Nominations for The King's Award for Voluntary Service open today



Five white crosses were set in a Co Monaghan bog as a gathering took place to mark the International Day of the Disappeared.

Relatives of those still missing and found travelled to Bragan Bog, where a new search is currently ongoing for the

remains of Tyrone man Columba McVeigh, abducted, murdered and buried in 1975. Thousands of people gather in various parts of the world for the annual International Day of the Disappeared, organised here by the Wave Trauma Centre.

The five white crosses represent Mr McVeigh, Joe Lynskey, Seamus Maguire, Robert Nairac and Lisa Dorrian.

Irishwoman kidnapped in Haiti is released along with seven other hostages

An Irishwoman and seven other people kidnapped in Haiti earlier this month have been released, the Republic's deputy premier Simon Harris has said.

Gena Heraty, who is from Westport in Co Mayo, was one of eight hostages, including a three-year-old child, who were kidnapped from an orphanage in Kenscoff on August 3.

Ms Heraty oversees the orphanage, which is run by the humanitarian organisation Nos Petits Freres et Soeurs (Our Little Brothers and Sisters).

Tanaiste Mr Harris said he was delighted to confirm the release of Ms Heraty and her fellow hostages.

"We warmly welcome the news that Gena and all of the Haitian nationals taken captive on August 3, including a small child, have been released and are reported to be safe and well," he said.

In a statement released by Ireland's Department of Foreign Affairs, Ms Heraty's family said: "We are so delighted to be able to share that Gena, and all those taken with her, have been released following their kidnapping on August 3, 2025 from the St Helene property in Kenscoff, Haiti.

"We are relieved beyond words. We are so deeply grateful to everyone, in Haiti and internationally, who has worked

tirelessly over these terrible weeks to help secure their safe return.

"In particular we would like to acknowledge the support of Tanaiste Simon Harris, Minister for Foreign Affairs and Trade and his team at the Department of Foreign Affairs, including Geraldine Byrne Nason, ambassador of Ireland to the United States of America.

"The global outpouring of concern, love, prayers and solidarity shown for Gena and to us by friends, neighbours, communities, colleagues, and indeed those with no connection to us at all has been a huge source of comfort and support.

"For now our priority is Gena — her health, protection and privacy — and those in her care. We kindly ask that the media respect the need for privacy as all those involved recover from this traumatic ordeal.



"We continue to hold Haiti in our hearts and hope for peace and safety for all those who are affected by the ongoing armed violence and insecurity there."

Post-Brexit constitutional situation rocks Northern Ireland from one crisis to another says leader of the Royal Black Institution

The leader of the Royal Black Institution has claimed the "country is being overrun" while speaking out against political instability and the Windsor Framework.

In a speech marking the end of the official marching season at the Last Saturday parade in Cookstown, the Reverend William Anderson decried the political and social landscape.

Addressing a crowd of several thousand people, he said: "Unless you live in a parallel universe, you can't help but wonder what is going on in our world today.

"We struggle from one crisis to the next, we no longer trust our political leaders, our country is being overrun, and our national government lacks the will to deal with our problems.

"The biggest casualty is trust... (which creates) an air of hopelessness".

Up to 17,000 members of the Royal Black were on parade at six major locations across Northern Ireland, including


Antrim, Castlederg, Cookstown, Ballyclare, Dundrum and Limavady.

Thousands of supporters turned out across the venues to watch the parades, which involved around 350 preceptories and 300 marching bands, according to the institution.

As part of his speech in Cookstown, Rev Anderson also criticised the post-Brexit constitutional situation and warned King Charles II he must uphold the Protestant faith to retain

the support of the Black. manoeuvring

He continued: "Why does our national government persist in allowing a foreign power to make laws over this part of the United Kingdom? It is a question that goes unanswered, unless you examine closely the political manoeuvring

that is going on in the background to remove us as citizens of the United Kingdom.

"There is simply no economic gain, no political gain for such a plan, yet we rock from one crisis to another, which only creates more instability, at a time when the nation is crying out for stability.

"Our hope for a stable future lies within the United Kingdom and not in some hybrid state, wobbling from one crisis to another.

"Leadership requires resolve, firmness in decision-making and a true upholding of that which we promised to uphold.

"Our king has resolved to uphold the Protestant faith, and that should be the guiding principle of his reign.

"If he keeps that as his focus, then he can be assured of our support." Pictures from the Last Saturday parade in Antrim Rev Anderson also encouraged people to find hope in Christianity.

He said: "Our biggest problem is that we talk the talk, but we don't walk the walk.

"Today, more than ever, we need to turn to God, set aside our foolish ways and plead with Him to save us from our sins and, in so doing, save our nation.

"Today, may I urge you to turn to God, to seek his forgiveness."


Her legacy is one of compassion, excellence, and tireless support for both students and staff. She will be missed.




BRA celebrates 240 years

An Illustrated Talk: "Belfast Royal Academythe School and the City" Tuesday 9th September 2025



This will take place at 7pm in the Lower Sixth study area. After the talk, which should last approximately 45 minutes, refreshments will be served by members of FOTA.




This talk is open to all members of the BRA community including former pupils, former staff and Governors.
