A new chronicle published of history, art and politics at Nun's Cross Church

A beautiful new book chronicling the long and distinguished history of Nun's Cross Church, Killiskey, was launched on Friday evening (October 17) by Archbishop Michael Jackson. *Nun's Cross Church, Co. Wicklow and its Treasures, 1817–2017* by Patricia Butler with photography by Mark Boland, was commissioned by the select vestry of Killiskey to mark the bicentenary of their church. A huge crowd of people connected with the church and from the wider community attended the launch which took place in Clermont Campus and which heralds the start of the church's 200th anniversary celebrations.

The history of Nun's Cross Church dates back to its medieval foundation in 1179 AD. The new church, completed in 1817 contains an

astonishing array of 'treasures' outstanding not only for their quality but also for their diversity and interest. Home to a rich collection of items in wood, stone and marble which have direct links to the great international revival of design and artistic craftsmanship known as the Arts & Crafts Movement (c.1885–c.1925), the church is also fortunate to possess a unique and important collection of stained glass executed by leading international artists Michael O'Connor, Charles Emer Kempe and Catherine O'Brien (An Tur Gloine). Links to the political (Sir Roger Casement) and literary (John Millington Synge) scenes are also present and discussed.

Officially launching the book, Archbishop Jackson said a debt of gratitude was owed to Patricia Butler for tremendous work she put into envisioning the book. "The fact that you are all here shows the affection in which you hold Nun's Cross Church, for its historical continuity, its historical innovation, the importance of the site and the way in which it has been used as a place of worship for centuries. The building draws us into the totality and complexity of our own history in Ireland. The architect of the building was associated with the building of the GPO. Then there is the relationship with Roger Casement and his family. Artistically and aesthetically we find ourselves with the best locally, nationally and internationally," he said.

Patricia, who is a parishioner of Nun's Cross as well as being a distinguished art historian, thanked all associated with bringing the book to publication. She described the treasurers to be found in the church and said, "This church is not only a focal point for worship but also an art gallery open for all to enjoy".

Vicar of Killiskey, the Revd Ken Rue, paid tribute to the parish's bicentenary committee and thanked Patricia Butler for working diligently for two years on producing the book. He also acknowledged the support of Wicklow County Council's 1916–2016 fund and the sponsors of the launch event. He said there would be many bicentenary events taking place during 2017. The parish hopes to hold some joint events with Ashford Parish which celebrates its 100th anniversary next year.

Dean of Liverpool to lead Advent preparation for Connor clergy

The Very Rev Pete Wilcox, Dean of Liverpool, will be the guest speaker at a pre-Advent Quiet

Morning hosted by the Bishop of Connor, the Rt Rev Alan Abernethy.

This takes place in Lisburn Cathedral on Thursday November 10, running from 10am until lunch at 1pm.

Dean Wilcox trained at Ridley Hall in Cambridge after completing a degree in modern history at Durham University. He served as a curate on Teesside, and then studied for a doctorate at Oxford University, before returning to the Durham Diocese to serve as a team vicar in the Parish of Gateshead.

During this time he assisted in the training of ordinands at Cranmer Hall as Director of its Urban Mission Centre. Theological education and training remains a key area of interest for Pete, and bible teaching is his chief passion.

In 1998 he took up a new position as priest in charge of St Paul's Church at the Crossing in Walsall – an ambitiously re-ordered town centre church combining the leadership of a Christian Social Enterprise with that of a thriving congregation. He established a mandated ministry leadership team there, committed to empowering and facilitating the contribution of the whole people of God in mission. Between August 2006 and July 2012 he was Canon Chancellor at Lichfield Cathedral, a post which involved oversight of the Cathedral's work in education and outreach.

He is married to a writer, Catherine Fox. They have two adult sons. The Dean is a fan of all ball sports, and follows the fortunes of Newcastle United especially closely. He is the author of three books: 'Living the Dream' (2007), 'Walking the Walk (2009) and 'Talking the Talk' (2011).

Dean Wilcox will lead two sessions at the Quiet Morning. The first is entitled Lamentations in Advent: The cry of those who suffer violence. The second is Revelation in Advent: The fate of those who perpetrate violence. There will be an opportunity for questions at the end of both sessions.

Bishop 'shells out the shillings' for Tuam clergy conference

TKA Annual Clergy Conference took place between the 12th and 14th October.

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A participant reports - "The venue this year was the excellent Armada Hotel at Spanish Point in County Clare. As we pulled into the hotel car park we were greeted by a stunning view over Spanish Point Bay with it's golden strand as the sun sparkled with autumnal gentleness on the diamond-chip waters.

"The conference of 2016 was the first time that spouses had been invited to join the clerical gathering. This added a new dimension to every aspect of the conference: from chit-chat over excellent meals to insights during the more formal sessions.

"Two speakers addressed us during the couple of days. Alison Rooke led our thoughts on 'Rectory Life: Reality and Expectations'. Bishop Kenneth Kearon chose the subject of 'The Anglican Communion ' as his topic and brought his wealth of experience of the Communion to the table.

"Sandwiched between these sessions was the Clergy Book Club during which ' A Thousand Splendid Suns' by Khaled Hosseini (a book chosen by Archdeacon Alan Synnott) was discussed, debated, praised and piloried. The final opinion was that this book had certainly touched nerves and drawn reaction!

"Conference was, of course, punctuated throughout by worship. This was organised and led by Revd Jennifer McWhirter. And we must thank Revd Bob Hanna for allowing us to use his stunning little church in Spanish Point for the Thursday morning celebration of the Eucharist.

"Our get-together was not by any means all stodge, formality and seriousness. A trip was organised to the magnificent Cliffs of Moher by way of 'The Rock Shop' (the latter insisited on by those who felt the need for retail therapy). Again mother sun shone on us as we peered over the protective wall at the edge of vertigo-inducing vistas. 'Society is marginalising the elderly,' Pope tells audience of grandparents

The Pope has warned that the elderly are at risk of being marginalised in a "harmful throwaway culture".

In front of an audience of about 7,000 grandmothers and grandfathers in the Vatican's Paul VI hall, Pope Francis said: "It's necessary to oppose the harmful throwaway culture, which marginalises the elderly, believing them to be unproductive."

The Pope described older generations as "the roots and memory of a people," which make them "a precious treasure". He went on to say that the church looks upon older people "with affection, recognition and great esteem," as they are an "essential part of the Christian community and society."

In the address on 15 October, Pope Francis urged grandparents to "talk to your grandchildren. Let them ask you questions."

In a world where "strength and appearance are often idealised, you have the mission of witnessing to the values that truly count and that always remain," he said. "Older people can offer an important witness that no matter how hard things get, one must never lose faith in God and in a better future."

The event was held in belated celebration of Grandparent's Day, held in Italy on October 2, the feast of the Guardian Angels.

He was instituted by the Bishop of Connor, the Rt Rev Alan Abernethy. Preacher at the service was the Rt Rev Ferran Glenfield, Bishop of Kilmore, Elphin and Ardagh. Eddie grew up in Lisburn and was a member of Lisburn Cathedral when called to Ordination in 1984. He did his training at the Church of Ireland Theological Institute in Dublin and in 1987 was ordained in Connor Diocese.

He served his first curacy in Ballymena (1987-90) and a second curacy in Knockbreda, Diocese of Down and Dromore (1990-92). In 1992 Eddie returned to Connor Diocese as rector of Upper Falls, Belfast, and in 1997 moved to Milltown Parish in Armagh Diocese. He remained rector there until 2003 when he moved to Dublin as Superintendent of Irish Church Missions and senior pastor of Immanuel Church. Eddie is married to Hazel, and they have three children, David who is an occupational therapist based in London, Andrew who is training in physiotherapy in Aberdeen and Anna, currently studying music at Maynooth. Eddie said he and Hazel were delighted to 'come home' to Lisburn and to Connor. "We really enjoyed our time in Dublin," he said. "Immanuel Parish has been very different from any parish I have been in before with a lot of training, church planting and other things, but I feel very happy to be coming back to Connor and to parish life and to maybe doing some of the things I have learned here in my new parish."

Eddie's main hobby is supporting Manchester United. "I am a great fan. My late dad, who was also Eddie, was Chief Scout for Manchester United in Northern Ireland through the Alex Ferguson years," he revealed!
