


Image of the day - New York's citadel of singing



Journey towards Irish unity won't lead to violence: Archbishop Eamon Martin

The leader of the Catholic Church in Ireland has said he does not believe that a move towards Irish unification would inevitably lead to violence, James McNaney writes in the Belfast Telegraph

In an interview with the Daily Mail, Archbishop Eamon Martin added that he understands the pain to victims of the Troubles caused by the memorialising of political violence.

The Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of all Ireland also said he feels it is "a pity" that the Irish government has not made Irish unity "an issue for conversation".

Archbishop Martin reiterated his previously declared support for Irish unification, as well as his belief in the importance of dialogue with Protestants and unionists.

He rejected the notion that conversations about or campaigns for reunification would definitely cause a return to violence.

"Right across Ireland at the moment, there's an increased



level of violence. Violence can easily be hijacked and used for purposes,"

"You've mentioned how extreme groups, even today, are already fomenting violence on the streets over various social issues, and I think that there they can be easily

hijacked for old causes.

"Again, it is true also that, for example, loyalists and indeed, republicans will celebrate and commemorate their, inverted commas, heroes of the past, which can be upsetting to people who were hurt and who had, maybe people who were murdered, who were killed, who were injured during the Troubles.

"I think you're right in saying that there is indeed a threat of violence, whether or not the issue of the border would give cause for that.

"That's why the conversations, the reflection, because we do have, sadly, a history of return to violence on this island, and what we need to do is make sure we do everything in our power to ensure that that is avoided."

The Archbishop also said that while he does not believe the Church would implore congregants to vote for a particular outcome on a border poll, it would still have a voice on the issue.

He also expressed disappointment in how the government in Dublin has approached the topic of Irish unity.

"I personally feel that It's a pity that the southern government has not made this more of an issue for conversation.

"There's almost this sense we'll keep pushing it, pushing it out there."

Bishops' joint plea over proposed Enniskillen hospital clinic closure

Church of Ireland and Roman Catholic bishops have joined voices in a bid to save an emergency hospital clinic from closure in Enniskillen, Billy Kennedy writes in the News Letter

Rev Dr Ian Ellis, the Church of Ireland's bishop of Clogher, and the Rev Larry Duffy, Roman Catholic bishop of Clogher, have expressed "deep concern" in a joint statement at the proposed closure of the emergency surgery services at South West Acute Hospital (SWAH).

They echoed concerns already raised by the Fermanagh Christian leaders' fraternal, that vulnerable patients are finding they are unable to travel to the next-nearest emergency unit in Londonderry city, 55 miles distant through three counties – Fermanagh, Tyrone and Londonderry.

"We live in one of the most remote parts of Northern Ireland and we both believe our communities have a right to equal treatment to other areas of the province," the bishops said. "We express our deep concern at the potential permanent withdrawal of vital services from parishioners resident in Co Fermanagh and surrounding areas, where there is poor public transport and inadequate travel links to alternative hospitals."

Emergency services at SWAH were temporarily suspended in December 2022, which local campaigners say posed a

risk to life. The bishops have called for a greater consultation process before any permanent closure goes ahead.

The statement sent to local campaign group, 'Save Our Acute Services' (SOAS), by the bishops asserts: "We too express our deep concern at the potential permanent withdrawal of vital services from parishioners resident in Co Fermanagh and surrounding areas, where there is poor

public transport and inadequate travel links to alternative hospitals."

Highlighting the rural nature of the region, they emphasise that local communities deserve equal access to healthcare services comparable to those available in more central areas of Northern



Ireland. "We live in one of the most remote parts of Northern Ireland and believe our communities have a right to equal treatment to other areas of the province."

The bishops call for a "more genuine consultation" process, involving local community leaders and those directly impacted by the proposed changes. They urge health authorities to provide acute services that reflect the real needs of the population in the region.

"We believe our communities should be provided with access to appropriate and expert surgical care within easy



reach of where we live," the statement adds.

As Christian leaders, the bishops stress the importance of health care that attends to the whole person — body, mind, and spirit — with health care provision that supports "life"

in all its fullness". They conclude by appealing for a swift resolution to the issue: "The continued uncertainty adds further worry and inconvenience to people in the area."

The proposed closure has evoked widespread concern among residents and campaigners in Northern Ireland's western region, with many fearing that losing emergency surgery at the SWAH would put lives at risk due to lengthy travel times to other hospitals.

Orange Victims Day - Tullyvallen remembers

On this Orange Victims Day we remember our band members past and present, as well as their families who have been impacted by the actions of terrorists in this country, writes Tullyvallen Guiding Star Temperance LOL 630 -

Tullyvallen Guiding Star Temperance LOL 630 suffered the loss of seven members over a seven month period of 1975 and 1976. Five of these men were members or past members of our band, James McKee J.P., Ronnie McKee, Nevin McConnell, William Herron and William Meaklim. Current and past members were also survivors of the attack on Tullyvallen Orange Hall.

Today (Monday) marks the 50th Anniversary on the attack on Tullyvallen Orange Hall which resulted in five lodge members being murdered, James McKee J.P. W.M., Ronnie McKee, Nevin McConnell Sec., John Johnston Chaplain, and William Herron.



Willam Meaklim had been murdered just two weeks prior in August 1975. Joseph McCullough Chap. was murdered in February 1976.

This evening the band will be taking part in the Memorial Service at Tullyvallen Orange Hall to remember these men, their families and all others impacted. Please remember them in your prayers.
