Archbishops' statement on the Church of Ireland and the Anglican Communion

The Most Rev John McDowell, the Church of Ireland's Primate of All Ireland and Archbishop of Armagh, with the Most Rev Michael Jackson, Primate of Ireland and Archbishop of Dublin have issued the following statement on the relationship between the Church of Ireland and the Anglican Communion following the recent communiqué from Gafcon:

In view of the recent communiqué issued by Gafcon, entitled The Future has Arrived, we feel it might be helpful to members of the Church of Ireland if we clarified some matters of fact, with particular reference to the Anglican Communion.

The Anglican Communion is a body of autonomous Anglican Provinces (including the Church of Ireland) who voluntarily join together in clearly defined ways. It has existed in a formal sense since 1867, when the Archbishop of Canterbury issued invitations to what became the first Lambeth Conference. From the beginning, the Office of the Archbishop of Canterbury and the convening of the Lambeth Conference were expressions of Anglican unity and identity which, as the Communion grew over time, were supplemented by two further instruments of unity – the Primates' Meeting and the Anglican Consultative Council (ACC).

This is the Anglican Communion to which the Church of Ireland belongs. The Preamble and Declaration (which is one of our foundation formularies) commits us to communion with the Church of England. The Preamble and Declaration is prefixed to the Constitution and included in the Book of Common Prayer. Our bishops receive invitations to and usually attend the Lambeth Conference. The Archbishop of Armagh attends the Primates' Meetings and the General Synod appoints representatives (clerical and lay) to the ACC. In fact, the next meeting of the ACC to which all Anglican Provinces have been invited to send representatives will be hosted by the Church of Ireland in Belfast in the early summer of 2026. In addition, the Church of Ireland plays a full part in the Commissions, Committees and Networks of the Anglican Communion and in this way



lives out this particular aspect of our discipleship of Jesus Christ.

There are many organisations and movements within the Anglican Communion who wish to reform aspects of the Communion and how it works. The Communion has always welcomed and accommodated debate and diversity of this nature. However, the Church of Ireland recognises no body other than the one described in the preceding paragraphs as the Anglican Communion.

We do not suggest that the Anglican Communion as it has existed in history and continues to exist today is a perfect organisation. It is inevitable that those who hold to the Anglican theological method involving Scripture, Tradition and Reason, and working out our discipleship in autonomous but interdependent Provinces will not agree on everything. However, praying always for the guidance of the Holy Spirit, we are committed to studying the Scriptures and learning from the insights of the past together with our fellow Anglicans, in communion, around the world.

Award for former teacher Ann Farr of Coventry

Sunday, 12 October, marked the start of the World Week of Prayer for Peace, originally a Christian event started in 1974 and now open to all faith traditions.

Resources are produced each year to help communities come together and pray and reflect on making peace, in the spirit of its original Chair Dr Edward Carpenter, former Dean of Westminster Abbey: 'The peace of the world must be prayed for by the faiths of the world.'

The opening on-line event, attended by more than 50 people, included the awarding of the Wilson/Hinks Peace Award, in memory of two former Chairs of WPWP, The Revd Gordon Wilson and The Revd Sidney Hinkes. The award recognises significant contributions by individuals, organisations or projects in furthering peace, justice and reconciliation.

This year the award was given to two women, Ann Farr from the UK and Francoise Nwabuto from Cameroon for her work on women's health care and education.

Ann has a life-long commitment to peace and peace education in particular and gives wonderful witness to the phrase: making the local global and the global local!

As a teacher in Coventry, Ann worked with the local authorities to produce resource materials for schools for, among other things, on the war history of Coventry and

Dresden and how this led to Coventry becoming a City of Peace. She also worked in an advisory role with schools, supporting teachers and nurturing peace and justice education. Ann has been a firm and constant presence in the Chapel of Unity in Coventry Cathedral, being part of their committee and organising, for many, many years, annual events for Hiroshima, Nagasaki and the Coventry Peace Month.

She has served on the Birmingham Diocesan Justice and Peace Commission and is a member of the Coventry Peace and Justice Group in its work. In recent years this group has focused on Local Authority Pension Investment in arms companies. This has included advocacy and campaigning work as well as nonviolent direct action to draw attention to the issue.

In 2004 Ann was part of a Pax Christi England and Wales delegation to the West Bank, and Bethlehem in particular. This exposure has led to many more solidarity visits to the West Bank, developing strong friendship links. In 2010 Ann became an Ecumenical Accompanier in Palestine and Israel and was based in a village near Nablus which experienced constant harassment from Israeli Settlers. Ann has returned several times, 'filling in' when others were unavailable and bringing her calm, strong presence to difficult and sometimes tense situations. She has also co-organised exposure visits to Palestine with Pax Christi E&W and with Pax Christi International. Between 2020 - 2024 Ann was Chair of Pax Christi England and Wales.

In her response Ann said: "We are sent out to be peacemakers, and we do that by working for justice, where

we see it is missing. We are privileged to be alongside and to accompany others at different times and in different places. We listen to them, speak out with them and take whatever action is possible for us at the time. And we do all this together.

"I give thanks for the privileges I have had in visiting so many significant places and people on this journey, for all those I have worked alongside and for all those family, friends, colleagues and fellow members of peace group, who have prayed, encouraged and supported in so many different ways, to make the work possible."



pilgrims and travellers) on the site of Saint Mary's Cathedral, Limerick.

From 1212 to 1540, the Knights cared for the sick and the poor here in Limerick, living out their motto of faith and service. Today, this legacy of hospitality and compassion continues to inspire the Cathedral community.

King's visit to Rome

Christian unity and care for the planet themes of King's visit to Rome

King Charles III and Queen Camilla will make an official State visit to the Vatican next Thursday, October 23, where they will be received by Pope Leo XIV.

The visit, confirmed by both the Holy See and Buckingham Palace, marks a historic moment in Anglican-Catholic



relations and will focus on two key themes: Christian unity and care for the environment.

As part of the day's events, King Charles will also be honoured with the title of Royal Confrater of Saint Paul at the Basilica of Saint Paul Outside the Walls, recognising the long-standing ties between the British Crown and the Benedictine abbey attached to the basilica.

At 12pm local time, Pope Leo XIV will lead an ecumenical prayer service for the care of creation in the Sistine Chapel. Afterwards, a meeting will take place in the Sala Regia with individuals and organisations dedicated to environmental protection. Later in the afternoon, at 2.45pm, the King and Queen will visit the Basilica of Saint Paul Outside the Walls, where King Charles will be formally granted the title Royal Confrater of Saint Paul.

Buckingham Palace has described the visit as "historic," aligning with the Jubilee Year theme Pilgrims of Hope, and

recognising the shared ecumenical efforts between the Catholic Church and the Church of England.

The two central themes of the Royal visit are Christian unity and care for the planet. At a Vatican press briefing on 17 October, Archbishop Flavio Pace, Secretary of the Dicastery for Promoting Christian Unity, outlined the ecumenical aspects, while Sister Alessandra Smerilli, Secretary of the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development, spoke about the ecological dimension.

Originally scheduled for April, the visit also coincides with the 10th anniversary of Pope Francis's environmental encyclical 'Laudato Si'. King Charles - who, as Supreme Governor of the Church of England, has long been committed to interfaith engagement - specifically requested to take part in a liturgy focused on creation care. That service will be led jointly by Pope Leo XIV and the Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell, in the Sistine Chapel.

The ecumenical tone of the visit will be reflected in the liturgy, which will include a hymn by Saint Ambrose of Milan - sung in an English translation by Saint John Henry Newman. Newman, a key figure in Anglican-Catholic relations, was Anglican for much of his life before becoming Catholic. He was canonised in 2019, an event King Charles attended personally. On 1 November, Pope Leo will declare Newman a Doctor of the Church during a major ceremony attended by a high-ranking Anglican delegation.

Music will be provided by the Sistine Chapel Choir, alongside choristers from the Chapel Royal at St James's

Palace and the Choir of St George's Chapel, Windsor Castle.

In the afternoon, the Royals will travel to the Basilica of Saint Paul Outside the Walls, which maintains historical ties with the British Crown and its adjacent Benedictine Abbey. Notably, the Abbey's coat of arms includes the insignia of the Order of the Garter - one of Britain's most prestigious honours.

To mark the occasion, King Charles will be formally named Royal Confrater of Saint Paul by Cardinal James Michael Harvey and Abbot Donato Ogliari, with the approval of Pope Leo XIV. "It is a sign of honour and spiritual communion," said Archbishop Pace.

A specially designed chair bearing King Charles's coat of arms and the Latin inscription Ut unum sint ("That they may be one" - John 17:21) will be used during the ceremony. The chair will remain in the Basilica's apse and will be available for use by the King and his successors on future visits.

Following the ecumenical prayer service, Pope Leo and King Charles will participate in a private meeting in the Sala Regia with Church leaders, business figures, environmental advocates, and UN experts. Representatives from the Laudato Si' Movement will also attend.

"This meeting underscores the strong relationship between the Catholic and Anglican Churches on environmental issues," said Sister Smerilli. "Pope Francis often reminds us that everything is connected, and that environmental and

social crises must be addressed together. Pope Leo has continued this approach with further action."

She highlighted recent initiatives such as the July 9 celebration of the new Missa pro custodia creationis (Mass for the Protection of Creation) and the upcoming inauguration of the Borgo Laudato Si' on September 5, 2025. Sister Smerilli also praised the King's efforts to bring the private sector on board in the fight against climate change and biodiversity loss.

Both Archbishop Pace and Sister Smerilli emphasised the long-term significance of this visit. "It marks a historic moment in the journey of reconciliation between our Churches," said Archbishop Pace. "It celebrates how far we've come-and offers hope for the future."

Sister Smerilli agreed, calling it a powerful symbol of unity and shared responsibility for the environment: "These are themes that matter more than ever-for the generations to come."
