
Pudding Party and All Things Royal at Visitors Night in Ballygawley

Thanksgiving for Many Gifts in Narraghmore and Timolin

On Friday evening (October 10) Archbishop Michael Jackson had the opportunity to visit the churches in both Narraghmore and Timolin. Both parishes have carried out significant work to the interiors of these stunningly beautiful churches.

In Narraghmore the avenue approaching the church has been completely resurfaced.

Inside, new heaters have been installed, new carpet has been laid, cushions and kneelers for the pews have been repaired and renewed and corner cushions have been donated. A new curtain has been made and donated to surround the organ. All the work complements the church and has been made possible through the efforts and donations of parishioners.

While there, the Archbishop met those involved in the effort and prayed with them. He blessed the work for the use and enjoyment of all who come to the church in the future and the visit concluded with all present saying the Lord's Prayer together.

The Archbishop then moved from Narraghmore to Timolin where he celebrated Holy Communion and preached. He was also invited to dedicate refurbished pew cushions and kneelers and a newly installed sound system.

In his sermon he drew out aspects of many types of thanksgiving: for the harvest of the land and the sea where we are so dependent on the care and providence of God; for the harvest of generosity shown so amply in the gifts for dedication; for the harvest of community, recognising the pivotal place that Timolin church plays at the heart of the local community; and for the harvest of faith that underpins our joy in believing and our willingness to serve God and our neighbour.

The Archbishop drew attention to the value of a weekday Harvest Thanksgiving as it connects us with our everyday

discipleship and to the life—giving expression of thanksgiving for Harvest Home set within a celebration of Holy Communion which is a thanksgiving for the real presence of God in the body and blood of Jesus Christ in our lives and in our motivation to service of God's people and God's creation.


Bishop McGuckian welcomes Pope Leo's first major document, I Have Loved You

The first Apostolic Exhortation from Pope Leo XIV was published in Rome on October 10.

Entitled Dilexi Te – I Have Loved You it is addressed to all Christians and follows from the last encyclical letter of the late Pope Francis on the love that flows from the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Pope Leo notes that much of the letter was prepared by Pope Francis in the final months of his life and that he is happy to make this document his own.

Welcoming the publication of this first major document of Pope Leo's pontificate, Bishop Alan McGuckian SJ, Chair of the Council for Migrants, Refugees and Justice and Peace of the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference, said that it provided a comprehensive overview of the Church's teaching, tradition and practice in hearing and responding to the cry of the poor over the centuries, as well as a serious call to action in our own times.

The document places the Church's teaching in the context of God's eternal love for all, made manifest through the life of Jesus Christ. It then brings this to light through the lens of Scripture and history, to the teachings of the Church Fathers, the lifestyle of poverty and conversion embraced by Saint Francis of Assisi and others, to the documents and outcomes of the Second Vatican Council in the 1960s, and more recently, the writings of various Popes and, notably, the declarations by various bishops' conferences, notably in Latin America.



Bishop Alan McGuckian SJ is Bishop of Down and Connor and Chair of the Council for Migrants, Refugees and Justice and Peace of the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference.

The various forms of poverty in our world are referenced – from material poverty to loneliness and isolation, war, migration and indifference. The Pope also refers to the importance of caring for creation and its link to poverty and the vulnerable. In addition, the spiritual poverty of our world is highlighted, noting that when we open ourselves to the poor and the suffering, we re-discover our own need for mercy and discipleship – to be poor with the poor. Love for the Lord means love for the poor.

"Ultimately, this document speaks of love that becomes a mission, a mission that moves us from places of comfort to works of compassion and service in closeness with those who are poor. Pope Leo speaks of us being "asked to enter

into the heart of God, who is always concerned for the needs of his children, especially those in greatest need." (Dilexit te 8)

"The Holy Father is very clear that in dealing with the various forms of poverty in our world today, we need to be committed to eliminating the structural causes of poverty and related inflictions. He rightly notes that this cannot be delayed because "society needs to be cured of a sickness which is weakening and frustrating it and which can only lead to new crises". (Dilexit te 94)

"At the same time, the Pope states that no Christian can simply regard the poor as a societal issue alone. The poor are part of us all, part of our Church family too and in need of accompaniment on our journey to eternal life. In this regard, he reminds us of the words of Saint John Paul II who taught that 'the preferential option for the poor, namely the Church's love for the poor, is essential for her and a part of her constant tradition, and impels her to give attention to a world in which poverty is threatening to assume massive proportions in spite of technological and economic progress.' (Dilexit te 104)

"Pope Leo speaks of Christian love breaking down barriers and bringing together those who are distant, uniting strangers and reconciling enemies. The Church, he says, sets no limits to love and this is what our world needs today."



Very Rev Dr Sarah Rowland Jones has been invited to join event, in recognition for making "an outstanding contribution" to the community she serves.


Previous winners include the artist Tracey Emin, and musician Joan Armatrading.
