



Bicentenary Week of Mission in St George's, Belfast

St George's is holding a mission from next Saturday, September 10th until Sunday September 18th as part of the church's 200th anniversary.

The mission will be led by a team from the Community of the Resurrection in Mirfield, churchnewsireland@gmail.com

Yorkshire. The team is made up of Fr John Gribben CR and five theological students, Sebastian Hamilton, Alex Hobbs, Philip Kennedy, Steffan Mathias and Waldermar Nion.

Fr John is originally from Willowfield in east Belfast and was ordained in the Church of Ireland in 1975. Since 1979 he has been a member of the Anglican monastic order, the Community of the Resurrection in Mirfield. The week will take the form of a teaching mission on the theme Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today and forever, with morning sessions at 10.30am Monday-Saturday (except Wednesday 14th when the session will be at 11am) and evening mission services Sunday–Friday at 7.30pm, followed by refreshments.

There will be children's events on the Saturday afternoon, September 17, from 2-4pm.

The team will be commissioned by Archbishop Alan Harper, former Archbishop of Armagh and a former Bishop of Connor, at 11am on Sunday September 11.

The rector of St George's, the Rev Brian Stewart, said: "Everyone is most warmly welcome to the

New screening in cathedral for 100-year-old Great War film

Belfast's St Anne's Cathedral will be the spectacular setting for a new screening of a 100-year-old silent film that depicts the horror of World War I. Some 20 million people saw the film, *The Battle of the Somme*, when it was released in the Autumn of 1916 – half the population of Britain at the time. It remains one of the most watched films in British cinema history – topping even Star Wars.

Next Thursday (15 September) it will be shown in the cathedral as part of the Belfast Film Festival; with a new score by Laura Rossi, commissioned by the UK's Imperial War Museum to mark the 90th anniversary 10 years ago. "Smiling awkwardly at the new-fangled cameras, troops move towards the Front in the Great War," a cathedral spokesperson said. "Their actions are far removed from the swagger and march of war films, but then this is real.

"The Battle of the Somme was different from the newsreels of the day. It took footage of actual events and turned it into a main feature with mass appeal.

"The film gave its 1916 audience an unprecedented insight into the realities of trench warfare, controversially including the depiction of dead and wounded soldiers. It shows scenes of the build-up to the infantry offensive including the massive preliminary bombardment, coverage of the first day of the battle – the bloodiest single day in Britain's military history – and depictions of the small gains and massive costs of the attack."

The footage was filmed by Geoffrey Malins and John McDowell, official cinematographers for the British government, to demonstrate the country's commitment to the First World War. It is the source of many of the most iconic images of that war.

"We are thrilled to be taking part in this UK-wide commemoration of the battle of the Somme's centenary," Belfast Film Festival director Michele Devlin said. "Cinema was at the height of its popularity in 1916, but *The Battle of the Somme* very much pushed the boundaries of silent film at that time

"St Anne's will provide a poignant backdrop to our screening, and I'm particularly looking forward to hearing the film's acclaimed score reverberating around the cathedral."

ACC Secretary General clarifies view after gay English bishop "outed"

The secretary general of the Anglican Communion, Dr Josiah Idowu-Fearon, has moved to clarify any misunderstanding among Anglican provinces around the world after news emerged at the weekend of the first English Bishop to declare that he is gay and in a relationship.

The suffragan Bishop of Grantham in the Diocese of Lincoln, the Rt Revd Nicholas

Chamberlain, told the British media he had adhered to church guidelines under which gay clergy must be celibate and cannot marry. He said his sexuality was no secret and was part of who he was — but it was his ministry that he wanted to focus on.

Dr Idowu-Fearon said: "It is clear that Bishop Nicholas has abided by the guidelines set down by the Church. In fact, his lifestyle would make him acceptable to serve the church at any time in its history. I reject the suggestion that his appointment is an 'error'.

"I do recognise that this is a sensitive area for many people whatever their convictions. It is also a difficult time for Bishop Nicholas with revelations about his private life being made public in such a dramatic way, against his will, by anonymous sources that seem to be out to make trouble.

"The Anglican Communion is a worldwide family and, like any family, we don't agree on everything," he added. "But we are committed to working together on difficult issues. I want to reassure the Communion of my commitment to what was set out at the Lambeth conference in

1998 — that human sexuality finds it full expression in marriage between a man and woman. But all baptised, faithful and believing people are loved by God and full members of the body of Christ regardless of their sexual orientation. The Anglican Communion has never made sexual orientation a condition of eligibility to hold office within the church and I reject the suggestion that it has."

By it, every friar knows that he is to not merely serve the poor, but he must be the poor."Ade Green, who is a member of the Province of Great Britain, and John Doone and CJ O'Dwyer, who are both from the Irish Province, have been with the Capuchins as postulants since September 2015. They are joined in the novitiate by Jared Jamie, a novice from South Africa.
