



Archbishop Justin and Pope Francis will have their third formal meeting in Rome this week.

Archbishop of Canterbury to visit Pope in Rome

Archbishop Justin Welby and Pope Francis will be celebrating 50 years of closer ties between the Anglican and Roman Catholic churches. The Archbishop of Canterbury will meet the Pope in Rome next week as part a week-long summit in Canterbury and Rome to mark 50 years of closer and deeper relationships between the Anglican Communion and Roman Catholic Church. During the week, bishops from both Churches will look ahead to opportunities for greater unity.

The meeting will be Archbishop Justin and Pope Francis' third formal meeting since they were installed within a week of each other in 2013.

The highlight of the visit will be a service at the church of San Gregorio al Cielo jointly led by Archbishop Justin Welby and Pope Francis. The Sistine Chapel Choir will be joined by the choir of Canterbury Cathedral. This service, at 6pm on October 5, will also see the commissioning of 19 pairs of Anglican and Roman Catholic bishops from around the world to work together in joint mission. The bishops have been chosen by IARCCUM – the International Anglican Roman Catholic Commission on Unity and Mission.

The monastery church of San Gregorio is uniquely suited to such an occasion. The prior of the monastery was St Augustine, sent by the

Pope in 597 to evangelise England. More recently, San Gregorio sent its ancient relic, the head of the crozier of St Gregory the Great, to Canterbury for the Primates' Gathering and Meeting in January 2016. It was a symbol of prayer and support for the Archbishop and the Anglican Communion.

Archbishop Justin Welby will be joined in Rome by the Community of St Anselm, the monastic-inspired community for young Christians from across the world and different denominations, which he founded at Lambeth Palace in 2015. The community will be on retreat in Rome and will participate in and contribute to shared acts of prayer and worship during the celebrations.

Prior of the Community of St Anselm, the Revd Anders Litzell, said: "We count it a blessing and a sign to be traveling to Rome to participate in — and celebrate — the work of unity and sisterhood between our churches, which the Spirit has been bringing to increasing fruition over many years. As a Community, we are committed to praying for, and embodying, unity in the Holy Spirit and in the bond of peace across the Body of Christ. We hope that this milestone event shall be a sign

that brings us all to join our prayers with that of Christ, that we all shall be one."

The summit will mark the 50th anniversary of the Anglican Centre in Rome. There will be a dinner hosted by Archbishop Welby to celebrate its work. The Centre opened in 1966 with the aim of promoting Christian unity in a divided world. The Centre was established as a result of the historic meeting in Rome of Archbishop Michael Ramsey and Pope Paul VI during which the Pope presented the Archbishop with his papal ring. As a mark of their deep friendship and respect, Archbishop Welby will wear the ring when he visits Rome next month. The Archbishop will also have a private meeting with the Pope.

The Director of the Anglican centre, Archbishop David Moxon, said: "The Anglican Centre has worked for fifty years to help Roman Catholics and Anglicans work together, pray together, study and talk together. The journey we are on demands the laying-down of old fears and misconceptions of each other, and the building up of a shared story together. These celebrations mark the writing of a new chapter in the history of the Christian Church."

The week will also include the formal presentation of a book marking the 20 years of work on reconciling the two churches by the second Anglican-Roman Catholic International Commission (ARCIC II). The Commission met between 1983 and 2005. The document 'Looking Towards a Church Fully Reconciled' has been produced following a mandate from Pope Benedict and Archbishop Rowan Williams in 2009. It will be presented to the Pope and the Archbishop.

The 19 pairs of IARCUUM bishops are taking part in a summit which begins in Canterbury on Friday September 30 and ends in Rome on Friday 7 October.

The Anglican co-chair of IARCCUM, Bishop David Hamid, stressed the enormous importance of the week.


"It is an immensely significant occasion" said Bishop Hamid. "There has been such an extraordinary progress towards reconciliation between the two communions in these past fifty years that it is easy to forget just how far we have journeyed together as sisters and brothers in Christ. The common faith we have discovered through our years of dialogue now compels us to act together, sharing in Christ's mission in the world".

Retirement of Bishop MacDaid of Clogher

Pope Francis has accepted the resignation of Bishop Liam MacDaid, Bishop of Clogher, due to ill health. The announcement was made last Saturday 1 October 2016.



A statement by the Diocese of Clogher said, "Some months ago Bishop Liam MacDaid, on medical advice, wrote to Pope Francis requesting him to accept his early retirement as Bishop of Clogher due to ill-health...

The statement continued, "Bishop Liam has always been very keen to communicate with the people of the diocese, whether through visits to parishes or through pastoral letters. He is keen to ensure that the People of God throughout Clogher diocese should hear from him the background to his retirement, including some of the medical advice he has received, together with his reflections on diocesan life and that of the wider Church at this time. With this in mind, he has written a pastoral letter to the priests and people of the diocese which will be read at all Masses this weekend."

Bishop Liam was appointed Bishop of Clogher by Pope Benedict XVI on 6 May 2010, in succession to Bishop Joseph Duffy who is now bishopemeritus. Bishop Liam was subsequently ordained on 25 July 2010 in Saint Macartan's Cathedral in Monaghan.

Paying tribute to Bishop MacDaid, Archbishop Eamon Martin, the Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland, said, "I wish to express my deep gratitude to Bishop Liam MacDaid whose resignation as Bishop of Clogher was accepted by Pope Francis today on grounds of ill health. Bishop MacDaid has been a valued member of the Episcopal Conference since his ordination as Bishop of Clogher in 2010. His gentle pastoral wisdom, his warm concern for others and his genuine dedication to furthering the mission of

the Church was evident in his fidelity to the work of the Conference.

"In particular, I salute Bishop Liam's generous contribution to ACCORD Catholic Marriage Care, his work with the Council for Marriage and the Family of the Episcopal Conference, and his commitment to the religious publisher Veritas.

"Conscious of the horrific extent of injury and loss of human life on our roads, Bishop Liam has been a compassionate and tireless advocate for greater road safety awareness across the island, and in particular amongst young people.

"One of the highlights of Bishop Liam's episcopal ministry was his hosting in June 2012 of the Papal Legate, Cardinal Marc Ouellet, on the pilgrimage island of Lough Derg as part of the 50th International Eucharistic Congress in Ireland. It was a profoundly moving experience for all involved.

"I look forward to our continued friendship in the years ahead and I pray God's blessing on Bishop Liam, assuring him of our prayerful good wishes for his health at this time and in the future."

Moderator welcomes peaceful resolution in North Belfast

The Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, Rt. Rev. Dr. Frank Sellar, has welcomed Saturday morning's completion of the return parade by three Ligoniel lodges as a result of the recent negotiated agreement between the lodges and local residents in North Belfast. Dr. Sellar also welcomed the peaceful nature of the preceding protest parade by some residents opposed to the Twaddell Avenue agreement.

"Today has been a watershed moment for North Belfast and the community in and around Twaddell Avenue in particular. Given the tensions involved and violence that repeatedly marked this event in the past, what took place this morning brings with it genuine hope for the future.

"I appreciate that not everyone in the community agreed with what has taken place today. I respect that and welcome the peaceful nature of their protest that preceded the return parade to Ligoniel Orange Hall. "For many in the area, this particular chapter is now closed and I hope what has transpired becomes as a catalyst for a new beginning in inter-community relations. Just as the agreement took dedication, patience and persistence of all involved, I urge that the same energy now be invested in the coming weeks, months and years to the strengthening of relationships in the area. For this reason, and not minimising the challenges ahead, I give thanks for what took place today and the hope, I believe, it signifies for the future," Dr. Sellar said.

Book launch 'Space for Grace: Stories from the Catholic Chaplaincy at Queen's University'

"Space for Grace: Stories from the Catholic Chaplaincy at Queen's University Belfast", published by Shanway Press is the first book from Dominic O'Reilly of Newcastle, County Down. hear from those who are deeply involved in the life of the Church at present (while working within their own respective fields). Listen to those who have been among the staffers of a university setting such as Dr Gaven Kerr, Lady Brenda McLaughlin, the current Vice Chancellor at QUB Prof Patrick Johnston and others. There is also word from artists such as Andrea Begley, The Priests and more. Not forgetting phenomenal contributions from the chaplains themselves; Bishop Patrick Walsh, Monsignor Ambrose Macauley, Bishop Anthony Farquhar, Fr Joe Gunn and Fr Gary Toman.

Discipleship at core of diocesan life, Bishop Pat Storey

Bishop Pat Storey highlighted discipleship as being at the core of diocesan life. She made her remarks during her Presidential address at the Meath and Kildare (Church of Ireland) diocesan synod. This met on Saturday 1 October in the new parish centre in Dunboyne.

The dioceses of Meath and Kildare has set itself three priorities in the coming years. Bishop Pat spoke of the three priorities during her address. These included:

- Encouraging personal discipleship.
- Developing and encouraging ministry
- Taking initiatives to meet practical need, to serve others

These priorities aim to bring the diocesan vision statement into reality - 'Together in God's love transforming lives'.

She talked of the importance of action when we set goals and priorities. She encouraged synod members by highlighting the various actions that are already being taken across the dioceses to see the goals become reality. These include

plans for the use of the 'Pilgrim' course in every across the dioceses in 2017. This is an Anglican course already used to great effect across these islands.

Pope prays for Middle East peace with Chaldean Catholics

At a brief prayer service with Chaldean Catholics in Georgia, Pope Francis has pleaded with God to grant peace to persecuted Christians and the victims of war, especially in Syria and Iraq.

With 300 people squeezed into the small Chaldean Church of St Simon the Tanner, Pope Francis joined representatives of the Chaldean community who have lived in Georgia for generations, but also most of the Chaldean Church's bishops, who came from Iraq, Syria and throughout the Middle East to pray with the Pope.

Chaldean bishops and donors from the United States also were present. They provided much of the money to build the Church of St Simon, which was consecrated in 2009.

Patriarch Louis Sako of Baghdad led the formal prayers, which were chanted in Aramaic.

Pope Francis did not preach at the service, but recited a prayer composed for the occasion, asking the crucified Jesus to free humanity from "every division and evil" and to bring about his "kingdom of justice, joy and peace".

"Save the victims of injustice and maltreatment from their suffering," he prayed.

Anglican Church of Southern Africa votes against blessings for samesex couples

The Anglican Church of Southern Africa has rejected a proposal to allow "prayers of blessing" to be offered for people in same-sex civil unions under South African law.

In a statement released on Friday evening Archbishop Thabo Makgoba said 16 bishops voted against the proposal while six were in favour.

Sixty-two percent of the lay representatives to the synod (church council) voted against the proposal, while 55% of the clergy also voted against it.

The vote was taken by the church's top legislative body, the provincial synod, following a proposal which was brought by the Diocese of Saldanha Bay – which stretches from the northern suburbs of Cape Town to the Namibian border.

Before announcing the results to the church, which includes Anglicans in Angola, Lesotho, Mozambique, Namibia, South Africa, Swaziland and on the island of St Helena, Makgoba said the process had left a "palpable pain" within the church.

+++ Cork schools service - More than 500 pupils and teachers from primary schools all over the Diocese of Cork, Clovne and Ross gathered in St Peter's Church, Bandon, with the clergy of the Diocese and the Bishop, the Right Reverend Dr Paul Colton, on Thursday, 29th September to celebrate the start of a new school year. There are 20 Church of Ireland primary schools in the Diocese all, except one, under the patronage of the Bishop. At the start of the service each school introduced themselves by ringing their school bell and bringing their school banner to the front of the church where they were displayed in the chancel for the duration of the Service. During the the Service the children gathered in the centre aisle to watch a puppet show mime, performed by the pupils of the Model School in Dunmanway, which illustrated the reading –

Matthew 7.24-28 – about the wise man who built his house on rock. A collection from each school was presented towards the new Cork, Cloyne and Ross Diocesan partnership, in cooperation with Bishops' Appeal and Christian Aid, with the Anglican Church in Burundi, which is working towards improving maize production alongside farmers there.
