
The Church was beautifully decorated with floral arrangements by Delene Saunderson who also helped the parish ladies with impressive creations.


Limerick Culture Night Intercultural Walk

Cathedral Calls

10 years since the death of Sir David Willcocks.

John Rutter writes:

Sir David Willcocks transformed my life. I met him in 1965 at the height of his illustrious career: he was director of the Choir of King's College, Cambridge, conductor of The Bach Choir, co-editor of the renowned Carols for Choirs, and acknowledged leader in his generation of the choral renaissance in Britain and beyond.

I was a member of his harmony and counterpoint class at Cambridge, he took an interest in my fledgling compositions and recommended me to the publisher I have been with ever since. He encouraged me to write my first large-scale work The Falcon and conducted the première in 1969, then invited me to co-edit the second and three subsequent volumes of Carols for Choirs.

For years afterwards he continued to champion my work, giving me support, friendship and tactful mentoring, opening up opportunities for me wherever he could.

I am just one of innumerable musicians who owe their careers to his inspirational example and generous encouragement. I still miss him.

The Girls' Choir at St Peter's took their rehearsal into the cathedral gallery as they prepared to sing at their first Mass back on Sunday. Their voices rising through the space promised a beautiful return.





Barcelona's Sagrada Familia set to become Europe's tallest church

Barcelona's Sagrada Familia is set to become Europe's tallest Christian church with the imminent completion of its central tower, dedicated to Jesus Christ.

The milestone marks a historic moment in the life of the basilica, which has been under construction since 1882.

The central tower, expected to be finished by the end of this year or early 2026, will stand at 172 metres, surpassing Germany's Ulmer Münster, currently the tallest Christian church in Europe at 162 metres.

"It is remarkable that in the 21st century we are building a cathedral," said Xavier Martínez, general director of the Sagrada Familia Foundation.

Designed by devout Catholic architect Antoni Gaudí, the basilica is rich in Christian symbolism throughout its structure. The central tower will be crowned with a cross and surrounded by five other towers, honouring Mary and the four evangelists.

The church, consecrated by Pope Benedict XVI in 2010, remains unfinished, with ongoing work on its interior and facades. The foundation hopes to complete the entire structure within a decade.

Next year marks the 100th anniversary of Gaudí's death. The basilica has invited Pope Leo XIV to celebrate a solemn Mass in his honour on 10th June.

Last year, 4.9 million people visited the Sagrada Familia, making it one of the most prominent sites of Christian pilgrimage and architectural devotion in the world.

Hounding Humphreys about Orange parade a bad look for Irish unity - Suzanne Breene in Sunday Life

It's impossible to be sincere and serious about Irish unity and then hound Heather Humphreys over whether she attended Orange Order parades and her husband's membership of the institution.

The Fine Gael presidential candidate has been questioned about her presence at the annual event in her home village of Drum in Co Monaghan.

There was talk by some media of her husband's "secret" Orange Order past. It doesn't matter whether Eric Humphreys was a member many decades ago or is still going to lodge meetings.

It is equally irrelevant whether the event his wife attended was a parade or a picnic. Republicanism at its very core should be inclusive and accepting of the Orange tradition.

From some accounts you'd think Humphreys had skipped down the Garvaghy Road hand-in-hand with Ian Paisley and David Trimble in 1995.

The men and women taking part in the event in Drum are not marching where they're not wanted or rubbing their neighbours' nose in anything. This is not a show of supremacism.

The Irish flag displays three equal sized bands of green, white and orange: it is not a hierarchical structure. It represents the two traditions on this island and the desire for peace between them in a republic.

The tricolour was brought over from Paris in 1848 by Thomas Francis Meagher who had travelled to France to learn about revolution. It first flew that year in south Tipperary when Meagher and his comrades attempted their own unsuccessful rebellion.

Their death sentences for treason were commuted to transportation to Van Diemen's land. The tricolour was rarely seen again in public until the Easter Rising in 1916 when it was raised over the GPO.

Those who have a problem with Protestants in a small Co Monaghan village don't reflect republicanism, its history or ideals.

Focusing on Humphreys' attendance at an Orange parade or picnic is also a complete waste of time when there are so many other issues to grill her on.

She should be challenged on her party's record in government — particularly on housing — and what concrete action it proposes as Israel continues its genocide in Gaza, because carefully crafted statements are not enough.

Humphreys should also be quizzed about her handling of a whistleblower allegation while in the Department of Justice; her previous opposition to bans on fox hunting and hare

coursing; and her intervention in an alleged animal cruelty case before it was dropped.

She needs taken to task on the reasons she gave for retiring from the Dáil. "We give all we can for as long as we can but time catches up on us all," she said last year.

"As I get older my health and energy levels are not what they were and I know going forward that I would not be able to give the job the time and commitment it deserves."

Now "everything has changed" and "the tank is full again". It's amazing how the prospect of a €250,000 salary and the chance of living in splendour in Áras an Uachtaráin can recharge the batteries.

Sinn Fein's support has breathed new life into Catherine Connolly's campaign. She is a very substantial candidate who will have an opportunity to shine in the TV debates. Yet there may be a silver lining for republicans if the Fine Gael candidate is elected.

DUP leader Gavin Robinson used the focus on her background to declare that Irish unity would be disastrous for his community. "You tell me unionists would be accepted when they can't even accept a former Irish government minister who has Orange heritage," he said.

But if Humphreys becomes the 10th Irish president, then that argument will be turned on its head. She would be the third person from a Protestant background to hold the office, following Douglas Hyde (the first president) and Erskine Childers (the fourth).

The Fine Gael candidate isn't someone who will be personally pushing for Irish unity but, if she wins, expect the symbolism of her victory to be employed by those who are committed to constitutional change. 21/09/2025.
