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Archbishop of Canterbury visits First Nations people on Thursday Island

The Archbishop of Canterbury was welcomed by Torres Strait Islanders on Thursday Island earlier this month during his visit to Australia.

The visit started the final leg of Archbishop Justin and Mrs Welby's Australian tour in North Queensland, which included a visit to the Aboriginal community of Yarrabah the next day. They were accompanied by the Anglican Bishop of North Queensland, Keith Joseph.

The Archbishop was visiting Australia to meet with First Nations people and communities affected by climate change, as part of a visit hosted by the Church of Australia that has seen the Archbishop visit the dioceses of Perth, Adelaide, Melbourne, Sydney, Grafton and North Queensland.

Arriving on Thursday Island the Archbishop and Mrs Welby received a Welcome to Country by the traditional owners of the land and paid their respects to its elders past, present and emerging.

On Saturday evening they were hosted by local Elders Auntie Pauline and Auntie Jennie at a welcome feast

attended by Islanders from Thursday Island and across the Torres Strait. The evening concluded with traditional song and dance.

The Archbishop and Mrs Welby planted a tree in the grounds of the Anglican Old Cathedral of All Souls and St Bartholomew, before joining the congregation for Holy Eucharist where the Archbishop preached the sermon.

The service was attended by around 250 people from Thursday Island and across the Torres Strait, including local elders, Torres Strait Islander clergy, Melanesian Brothers and local dignitaries.

On leaving Thursday Island, the Archbishop said: "It was an honour to be welcomed to Thursday Island by the people of the Torres Strait Islands. I give thanks for the generous hospitality we received and the worship we shared. I'm especially moved that people travelled from other Torres Strait Islands to be with us.

"Although this was only a short visit, the Islanders I met taught me lots: about their profound connection to the land and sea, their deep sense of community and caring for one another, their faithfulness to Christ and their joy in the Lord. I will remember these lessons and give thanks for them in my prayers.

"At the same time, this was a chance to hear the concerns and challenges of First Nations people in the Torres Strait especially the impact of the climate crisis, which threatens Indigenous peoples in Australia and elsewhere. The world must urgently listen to the voices of Indigenous people: they

are not only living with the impacts of climate change, but have much to teach us all about living in harmony with the natural world.

"As I leave Thursday Island, I do so with hope and joy in my heart at our friendship in Jesus Christ - and an ever-deepening commitment to stand alongside our First Nations sisters and brothers. My message to the people of the Torres Strait Islands is this: we will pray for you and support you. Please remember us in your prayers and we will remember you in ours."

Fr Niall Coll appointed Bishop of Ossory

Pope Francis has appointed well-known theologian Fr Niall Coll as the new Bishop of Ossory. The announcement came in a communique from the Holy See yesterday morning (Friday).

Bishop-elect Coll (59) is a priest of the Diocese of Raphoe and up to this point has been serving as parish priest of Donegal Town.

The Letterkenny-native returned to ministry in Raphoe in 2019 after almost 20 years teaching theology and religious education at St Mary's University, Belfast. During this time he was also editor of the influential journal on school ethos Le Chéile.

After studies for the priesthood at St Patrick's College, Maynooth Bishop-elect Coll was ordained in 1988. And continued further studies at Rome's Pontifical Gregorian University where he obtained a licence in dogmatic theology. He went on to complete a higher diploma in education at Trinity College Dublin before completing his doctorate in divinity specialising in Christology at the Gregorian University in 1995.

From 1995-1998 he was a lecturer at St Patrick's College, Carlow before serving as a curate in Dungloe from 1998-2001 while serving as chaplain and a teacher at Pobalscoil na Rosann.

In 2001 he was appointed to St Mary's in Belfast where he taught until 2019 when he was appointed parish priest of Drumholm-Ballintra moving to Donegal Town in 2021.

King invites Chief Rabbi to a Coronation sleepover

The Chief Rabbi of Britain will stay with the King the night before his Coronation in order to observe the rules of the Jewish sabbath.

King Charles III's Coronation will take place on Saturday May 6 next year in a ceremony that will also involve his wife, Camilla, the Queen Consort, being anointed and crowned.

However, because the event will occur on a Saturday, Chief Rabbi Ephraim Mirvis will not be able to travel by car, in accordance with religious law.

It has therefore been announced that he and his wife Valerie will stay with the King and Queen Consort to allow them to attend the ceremony without breaking the laws of Shabbat.

It is less than a mile to walk between the royal residence of Clarence House and Westminster Abbey, where the Coronation will take place.

It is understood that Mr Mirvis will spend the Shabbat with local communities during the Coronation weekend.

This is not the first time that the King has taken the Chief Rabbi's religious observance into account. Following the death of Queen Elizabeth II, he brought forward the time of a meeting with Mr Mirvis at Buckingham Palace so that he could get to his synagogue before Shabbat on Friday. It is

part of royal protocol for a monarch to meet faith leaders upon accession to the throne.

It was reported at the time that the Chief Rabbi's staff were astounded by what they called "an amazing gesture" made by the King and his team.

Mr Mirvis will follow a 120-year-old precedent set by Chief Rabbi Hermann Adler, who also attended the Coronation of King Edward VII on a Shabbat in 1902 after staying overnight at a nearby synagogue.

Plans for the King's investiture have been in place since the Coronation of his mother, Queen Elizabeth II, in 1953.
