

Dublin ecumenical service will mark Jerusalem link

The Archbishop of Jerusalem, the Most Revd Suheil Dawani, his wife, Shafeeqa and his Chaplain, Canon David Longe, will visit Dublin & Glendalough diocese from December 1 to 7.

One of the highlights of the week will be an ecumenical service in Christ Church Cathedral at 5.00 pm on Saturday December 3. Bishop Hovakim Manukyan, Primate of the Armenian Apostolic Orthodox Church of the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland will attend and both he and Archbishop Suheil will give reflections. This service is also supported by Dublin Council of Churches.

The service will be followed by walk to Khachkar, a memorial to those who died in the Armenian Genocide which started in 1915, in the cathedral grounds.

Belfast Cathedral supports Foodbank during Advent

St Anne's Cathedral began a collection of food items for the North Belfast Foodbank yesterday on Advent Sunday, November 27.

The collection will continue throughout the Advent period. All foodstuffs donated with be used to ensure families in need have enough to eat during this festive season.

The initiative is being co-ordinated by Dean's Vicar, the Rev Canon Mark Niblock.

"This time of year can be a challenging one for those who are struggling with debt and financial difficulties," Mark said. "Unprecedented numbers of local people are finding themselves having to seek assistance for the basic essentials in order to feed themselves and family members.

"Since 2013 the North Belfast Foodbank (affiliated to the Trussell Trust) has been a source of assistance to those facing such frightening circumstances by providing Emergency Three Day Food Parcels and signposting them to other agencies that can help them.

"They have worked with nutritionists to ensure food parcels contain sufficient nutrition for at least three days' worth of healthy, balanced meals for individuals and families."

Appealing to the parish family of St Anne's to support the work of the North Belfast Foodbank, Mark added: "After all, at this time of year we think a lot about the particular plight of one poor family..."

Guidelines for contributing:

- When getting your weekly shopping, add a few extra items in. You don't have to make up a food parcel yourself, just contribute towards it!
- Bring them with you on Sunday and deposit them in the Rations Receptacle at the back of the Cathedral. These will be taken to the local food collection points and made ready for distribution.
- Food contributions must be dried, tinned or jarred!

History of Ashton School, Cork, to be launched

On Friday next, 2nd December, A History of Ashton School, Cork written by Dr Alicia StLeger,

will be launched. The book launch is open to the public and will take place at 7.30 p.m. at Ashton School. Anyone associated with the school is especially invited to attend.

The history of the school was commissioned a number of years ago, on foot of an idea put forward by the then chairperson of the Board of Management and school co-patron, Dr Paul Colton. With this in mind, school principal, Adrian Landen, together with Dr StLeger called to Bishop Colton on Friday, 25th November to present him with the very first copy of the new history of the school. Dr Colton said: 'It really is a quality book: beautifully written, handsomely printed, a fascinating read, and full of photographs.'

'Requiem 1916 – Marbhna' performed at Knock

The recently refurbished Basilica at Knock Shrine provided the beautiful location for a solemn expression of commemoration earlier this month with the performance of 'Requiem 1916 – Marbhna', a Mass composed by Ódhrán Ó Casaide.

The Mass was first performed in City Hall, Dublin last January, but the occasion at Knock was the first at which the musical suite was performed in the setting of a Mass.

Marbhna' features a wide range of musical styles, with solo sean nós and classical voice,

chamber choir and orchestra, and traditional and early musical instruments. The blend of Irish and classical styles of music reflects the two musical traditions of Ireland at the time of the 1916 Rising.

Musicians included the singers Sibéal Ní Chasaide, Anne Marie Gibbons and Owen Gilhooly, the combined choirs of Knock and surrounding areas, and an orchestra from DIT Conservatory of Music and Drama.

Úna Nolan, director of sacred music at Knock, commented that "Sibéal's sean nós rendering of the 'Kyrie' was beautifully countered by the classical voices of mezzo soprano, Anne Marie Gibbons, and tenor, Owen Gilhooly." She described as "wonderful" Owen Gilhooly's portrayal of the 'Dies Irae'. The 'Dies Irae' from 'Marbhna' is the first to have been composed for the Irish language.

The Chief Celebrant at the Mass was Bishop Brendan Kelly, Bishop of Achonry. He was welcomed, along with the Papal Nuncio, Charles Brown, by Fr Richard Gibbons, Rector of Knock Shrine. Fr Gibbons also gave a special welcome to two women who were born in 1916 – Ódhrán Ó Casaide's mother, Noreen, and local woman, Fileen O'Connell.

Speaking at the start of the Mass, Bishop Kelly told those gathered that they came together to "salute, to pray for and to remember the men and women of 1916" and all of our dead at the end of the great Jubilee Year of Mercy and during the month of November. He said that this was a time when all Christians "look death in the face and know that it shall have no dominion, for we are an Easter people, a risen people, who sing and make music together, as we remember the great things done for us in Jesus Christ our Lord."

During the homily, Fr Gibbons spoke about how human beings have different attitudes towards death, and that these attitudes are sometimes revealed in their epitaphs. He referred to how we try to come to an understanding of "what the end of life is" and where we go after this life, and said that what life after death will be remains "clouded in great mystery."

Fr Gibbons commented that Christians have as many questions about life after death as anyone else. We have, however, a context for these questions, and this context is the Resurrection, which he described as "the key that unlocks the door".

Perpetrators Prayed for at Mothers' Union Service



The perpetrators of gender abuse were among those prayed for at a vigil in St Columb's Cathedral which was organised by members of the Mothers' Union in Derry and Raphoe.

The two-hour vigil was part of the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence campaign. It was one of around a dozen such events held in

Church of Ireland churches throughout Ireland today to demand an end to violence against women and girls.

Five female clergy from Derry and Raphoe were among those who took part in the vigil in Londonderry. It was organised by Mothers' Union's local Faith and Policy Coordinator Jacqui Armstrong and overseen by the Diocesan President, Mary Good.

Welcome teams were on hand to present purple and yellow ribbons to people arriving in the Cathedral. Prayer stations were set up at various points throughout the church.

Those present were asked to pray for victims of gender violence at home and abroad; for those in positions of authority who were working to end it; and for the perpetrators who were responsible for doing it.


Prayers were said, too, for Northern Ireland's Justice Minister, Claire Sudden - who is campaigning for gender justice - and for members of the PSNI and the Garda Siochana who are fighting against people trafficking.

Canon George Irwin of Christian Aid talked about the work his organisation was doing with partners in Egypt, South Africa, Iraq, Afghanistan and Kenya to try and end gender violence. Tim Houston of Christian Action Research & Education (CARE) talked about the extent of gender abuse in Northern Ireland and the Republic. A presentation of goods was made to representatives of Letterkenny Women's Refuge and Foyle Women's Aid.

Archbishop of Canterbury welcomes South Sudan Council of Churches to Lambeth Palace

Last Friday the Archbishop of Canterbury welcomed an ecumenical delegation of the South Sudan Council of Churches, following their recent visit to Pope Francis in Rome.

The delegation briefed the Archbishop of Canterbury on the situation in South Sudan and what the Church continues to do, and the outcome of their recent visit to the Holy Father. As they did with their visit to the Vatican, the delegation invited the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Holy Father to do all in their power for the promotion of peace and reconciliation.

Present in the meeting was Reverend Philip Majcher of the Church of Scotland, which has strong ties with the Presbyterian Church of South Sudan and Sudan.

Archbishop Justin Welby welcomed the delegation and expressed his deep concern for the situation. He informed the delegation of his continued effort in prayer and support through agencies like the Anglican Alliance towards ameliorating the situation.

He emphasized that the peace, reconciliation and healing of South Sudan and its people remain a top priority for him and he promised to do all in his power, through the Grace of God, to support the efforts of the Church, and other people of good will.

+++ New lay readers for Cashel, Ferns and Ossory. - This past weekend in St Laserian's cathedral, Old Leighlin, the Bishop of Cashel, Ferns & Ossory presided at the Advent Eucharist which will also incorporate the commissioning of new lay readers for Cashel, Ferns and Ossory. The new Readers have recently completed the Certificate in Christian Studies which is run in conjunction with St Patrick's College, Maynooth, under the direction of the Very Revd Tom Gordon, Diocesan Director of Education. The course is one of two training programmes recognised by the House of Bishops. This year's graduates include participants from the dioceses of Limerick, Cork and Meath and Kildare in addition to those of Cashel, Ferns and Ossorv. This week also sees the commencement of the new intake for the fourth cycle of the programme. The awards on Advent Sunday will be conferred

by the Revd Dr Michael Shorthall, the Director of Affiliated Programmes at St Patrick's College.

Dr. O'Ferrall who has written and spoken on this issue says " My focus at the Forum will be on the "moral responsibility" we have to children who are unaccompanied in the European Community.
