Cork choir prepares for Christmas

The choir of St Fin Barre's Cathedral, Cork will be giving two performances of Handel's Messiah on 9th and 10th December this year.

Youngest priest in Cork & Ross ordained in his home parish

Father Ronan Sheehan (27) was ordained a priest in Newcestown, Co Cork, by Bishop Fintan Gavin, Bishop of Cork and Ross, and he becomes the youngest priest in the diocese.

The congregation included his parents Bud and Denise Sheehan, his sisters Ciara, Leona, Orlaith and Aoibhe, and extended family.

During Father Sheehan's ordination on Sunday 18 September, Bishop Gavin spoke of the service of priesthood, "you are called to act in a unique way in the person of Christ in the Eucharist and the other sacraments. Acting in the person of Christ means that a priest can never put himself or his personal opinion at the centre of his ministry."

On the Sunday evening Father Sheehan celebrated his first Mass at Newcestown Church, the church where he received the sacraments for the first time while in school. On the following Monday evening he celebrated Mass at the second church of the parish in Farnivane where he was baptised.

Church of England bans Archbishop Tutu's daughter from officiating at her godfather's funeral

The Church of England has barred the late Archbishop Desmond Tutu's daughter from officiating at her godfather's funeral because she is in a same-sex relationship.

Mpho Tutu van Furth, an Episcopal priest, is the goddaughter of Martin Kenyon, one of the first men to take a COVID-19 vaccine in the United Kingdom. The 92-year-old died earlier this month. A friend of Archbishop Tutu, Kenyon, requested that Tutu van Furth conduct his funeral.

The Diocese of Hereford turned down the request because Tutu van Furth is in a relationship with a woman.

"We acknowledge this is a difficult situation. Advice was given in line with the House of Bishops current guidance on same sex marriage," the Diocese of Hereford told CNN in a Friday statement.

Queen Elizabeth II gave her "royal ascent" to a bill allowing same-sex marriage in England and Wales in July 2013, after months of debate in the British Parliament. The law permitted homosexual couples to marry as of March 29, 2014. However, the Church of England defines marriage as between one man and one woman and prevents ministers from carrying out same-sex marriages.

Tutu, who died in December 2021, was a pivotal figure in ending apartheid in South Africa.

Tutu van Furth, who was ordained in an Episcopal Church in Alexandria, Virginia, in 2004, stated that she believes the time has come for a change in the Church of England. The Episcopal Church, a member of the Anglican Communion, allows clergy members to engage in same-sex relationships. However, Tutu van Furth acknowledged that the denomination moves at its own pace.

"I don't know when it gets to be enough people who have been abandoned to their grief or when it gets to be enough people who have suffered enough pain that the church changes," she told CNN. "But there will be a moment."

The priest said Kenyon's daughters intended to hold the funeral at their father's place of residence at St. Michael and All Angels Church in the village of Wentnor. Kenyon lived next door and had been a member of the parish for 30 years, according to CNN.

The family opted not to entrust the funeral service to someone else and held the service in the garden of the vicarage next door.

Tutu van Furth's father, Archbishop Tutu, was ordained in the Anglican church in the 1960s and met Kenyon while alternating between London and his native South Africa in the 1960s and 1970s, according to CNN.

"My parents arrived in London in 1962. My father arrived before my mother and my father and Martin became Church News Ireland Pa

friends," Tutu van Furth said. "Martin met my mother off the boat from South Africa and when I was born in 1963 my parents asked Martin to be my godfather."

Marceline Tutu van Furth, a pediatric infectious diseases professor and Tutu van Furth's wife who lives with her in the Netherlands, called the decision to prevent the priest from leading the funeral "homophobic" in a Wednesday letter.

The professor described herself as a former atheist welcomed into a religious family through her marriage to Tutu van Furth. The letter featured a quote from her late father-in-law, who said he would not worship a "homophobic God."

Defence is love, says Pope

Pope Francis has said it is morally legitimate for nations to supply weapons to Ukraine because fighting to defend your country is "love".

He commented that self-defence is "an expression of love for the homeland".

"Self-defence is not only licit but also an expression of love for the homeland. Someone who does not defend oneself, who does not defend something, does not love it. Those who defend (something) loves it," he said.

Francis spoke out after a three-day visit to Kazakhstan where he attended a congress of religious leaders from

around the world of which Ukraine was the backdrop to the meeting.

During a 45-minute-long airborne news conference, a reporter asked if it was morally right for countries to send weapons to Ukraine.

"This is a political decision which can be moral, morally acceptable, if it is done under conditions of morality," Francis said.

Explaining the difference between when it is moral or immoral to supply weapons to another country, Francis said it can be immoral if the intention is to provoke more war, or to sell arms or to dump arms that a country no longer needs. "The motivation is what in large part qualifies the morality of this action," he added.

The Pope was asked whether Ukraine should negotiate with the country that invaded it.

"I would not exclude dialogue with any power that is at war, even if it is with the aggressor. ... Sometimes you have to carry out dialogue like this. It smells but it must be done," he said.

Boys' Brigade in NI decides to split from UK and Irish body

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The Boys' Brigade (BB) in Northern Ireland has decided to separate from the organisation in the rest of the UK and Ireland.

It one of Northern Ireland's biggest youth organisations and is connected mainly to Presbyterian churches as well as some other Protestant denominations.

The Northern Ireland branch has said it has "cultural differences" with the wider UK and Ireland organisation.

It is understood that stances on LGBT issues account for some differences.

In a statement to BBC News NI, the BB in Northern Ireland said it had decided to become a "separate autonomous body by mutual agreement".

A tribunal that could have taken away his right to practice was called off after a last-minute settlement with the NHS, but Dr Scott will have to attend a £500 one-day training course on "professional boundaries".
