# TCD C of I Chaplain travelled on Lisbon tramway before tragedy

Canon Paul Arbuthnot, C of I Chapain to Trinity College, Dublin told friends on Facebook, "I was on the exact same tram less than 24 hours ago enjoying the ride up the steep hill and taking pictures whilst on the tram."



He continued, "The Rossio and Restoradores areas were full of police and ambulances this evening.

"My hotel is on the Avenida da Liberdade and I had to walk by the scene about 20 minutes ago in order to get back to the hotel. It was a truly awful sight. Prayers for everyone caught up in this tragedy."

The following day Lisbon residents woke up to the news that at least 15 people were killed when the 140-year-old Gloria funicular derailed and crashed into a building at speed in the Portuguese capital around 18:15 local time.

Another 18 people were taken to hospital, five of them in a serious condition, according to the emergency services.

Lisbon's mayor, Carlos Moedas, has described the incident as a "tragic moment for the city" - and Portugal's government declared a national day of mourning.


But, as the city reels, big questions remain - including how the crash occurred and who was on board.

# Video - C of I Priorities Fund helps to advance God's Kingdom

In the first of a new video series introducing the work of the Church of Ireland's central committees, Roy Totten talks about how the Priorities Fund helps to advance God's Kingdom through the Church today.

Recalling its beginnings, he highlights that the First of All report to General Synod in 1977 stated that the priorities of the Church of Ireland "are spiritual not material – in other words people and not buildings."

The Priorities Fund, which gave out its first grants in 1980, continues to emphasise the priorities set by this report. The fund currently supports projects across four areas:

- Training lay and ordained
- Christian education
- Outreach initiatives
- Innovative ministry in a rural context

In 2025, the fund has provided support to 55 projects with a total allocation of €607,659 (around £529,000 at current exchange rates). In its 44 years to date, the Priorities Fund has allocated €21,672,878 in total (equivalent to around £18.8 million).



### By John Keats

Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness,
Close bosom-friend of the maturing sun;

With fruit the vines that round the thatch-eves run;
To bend with apples the moss'd cottage-trees,
And fill all fruit with ripeness to the core;
To swell the gourd, and plump the hazel shells
With a sweet kernel; to set budding more,
And still more, later flowers for the bees,
Until they think warm days will never cease,
For summer has o'er-brimm'd their clammy cells.

Who hath not seen thee oft amid thy store?
Sometimes whoever seeks abroad may find
Thee sitting careless on a granary floor,
Thy hair soft-lifted by the winnowing wind;
Or on a half-reap'd furrow sound asleep,
Drows'd with the fume of poppies, while thy hook
Spares the next swath and all its twined flowers:
And sometimes like a gleaner thou dost keep
Steady thy laden head across a brook;
Or by a cyder-press, with patient look,
Thou watchest the last oozings hours by hours.
