

Galway welcome for Master of the Dominican Order

Archbishop of Wales 'hopeful' for Bangor diocese despite 'deep-seated challenges'

The Archbishop of Wales has spoken of a "faithful, hopeful and fruitful future" for the Diocese of Bangor despite its "complex, deep-seated and long-standing" challenges.

Addressing the Bangor Diocesan Conference, Most Rev Cherry Vann acknowledged that problems in the diocese will "take a long time to unravel and deal with appropriately," and will "require everybody pulling together".

Earlier this year, two reports highlighted safeguarding concerns and misbehaviour at Bangor Cathedral and a "culture in which sexual boundaries seemed blurred". There were also allegations about inappropriate language being used and alcohol consumed excessively.

Archbishop Cherry said people in the diocese were suffering "trauma" over events that "go back far beyond the last 18 months or so". But she struck an optimistic tone about the path ahead, saying it will require "all of us, first and foremost, keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus who is the founder and perfecter of our faith. Whilst, of course, being mindful of the challenges that need to be addressed".

Using the biblical metaphor of pruning vines to encourage growth, the archbishop spoke about the need for renewal even when it feels uncomfortable. She encouraged the diocese to focus on its spiritual roots during this season of

change, comparing the church's journey to the natural cycles of growth, dormancy and renewal seen in the seasons.

Friel's manuscripts, compositions and arrangements will inspire students, researchers and musicians for generations to come.


The Redmond Friel archive will be located in the Library in the Derry~Londonderry campus.

Cathedral Calls

'Icons on Ammo Boxes - Transforming Death into Life'

While Armagh Robinson Library is hosting the exhibition of 'Icons on Ammo Boxes', the icons will be moved to St Patrick's Church of Ireland Cathedral on



Sunday 19 October to be viewed before and after services and then returned to the Library.

The exhibition has been created by Kyiv artists Sonya Atlantova and Oleksandr Klymenko.

Icons have been painted on fragments of ammunition boxes from the war zones in Ukraine. They serve as silent war witnesses and symbols of victory of life over death. The project is also to help raise funds to supply the frontline medical care in Ukraine, and so the icons are on sale.

One of the icons, showing The Vernicle (The Saviour), has been suggested as a possible gift to the Cathedral so that a part of this significant exhibition would find its long term home in the City of Armagh. Since the beginning of the war

in Ukraine, the Cathedral has displayed a Ukrainian flag and kept a candle burning when the Cathedral is open, along with copies of the New Testament, Bible readings and prayers in Ukrainian. The lit candle represents the light of hope - the hope that peace, healing and reconciliation will soon be a reality in that war torn land. The proposal is to display the icon permanently next to the flag and candle if funds can be found.

The amount to raise to purchase the icon is £1,500. If people wish to donate towards that amount, then please donate by placing cash inside the specific envelopes into the donation box. The box will be moved from the Cathedral to the Library and will remain there until the end of the exhibition. The amount raised will hopefully be enough to buy the icon, and all the money donated will ultimately be used for humanitarian aid in Ukraine.

Tours of the Archbishop's Palace Armagh

Take this special opportunity to see behind the doors of The Primate's Palace, built by Archbishop Robinson and used as the home of the Church of Ireland Archbishops from 1770 until the 1970s.

Your costumed guide will welcome visitors to this magnificent building with the Primate's Chapel and Ice House providing you with a fascinating tour lasting approximately 75 minutes.

The Palace was designed by famous architect Thomas Cooley in the classical style, originally it had two stories and a basement. In 1825 another floor and raised portico were added under the primateship of Lord John George Beresford. Your guide will share their knowledge of the former Archbishop of Armagh, Richard Robinson 1765 to

1794, a colourful personality, often known as the Builder of Armagh.
