

Priests to hear confessions in a Belfast shopping centre

Priests are to hear confessions later this month inside a west Belfast shopping centre, The Irish News reports.

Redemptorists from Clonard Monastery will be available for confession and a chat at the Kennedy Centre in a specially created 'Mercy Tent'.

The gazebo structure will be placed opposite the food court on the first floor, where priests will be seated ready for shoppers interested in the sacrament of reconciliation.

Organisers hope to create a "comfortable, prayerful atmosphere" with Clonard volunteers and co-workers available to assist city shoppers.

The Mercy Tent is being launched in an bid to bring Clonard closer to the people of west Belfast.

As part of the Year of Mercy in which Pope Francis urged people to make a special effort in their faith, organisers aim to reach those who would not otherwise have contact with the Church.

It is not the first outreach project by Clonard, which held a 'Novena on the Streets' initiative in May.

The outreach initiatives were inspired by the Pope who, when a cardinal in Argentina, travelled to the poorest areas of his diocese to celebrate open-air Masses.

The Mercy Tent will operate on Friday November 18 from 5pm to 9pm, and from 11am to 3pm on Saturday November 19. Clonard's Holy Door will be closed by Bishop Noel Treanor on Sunday November 13 at 11am Mass. The Kennedy Centre visit will be the final event in the Jubilee Year of Mercy, which will officially end with Masses on Sunday November 20.

Cathedral and Corrymeela join in Cantate on St Cecilia's Day

St Anne's, Belfast, will resound with some heavenly music when the Cathedral joins with

Corrymeela to present CANTATE! – a concert to celebrate St Cecilia's Day, on Tuesday November 22 at 7 pm.



The concert will feature three choirs - Jubilate! Chamber Choir, St Anne's Girls' Choir and the Voices Together Community Choir There will be poems and readings by the Very Rev John Mann, Dean of Belfast and Pádraig Ó Tuama, leader of the Corrymeela Community.

St Cecilia, born in the second century, is a famous Roman Martyr - she was reported to have been beheaded by a sword. She is the Patron Saint of Music, and a number of musical compositions are dedicated to her. Her feast day, November 22, has become the occasion for concerts and musical festivals.

The concert in St Anne's Cathedral will raise funds for the Corrymeela Community, Northern Ireland's oldest centre for peace and reconciliation.

Mrs Desney Cromey, one of the concert organisers, said: "Dean John Mann and Pádraig Ó Tuama have a well-established working relationship and are keen to further reconciliation and outreach in Belfast.

"This is an opportunity for us to work with some of the best resources we have which on this occasion is beautiful music. It will be a superb evening." Desney added: "The concert takes place the week before Advent. It is a peaceful time and it will give people an opportunity to reflect, with some of the music leading into Advent."

"It will be a cold winter night so please come in and warm your heart with some heavenly music."

Shortage of priests could lead to fortnightly Masses in Limerick

A shortage of priests, coupled with falling attendances at Mass, may give rise to a situation whereby, according to the bishop of Limerick, "some churches will have Mass every second Sunday or one Sunday a month."

In an in-depth interview with the Limerick Leader this week, the bishop of Limerick, Dr Brendan Leahy, said "We are not trying to pretend it isn't there. One of the things we are doing here is we have moved more clearly towards a team ministry model, that is three or four priests looking after several parishes together. There will be teething problems because it's new and we

have to think it through but we have to move in that direction."

Bishop Leahy acknowledged that the shortage of priests in the future may mean that a parish priest may find himself in charge of three or more parishes. He said, "That is going to be a challenge. How can he be the parish priest of two or three parishes? He can't keep going with all the work and administration, so we are going to have to reflect on it."

Bishop Leahy also said that the role of lay people will be of the utmost importance going forward in the Church in Limerick.

"We are going to see teams of priests but not just teams of priests. I think we will see lay people working within the teams so that is going to be a development. Here, for instance, we have the first new lay general manager, lay diocesan secretary, Catherine Kelly, who replaced Fr Paul Finnerty – it was always a priest before that."

Speaking about the future, Bishop Leahy said that while the Diocese of Limerick may have enough priests to say Mass, "what we may ... have is that not every church will have Mass every Sunday. It might be that some churches will have Mass every second Sunday or one Sunday a month."

Child-friendly spaces needed for children of Mosul

Children fleeing Mosul are arriving at camps, showing the effects on their physical and mental health of two years' living under IS occupation, World Vision reports.

"Many children have been stuck in their homes while bombings, sniper fire or chaos rules around them. Others have witnessed the death of family members," the charity's programs manager in northern Iraq, Aaron Moore, said.

"One little boy, who is five-years-old, arrived at the camp too terrified to speak. He saw his 15year-old brother killed while they fled ISIL. He was not mixing with the other children: he was simply staring at them.

"Many children don't want to play. When painting, they have been recreating war scenes with tanks and war planes."

The charity has set up "child-friendly spaces" in northern Iraq as part of its emergency response work to the conflict

Reports on Tweets and a Facebook post by the Archbishop of Canterbury in which he said he was "horrified" by abuse levelled at the High Court judges who ruled that the Prime Minister

must seek Parliamentary approval to invoke Article 50, triggering the process of leaving the EU. Archbishop Justin said independent judges were 'fundamental' to British values. "I'm horrified by the trolling of British judges and those going to court - British values call for honest but good disagreeing. We need reconciliation, not abuse," he wrote. "Those criticising the judges are not distinguishing between "Should we leave EU?" (yes we should, the vote said so) and "How legally do we do it?" (parliament confirms it)." The Times and the Independent note comments made by the Bishop of Leeds, Nick Baines, to Radio 4 Sunday programme in which he called the reaction against the judges alarming, damaging and potentially a threat to public debate.
