Royal Clarence Hotel – reputed to be England's oldest hotel – to rubble.

The cathedral remained closed on Monday as firefighters continue dto damp down hotspots in the remains of the buildings. Famous visitors over the years include Admiral Nelson, Franz Liszt, Beatrix Potter, Thomas Hardy, Clark Gable and Gary Cooper. It was also a temporary resting place for the body of Queen Victoria's father, Prince Edward, Duke of Kent and Strathearn, on its journey from nearby Sidmouth, where he died, to Windsor where his funeral was held.
