Thousands to attend festival of faith in Holycross Abbey

Up to 60,000 expected to participate in the nineday solemn novena at the 800-year-old Cistercian Abbey in Thurles Co Tipperary.

Thousands of people from all over the country will attend a nine-day festival of faith at Holycross Abbey in Co Tipperary later this week.

This year's Novena runs from Wednesday 8 September to Friday 16 September.

Visitors to this year's Solemn Novena at the 800year-old Cistercian Abbey in Thurles Co Tipperary, will have an opportunity to be blessed with a relic believed to be of the True Cross, which is presently situated in the ancient abbey's side altar.

Helpers in the form of stewards, caterers, musicians, singers, Eucharistic ministers, Gardaí, clergy etc have been drafted in to assist with this year's enormous event, which will see over 60,000 people pass down the abbey's aisles over the coming seven days.

Speaking this week about the Novena, Holycross parish priest Fr Tom Breen said, "After some 36 years of this annual novena, people are still bringing their own 'personal crosses' to Holycross Abbey."

"Christians currently burdened in various ways through personal health issues, finance issues,

other personal problems including difficulties in personal relationships etc are all still coming to the novena, where they listen and they gain the necessary strength to continue their personal battles, while often realising, possibly for the first time, that there are many people who are much worse off than they themselves."

"The man with no shoes very often meets the man with no feet," stated Fr Tom.

Speaking about why people attend the novena Fr Breen said, "We are aware of people who suffer in various ways in relation to health, finance, personal problems, relationships, but when they come to the Novena they listen and realise that there are worse off people than themselves."

"The abbey holds 1,000 people and we have a marquee which holds another 1,000 people who don't mind making the sacrifice of coming here every morning from 7am to attend one of the five daily sessions."

The daily novena times are 7am; 10:30am; 4.30pm; 7.30pm; 9.30pm and the Sunday times are 7am; 10.30am; 12.30pm; 2.30pm; 7.30pm; 9.30pm.

Lisburn parishioners brave the shave for Macmillan

Two parishioners of St Paul's, Lisburn, are taking the head staggers and getting their hair shaved off to raise funds for Macmillan Cancer Care.

Janet Hunter and Tina McCready both lost their mothers to cancer and are taking up the challenge of Macmillan's Brave the Shave in memory of their mums.

The two ladies will be getting a number three all over on September 24 when the Head Shave

takes place in St Patrick's RC Church, Chapel Hill, Lisburn at 7pm.

Janet, who is soon to be commissioned as a Lay Reader in St Paul's, said the results of her close shave would be on display when she attends the Diocese of Connor Synod just a few days after she goes 'under the clippers!'

"I am braving the shave in memory of my mum and for all my family and friends who are fighting cancer and those in remission," Janet said.

Her mother Annie McIlwaine died on June 3 this year and Tina's mum Betty McKay died from cancer two years ago. Both were parishioners of St Paul's.

"I am nervous about doing this, but we are doing it for a good cause, and will hopefully raise lots of money to pay for a nurse to care for a family when someone has cancer," Janet said.

"We had a lot of help from Macmillan. Having lived with the day to day care of my mother with cancer I know what the nurses go through. It is horrendous, and how they keep cheerful the whole time I do not know." Janet added: "My family think I am nuts but they are backing me 100 per cent."

2017 Holy Land Pilgrimage launched

On 3 September, Bishop Harold Miller joined former and prospective pilgrims in St Molua's, Stormont, for the launch of the 2017 Holy Land Pilgrimage and an accompanying brochure. The bishop, a former pilgrim, described his trip as, "Undoubtedly one of the most wonderful experiences of my life".

The rector of Stormont, Canon David Humphries, has been leading an annual pilgrimage for around 20 years and the Hamilton Hall was set up with an exhibition of books, artefacts and photos. Guests were also treated to a beautiful Mediterranean-style lunch prepared by ladies from the parish.

Ms Rosemary Nutt, a working Director of McCabe Travel which facilitates the pilgrimages,

flew over especially for the launch. Rosemary has been with McCabe for 20 years and as well as being responsible for Operations and Accounts, is an expert on Pilgrimage to the Holy Land. She showed a short film of the McCabe pilgrimage experience and described how the company works mainly with Christians in the Holy Land and, where possible, with family–run businesses. Archbishop of Canterbury to join Pope Francis in marking 30 years since Assisi

1986, when leaders representing 32 Christian organisations and 11 other religions converged to pray and fast together.

According to a schedule published by the Vatican, other religious leaders including Patriarch Bartholomew, Syrian Orthodox Patriarch Ignatius Aphrem II, and leaders of the Muslim, Jewish and Tendai Buddhist communities are invited to Assisi on September 20 to pray for peace. The event's theme is "Thirst for Peace: Faiths and Cultures in Dialogue".

Several victims of war will join Pope Francis and the other religious leaders at a luncheon in the Franciscan friars' convent. In the afternoon, the Pope will hold private meetings with many of the religious leaders, including Archbishop Welby and the patriarchs.

Pope Francis will participate in the concluding ceremonies of a three-day event sponsored by the Rome-based Community of Sant'Egidio. He will also participate in an ecumenical prayer service in the lower Basilica of St Francis.

After their prayer services, the Pope and religious leaders will meet in the square outside the basilica to listen to the testimony of a victim of war, to share their thoughts about peace-making and to sign a common appeal.

+++ Connor ordinations in Ballymena - St Patrick's, Ballymena, was packed for a Service of Ordination of Priests in Connor Diocese on Sunday September 4. At the service, the Rev Dennis Christie was ordained to serve as curate in the Parish of Ballymena; the Rev Aaron

McAlister to serve as curate in All Saints', Antrim; and the Rev Isobel Hawthorne-Steel to serve as curate in St Paul and St Barnabas, Belfast. Dennis served his internship in the Parish of Muckamore; Aaron in the Parish of Ballywillan (Portrush) and Isobel in the Grouped Parishes of Ahoghill and Portglenone. They were ordained on Sunday by the Bishop of Connor, the Rt Rev Alan Abernethy, who also preached.

+++ Inter church participation in Derry ordination - Scores of parishioners made the long journey from Newtonards to Londonderry on Sunday for the Ordination into the Priesthood of the Reverend Suzanne Cousins. The new curate's husband Alan was in the congregation in St Columb's Cathedral along with their daughter Rachel (one of the couple's three grown-up children). They were joined by members of the United Parishes of Moville, Donagh, Culdaff and Cloncha, where Rev Cousins will serve her curacy. The former primary school teacher, who grew up near Comber, in County Down, lived with her family in Newcastle. The local Rector there, Canon Ian Ellis, was one of Rev Cousins' sponsors. Prior to her ordination, Rev Suzanne served as Deacon Intern at St Mark's. Newtonards, while completing her full-time

training and formation for the priesthood. The Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, Rt Rev Ken Good, led the worship at Sunday's Ordination Service.
