The highest high church

Perched 400 feet above street level in the steeple of the Chicago Temple Building, the Sky Chapel was established



in 1952 as a gift from the Walgreen family in memory of Charles Walgreen, founder of the Walgreens pharmacy chain.

It belongs to the First United Methodist Church of Chicago, the city's oldest Christian congregation, which dates back to 1831.

The chapel is renowned as the world's highest worship space and features 16 stained glass windows that narrate





biblical stories and the history of Christianity across continents. Its carved altar depicts Jesus overlooking Chicago, mirroring the main sanctuary's image of Jesus watching over Jerusalem, symbolizing the church's spiritual connection to both its urban home and sacred tradition



A new Strategic Plan for Changing Attitude Ireland was adopted as Changing Attitude Ireland AGM was held at St John the Baptist Church, Clontarf, Dublin.

From supporting parishes to become Open and Welcoming Congregations, to helping diocesan synods pass motions of inclusion, to hosting high-profile conferences and Pride services, CAI has demonstrated that steady, grassroots change can reshape the church and wider society.

Public attitudes towards LGBTQIA+ people in Ireland have shifted markedly, and within the Church of Ireland, visible signs of inclusion have emerged, yet conservative resistance remains strong. The next three years represent an opportunity for CAI to consolidate its achievements, broaden its influence, and build resilience for the future. By combining visibility, advocacy, and relationship-building with a strong focus on care and sustainability, CAI can continue to change the Church of Ireland from within. Above all, the Strategic Plan reaffirms our vision: a Church of Ireland that fully affirms and celebrates LGBTQIA+ people, offering a witness of welcome, justice, and love to the wider world.

Letter from Irish Church leaders on recent government UK-Ireland Legacy Framework

Church leaders have said - "All who have interest in how justice and truth can best be served must closely consider UK-Ireland Legacy Framework documents."

A letter from John McDowell, Eamon Martin, Dr Trevor Gribben, Alan Wardlow, Sarah Groves states -

The Church Leaders Group (Ireland) welcomes the fact that substantial proposals on how to deal with the legacy of the past in Northern Ireland have been issued.

We urge that the Legacy Framework documents be closely considered by all who have an interest in how justice and truth can best be served. Above all, we owe it to the victims and survivors to ensure that their needs are met with compassion and thoroughness.

It is noteworthy that the Legacy Framework is the result of cooperation between the government of the United Kingdom and the government of Ireland and will require legislation in both jurisdictions for it to be put into effect.

Just as importantly, it will need the continued cooperation and good will of both governments and of all of us to carry it forward.

Like other groups in wider society, we will examine and consider the framework in greater detail over the weeks

ahead, together, and in our individual denominations. In doing so we will continue to support and pray for all victims and survivors who have waited for decades with great dignity and patience for helpful structures to be put in place.

Addressing the legacy of the past remains a complex, yet vital, responsibility for all of us on these islands.

While no framework or legislation will by itself achieve reconciliation, it can open the path to ongoing restoration of relationships and building of trust.

In the course of a wide-ranging discussion, topics considered included:

These meetings are held as part of an Irish response to the request some years ago from the International Anglican Roman Catholic Commission for Unity and Mission

(IARCCUM) that there should be regular meetings between Anglican and Roman Catholic bishops in countries where both share a parallel diocesan structure. The next such gathering will take place in Maynooth in September 2026.

Archbishop 'should steer clear of immigration'

The next archbishop of Canterbury should not talk about immigration, according to a poll.

New Ipsos polling suggested 28 per cent of respondents want the next archbishop of Canterbury to talk less about political topics. Around 25 per cent said it was unacceptable for the Church of England's most senior religious leader to speak about immigration and asylum.

The next archbishop is expected to be named in the coming weeks, almost a year after Justin Welby announced his resignation. The Most Rev and Rt Hon Stephen Cottrell, the Archbishop of York who has been the stand-in while the role is vacant, recently waded into the debate on immigration, accusing Nigel Farage of an "isolationist, short term kneejerk" response to the Channel crossings crisis.

The poll, for the PA news agency, meanwhile found that less than a fifth (17 per cent) think the next archbishop should speak out more about politics. Less than two in five people

(37 per cent) felt it was acceptable for the next archbishop of Canterbury to speak about immigration.

While no shortlist of candidates has been published, one of those thought to be a favourite is the Rt Rev Dr Guli Francis-Dehqani, Bishop of Chelmsford, who is a former refugee who fled Iran with her family as a teenager in the wake of the Iranian revolution in 1980. She would be the first female archbishop of Canterbury if selected.

A committee, chaired by a former director-general of MI5, must reach a two-thirds majority decision on who should be the new archbishop, with a nomination then presented to the Prime Minister who passes it to the King.

A job description published earlier this year, stated that the person filling the role should be someone willing to be "unapologetic about offering a Christian perspective to local, national and international dialogue".

Cathedral Calls

Westminster Abbey 85th anniversary of the Battle of Britain

The heroes who fought in the Battle of Britain were commemorated in Westminster Abbey on its 85th anniversary.

A service attended by Sir Keir Starmer and his wife Lady Victoria honoured the victory of the Royal Air Force pilots and aircrew during the 1940 battle against the Luftwaffe.



The Prime Minister, who was greeted at the service by members of the RAF yesterday, said in a statement: "Today, we pause to remember the heroes of the Battle of Britain.

"Those who stood firm in the face of unimaginable odds to defend our skies, our freedoms, and our future.

"Their courage was not just a moment of military brilliance, but a profound act of national unity and resolve. We will remember them."

Before the service, wreaths were laid at the RAF Memorial by Chief of the Air Staff and Air Chief Marshal Harv Smyth.

The service, which has taken place at Westminster Abbey since 1944, included an Act of Remembrance during which the Battle of Britain Roll of Honour was borne from the Grave of the Unknown Warrior to the Sacrarium by Flight Lieutenant Bird.



They were escorted by serving descendants of Battle of Britain airmen and serving RAF aircrew from former Battle of Britain Squadrons.

The commemorations concluded with a trumpeter playing The Last Post followed by the Reveille.

In an address at the service, Royal British Legion chaplain Dr Giles Legwood said it was "worth remembering" that some Battle of Britain pilots were "immigrants who fled to Britain to join the fight for freedom, decency and tolerance."

He added: "Their difference was a strength and not a weakness. In their unity of effort, it was diversity and not uniformity which bound them together and brought them to success."

Astronaut Tim Peake also flew in a formation of Spitfires and Hurricanes as part of the commemorations, which comes after it was revealed that almost two in three people under the age of 40 do not know about the legendary battle, - considered to be one of the most significant British victories in the Second World War.

It is with great sadness that we have learned of the death of the Revd Canon Robert Deane on Sunday September 21 2025.


Our sympathy goes out to his wife Anne and daughter Sarah and all members of Robert's family, writes Dublin and Glendalough diocese.
