


# Newest congregation welcomed into PCI family

Central Belfast, which began life as a team of just nine people who came together to pray in 2016 and now attracts well over 300 people, was been welcomed into the Presbyterian Church in Ireland (PCI) as its newest

congregation, during a special service of thanksgiving in the church on Sunday (12 October).

Located in what was the old May Street Presbyterian Church building in Belfast's city centre, this is the first time that PCI has welcomed a new congregation into the Church

since Donabate Presbyterian, in County Dublin, was admitted in 2010. 'Central Belfast' now joins over 500 congregations that make up the all-Ireland denomination.

Speaking after the service, David Dickinson, who leads Central, and is training for PCI's ordained ministry, explained that the Church's General Assembly in June authorised the Presbytery of South Belfast, to 'establish 'Central Belfast' as a congregation of the Presbyterian Church'. "In the way PCI works, all congregations are part of one of its 19 regional presbyteries across Ireland. We fall within the bounds and oversight of the Presbytery of South Belfast, which formally agreed to establish Central as a PCI congregation at its

meeting last month."

Mr Dickinson continued, "Today has been another significant milestone in what has been the most astonishing journey of God's faithfulness, goodness and grace. It is also evidence of God's heart for the city of Belfast to see the church renewed and to see the city changed. Central has flourished and stands today as a congregation full of life, so it is important that we give thanks for where we are, and for what God has done over these last nine years. Through all the twists and turns to get to this point, it has also been a time of hope-filled expectancy for all that God is yet to do in us and through us," he said.

Established in Belfast's Cathedral Quarter in October 2016, Central began life as a 'church plant' of Carnmoney Presbyterian Church, meeting on Wednesday nights in various spaces in The MAC theatre. Originally a fellowship of nine people, numbers began to grow as a result of five years of outreach in the city, which included running the well-known evangelistic resource called the Alpha Course.

The community grew and in February 2018 services moved to a Sunday afternoon in Assembly Buildings where numbers grew to around 40. By Easter of 2019, with around 70 attending the services, they moved to Sunday morning services, which were now taking place in Central's new home, the old May Street Presbyterian Church. Having gone online during the Pandemic, when doors opened again in 2022, numbers had swelled to over 120.

With nearly 400 attending each Sunday, for the first time they now need to open the church's gallery. Speaking of the

future, Mr Dickinson continued, "My hope for the future is that congregational status within PCI is not a destination, but merely another marker on the journey, as we continue to follow the Spirit's lead on the Mission of God. My prayer is that Central would continue to be a living-giving source in the heart of the city, from which followers of Jesus would be scattered to every sphere of city life, as agents of change and the increase of God's Kingdom."

During the service the Moderator of the Presbytery of South Belfast, Rev Andy Galbraith, the minister of Fisherwick Presbyterian Church, welcomed Central into the Presbytery

and constituted the congregation in prayer. The minister of Carnmoney Presbyterian, Rev Stuart Hawthorne, also spoke.

Rick Hill, the Secretary of PCI's Council for Mission in Ireland, also took part in the service. Speaking at Central he said, "Today, we give thanks to God for His goodness, faithfulness and sustaining power, as He been at the heart of this whole process. As we welcome Central into the PCI church family, I also want to honour everyone who has been involved in this journey for their faith, dedication and vision. As the PCI Council which has responsibility for strategic mission and supporting new church development, we will support and work with Central as they move forward."

Mr Hill continued, "While we hear too often a narrative of decline, there is another narrative that we are also seeing within our work through the Council for Mission in Ireland. As a denomination, we are carrying a vision to see 10 newly constituted congregations plus 10 new church planting projects in the next 10 years. We have been seeing growth and development in other church planting projects in Balbriggan and Wexford, among others. It is an exciting time, and I hope that we will have many more services like this in the future."

# Bishops pray Gaza ceasefire deal brings immediate relief and comfort

A group of bishops with a close interest in the Holy Land have welcomed the Gaza peace deal, praying that it will "bring immediate relief and comfort".

The Bishop of Southwark, Christopher Chessun, the Church of England's lead bishop for the Middle East, together with the Bishops of Chelmsford, Gloucester and Norwich, said there now needs to be a "fundamental shift in attitudes and behaviour" to secure longterm peace.

They said that what had happened in Israel and Gaza "must never be allowed to happen again, anywhere" and pledged to continue to stand in solidarity with the Churches of the Holy Land.

They said: "We hope and pray that today's agreement will bring immediate relief and comfort to those imprisoned and held hostage, to those who are hungry and homeless and to those fearful for their lives and the lives of their loved ones. After two years of unimaginable death and destruction now is the time for all parties to turn away from war and commit to peace.

"A credible peace must start with a ceasefire, but it will not last without a fundamental shift in the attitudes and behaviours that, for too long, have maintained Israel's occupation of Palestinian territory and thwarted Palestinian self-determination and statehood. The settler violence in the West Bank must cease and the settlement-expansion programme must be reversed.

"We call on our own Government and the wider international community to now work tirelessly in order for Hamas, and for other Palestinian factions, to fully commit to decommissioning their arms and dismantling their military capabilities, while at the same time securing the necessary

commitments from Israel to end the occupation in accordance with the International Court of Justice's ruling of July 19, 2024.

"All wars, even this war in Gaza, are subject to international law. Where those laws have been broken, those responsible must be held accountable, even after the war's end.

"To do otherwise would be to undermine respect for the rules of war and to encourage a culture of impunity in future conflicts. What we have seen in Gaza these last two years must never be allowed to happen again, anywhere. Similarly, the attack on Southern Israel on October 7, 2023 and the killings and taking of hostages must never be repeated anywhere.

"We continue to hold that the only path to a just peace for Israelis and Palestinians, is a two-state solution that provides for a safe and secure Israel alongside a viable and sovereign Palestinian state.

"To that end, we will continue to stand in solidarity with the Churches of the Holy Land in ensuring that their people's voices, including their hopes and their anxieties as to the future, are not ignored in the weeks and months ahead.

"A lasting peace is not one that that is imposed by outside powers, but one that is built and owned by the affected communities themselves. Palestinian Christians have an important part to play in that process and we will support them in their efforts to be peacemakers."

#### St Louise's KC at UK wide Covid inquiry

Clair Dobbin, the internationally renowned lawyer at the helm of the Northern Ireland module of the UK wide Covid inquiry, was educated in west Belfast.

A former pupil of St Louise's Comprehensive College on the Falls Road in Belfast, Clair Dobbin KC left the north to study law at the prestigious Clare College at Cambridge University.

She has since been based in London having joined Three Raymond Buildings, a leading set of barristers with a national and international reputation, as a barrister in 1999.

Practicing in the fields of public law, human rights, inquests and inquiries she has appeared alone before the Supreme Court, the Privy Council and in the European Court of Human Rights.

One of Ms Dobbin's main areas of practice is public inquiries and inquests. She was part of the Bloody Sunday Inquiry and acted as counsel to the inquiry into Children's Homes in Lambeth, as part of her role as counsel to the Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse.




