



RTÉ Orchestra for Knock Basilica peace concert

The RTÉ Concert Orchestra is to perform in Our Lady's Basilica, Knock Shrine, as part of a stunning peace concert planned for next May to commemorate the 1916 Rising and World War I.

The concert, on Saturday, May 14th, will be the first such event to take place in the beautiful surrounds of the fully refurbished Basilica and is

being staged by the Mayo International Choral Festival.

Mezzo soprano Anne Marie Gibbons, who has performed in many prestigious operatic venues around the world, acclaimed Hollywood composer Patrick Cassidy, and one of Ireland's leading conductors today, David Brophy, are all coming together on the project, while members of the Ballina Chamber Choir, Cór Mhaigh Eo and Dún Laoghaire Choral Society will form a 120-strong choir.

The concert will feature the international choral sensation – *The Armed Man: A Mass for Peace*, by the Welsh composer, Sir Karl Jenkins.

The powerful and inspiring piece was composed to mark the millennium in 2000 and has since been performed over 1,000 times in more than 20 different countries with over 15 gold and platinum awards.

In addition, the orchestra will perform a special piece composed by Patrick Cassidy for the 1916 commemoration. Mr Cassidy is a hugely successful composer who is originally from Co Mayo but is now based in LA.

He is a recent recipient of the 'Creative Talent Award 2015' at the Richard Harris International Film Festival and has worked on the musical scores of major Hollywood movies, such as *Hannibal*, *Veronica Guerin*, *Kingdom of Heaven* and *Calvary*.

The concert will be produced in association with the The Western Development Commission and Knock Basilica.

Tickets for *A Concert for Peace* at Knock Basilica are now on sale.

Tickets cost €25 and €15 (restricted viewing) and are available from the Knock Shrine information office (opposite the Parish Church); the Book Shop at Knock Shrine; and Downtown Records Castlebar and Westport.

Choir brings Church goers to their feet with amazing rendition of Teenage Kicks

Church wouldn't be the first place you would go to hear punk rock, but on Friday night, the sound emanating from Derry's St Columb's Cathedral was not sombre hymns worshipping the Lord, but the strains of punk classic Teenage Kicks.

Belfast Live - Sang by a lively 30-strong choir and backed by a punk fusion band with Undertone drummer Billy Doherty at the helm, the epic punk anthem brought the Friday night congregation, including the city's Mayor to their feet in a scene not normally associated with Sunday worship.

It was more head banging than head bowing as the spectacular 'Bringing Choral to the Tone' musical event kicked off at the city's Cathedral, which saw Undertone Drummer Billy Doherty and his Rambling Band and famed musical director Ruth McPhillips and her Glórtha an Fheabhail/ Voices of the Foyle choir join forces to create an innovative punk, choral fusion, resulting in raw, rip-roaring, thundering folk versions of Undertone classics as well as other contemporary pop repertoire.

A plaque at the back of the 400-year-old Church of Ireland church reads, 'If Stones Could Speake..'. And if they could, those stones would certainly relay that they – now magically transformed from ancient stone to actual punk rocks - have never before heard such a sound

reverberating around the historic eaves of the ancient church on Derry's Walls.

Presbyterian Moderator congratulates Church of England on Lord's Prayer initiative

Speaking after a Prayer Breakfast at Belfast City Hall with councillors and representatives of various churches yesterday, the Moderator of the Presbyterian Church congratulated the C of E on its Lord's Prayer initiative. Very Rev Dr Ian McNie said, "This morning's Prayer Breakfast highlighted once again the importance of prayer as we prayed for the city, its people and elected representatives at different levels of government. This event was in stark contrast to the banning of the Church of England's advert promoting the Lord's Prayer, in cinemas in the run up to Christmas.

"I would want to congratulate the Church of England on its initiative to promote the Lord's Prayer in this way, a prayer that was given to us

by the Lord Jesus Christ Himself. This prayer is used daily by billions of people throughout our world as a prayer thanking God for who He is, and the seeking of personal guidance and forgiveness for our lives in a fractured and turbulent world.

"Undoubtedly many Christians will be dismayed by this decision, although not surprised. However, it is my prayer that this negative initial response from the advertising company will be turned into a positive appreciation and understanding of the importance of prayer. This decision takes on a more poignant meaning, especially at this time of year as we approach Christmas, when we celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ who encouraged us to pray in this way."

Dr. McNie has written to the Archbishop of Canterbury congratulating him on this initiative and the rationale behind it.

Prisons' Week 2015: Moderator visits Maghaberry

Prisoners Week began in England and Wales in 1975 to provide an annual focus and reason for Christians to work together to make a difference for people who are in Prison. It became Prison Week in 1995. Today, the primary aim of Prisons Week is to pray for and raise awareness of the needs of prisoners and their families, victims of offenders and prison staff.

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland (PCI) has ministered in prisons to prisoners and staff in a number of locations and facilities across Ireland for many years and currently has both full and part-time Chaplains serving in Magilligan, Maghaberry, the Woodlands Juvenile Justice Centre in Bangor, and Hydebank Wood.

Presbyterian Ministers also visit in prisons in the Irish Republic.

During his visit, Dr. McNie met with both prison staff and prisoners and had an opportunity to visit the Braille centre which produces resources for blind people. Dr. McNie had personally taken copies of Braille Bible materials produced in the centre to Malawi on a previous mission visit.

Accompanied by Prison Chaplain Rev. Rodney Cameron and Rev. David Bruce, the Secretary to PCI's Council for Mission in Ireland, Dr. McNie said, "It was a privilege to visit Maghaberry Prison, and to see at first hand the important work being done by a large team of dedicated staff working in often challenging circumstances. The prisoners I met, and the work I witnessed confirmed to me that the grace of God is offered to all, without exception, and that Christ has the power to transform the lives of all who seek Him. Our chaplains work selflessly to bring the love of Christ to prisoners and their families, and to the community of staff and officers. They are to be commended for their important work, which we hope and pray may be secured into the future."

Next year's Prisons Week will be from 9-15 October 2016.

Second Limavady Presbyterian Church celebrates 175 years

The Moderator was welcomed to Limavady on Sunday evening to take part in this very special service in the life of the congregation. Alongside Dr. McNie, also playing a role in the service was the North West Gospel Choir and the congregation's own Girls' Brigade and Boys' Brigade. During the evening a plaque was unveiled, showing all of the past ministers who have served, as well as the present minister Rev. Geoffrey Jones.

Commenting on Second Limavady having reached 175 years in existence, Dr. McNie said, "It is an honour to join with the congregation as they celebrate this considerable milestone. I would like to take the opportunity to encourage the congregation as they continue to worship

God, share His love, and reach out into the community with the Gospel of Jesus Christ." "To see the young people of the Girls' Brigade and Boys' Brigade take part has also been special, as they make up the church of today and as we look forward – the church of tomorrow too."

To acknowledge and celebrate the anniversary the Church has produced a short history entitled, Second Presbyterian Church, Limavady, 1840-2015 – Glimpses from the Past, 175th Anniversary. Providing a brief history, from the building of the foundations in March 1840 and the opening service on Sunday, 13th December 1844, to the introduction of instrumental music into the service and the singing of hymns for the first time in 1913, the booklet shares the changing scene of worship and church life right up to the present day.

Acknowledging the church's past, present and future, Rev. Jones said," These glimpses from the past remind us of the need to be thankful to God. We pray that Second Limavady will continue to be the spiritual home for members of the present congregation and also for those who follow us for many years to come."
