Church of Ireland Historical Society's winter conference

The Church of Ireland Historical Society's winter conference will take place at **10.30am** on **Saturday, 1 November 2014** in the newly refurbished Music Room at Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin. As usual, enter via the door to Chapter Room where those at the registration table will direct you upstairs. Speakers include Dr Caroline Gallagher (Maynooth University), Revd Canon Patrick Comerford (Church of Ireland Theological Institute) and Dr Martin Maguire (Dundalk Institute of Technology). The research paper will be delivered by Mr Jeffrey Cox (University College Dublin).

Dr Gallagher will speak on First Fruits' churches in early nineteenth-century Meath. Mr Cox will discuss state negligence and the diocese of Kildare under the Tudor episcopate of Alexander Craic. Revd Canon Comerford will examine the archbishops of Dublin and the deanery of Penkrigde, while Dr Maguire assesses Protestant republicans in the revolutionary period, c. 1912-23.

Coffee and registration will begin from 10.30am, followed by the first paper at 11am.

C of I archives focus of Dublin launch by Minister for Education

The Minister for Education Jan O'Sullivan TD will launch volume 21 of Irish Archives (the journal of the Irish Society for Archives, edited by Susan Hood and Elizabeth McEvoy) which this year is devoted to the records of the Church of Ireland. The launch will take place on Tuesday 4 November 2014 at 6.15pm.

Minister O'Sullivan is the first person to hold this particular ministerial portfolio who happens also to be a member of the Church of Ireland and she will perform the honours on Irish Archives at St Patrick's Cathedral Deanery, Upper Kevin Street, with the kind permission of the Dean, Very Reverend Victor Stacey.

The Church of Ireland does not always get the credit it deserves for gathering records together and keeping them safe. This volume of Irish Archives aims to set the record straight by paying tribute to those who have looked after an array of parish collections, diocesan papers and miscellaneous manuscripts in local and central custody and by providing a platform for the current

generation of historians and archivists to reassess and reconstruct some of the complex aspects of Church of Ireland identity.

Speaking on this theme, Minister O’Sullivan said: “Record–keeping does not always get the recognition it deserves. However, it is vitally important that we retain a documented link with our past in order to fully understand our present. Church records are a particularly valuable source of information and I am delighted to see those from the Church of Ireland get the recognition they deserve in this volume of Irish Archives.”

The Chairman of the Irish Society for Archives, Dr Raymond Refaussé (who is also Librarian and Archivist at the Representative Church Body Library) responded: “I welcome the Minister’s endorsement of the importance of archives and urge the government, of which she is a member, to appropriately fund this greatly valued but seriously under resourced sector of Irish cultural life”.

Worship, Welfare and War – St Matthew’s, Irishtown, Remembers

The role of St Matthew’s Parish and the local community in Irishtown during the troubled years of 1914 to 1918 will be examined at a special lecture in St Matthew’s Church on Saturday November 8 at 2.30 pm.

Entitled ‘WWW – Worship, Welfare and War’, the lecture will be delivered by Patrick Hugh Lynch who has carried out extensive research into the circumstances of returning World War 1 ex–servicemen during the early days of the Irish Free State.

He will examine how Canon O’Hanlon, the Revd Carolan and George Reynolds gave the area well known names and places.

Patrick’s research work provides an insight into the often complex and controversial story of the Irish men and women who left Ireland to join the Forces of the Crown during the Great War. His primary research is directed at what happened to those thousands of Irish men and women who came home. He has looked at the provision of welfare service for veterans, the history of the Royal British Legion in the Irish Republic.

Softly March Away – Greystones and the Great War

St Patrick's Church in Greystones is holding a World War 1 commemorative evening. Entitled Softly March Away – Greystones and the Great War centres around a war memorial tablet in the church which bears the names of 22 parishioners who were killed in the war.

Written and presented by Irish Times journalist, Peter Murtagh, the evening will highlight the men's stories – who they were, where they lived and how they died. Among them were an international rugby player, medics, a journalist, a cross country athlete, at least one career soldier, a forestry worker, a solicitor and a husband.

There will be musical accompaniment by mezzo soprano Dara McMahon, baritone Rory Musgrave and pianist Svetlana Rudenko who will perform songs of the era.

The remembrance evening in the church gets underway at 8.00 pm. Tickets cost €10 each and are on sale from the parish office of St Patrick's Church, Mooney's Shop on Trafalgar Road, Greystones and Greystones Antiques by the Dart Station. They will also be available on the door on the night if there are any remaining.

Proceeds from the evening will go to the parish funds and there will be a retiring collection for the Royal British Legion.

Accepting Sexuality Group: Christianity of Gay and Lesbian Truthfulness

How do we give those who have been opposed to us, hated us, or frightened of us, a soft-landing in the world in which we are increasingly coming to be seen as a rather normal part of the fabric of daily life? Britten's War Requiem at St Anne's Cathedral, Belfast

St Anne's Cathedral will provide a fitting backdrop to Britten's War Requiem, performed for the first time in Belfast in almost 30 years on 14 November.

This unique cross-border collaboration between the Ulster Orchestra and the RTÉ Concert Orchestra marks the centenary of World War One. The concert will also feature the Girls' Choir of St Anne's with Master of the Choristers David Stevens.

Britten's War Requiem was last performed in Belfast Cathedral on November 13 1969, almost 49 years ago to the day.

On the title page of the War Requiem score, Britten quoted Wilfred Owen: "My subject is War and the pity of War. The Poetry is in the pity... All a poet can do today is warn."

Britten's large-scale masterpiece intersperses his setting of the traditional Latin Mass for the Dead with poems by Owen, a First World War poet.

War Requiem was commissioned to celebrate the opening (in 1962) of the new cathedral at Coventry, built to replace the one destroyed during the Second World War, and embodies Britten's deeply held pacifist and humanitarian beliefs.

With Belfast Philharmonic Choir, Leeds Philharmonic Chorus and the Girl Choristers of St Anne's Cathedral, as well as a select trio of powerful vocal soloists, all set in the solemn serenity of St Anne's, this will be a truly exceptional spectacle.
