Services to mark 15th anniversary of 9/11 terror attacks

The fifteenth anniversary of the world's deadliest terror attack will be remembered in special

services and events in New York City this weekend. Some 2,996 people were killed in the September 11 attacks in 2001 when terrorists flew hijacked planes into New York's World Trade Centre and the Pentagon in Washington. A forth plane crashed in Shanksville, Pennsylvania, as passengers tried to regain control of the plane.

A number of events will take place at St Paul's Churchyard – part of the parish of Trinity Church, Wall Street. The chapel at St Paul's was used as a relief centre for recovery workers for almost a year after the 9/11 attacks.

The church is currently closed for refurbishment; but a number of events will take place in the churchyard,

beginning with an 8am Eucharist service which will conclude with the ringing of the Bell of Hope at precisely 8.46am EDT (12.46pm GMT), marking the time the first plane flew into the North Tower.

The Bell of Hope was a gift from the City of London to the people of New York and was presented by the Mayor of London on the first anniversary of the attacks. It has been rung every year on the anniversary of the attacks and to

mark terrorist events elsewhere in the world. The bell will be tolled in a pattern of five-strikes, repeated four times – the traditional method used by US firefighters to remember fallen colleagues.

At 2pm EDT, at Trinity Wall Street, the West Point Band and Cadet Glee Club from the US Military Academy at West Point, New York, will give a concert; including the first public performance of 15 one minute pieces created by composers on the theme of "service" and what it means to different groups of people, including military, first responders and community service.

At 3.30pm, a "Calling of the Names" ceremony will be held in St Paul's churchyard, honouring the responders, rescue and recovery workers, and volunteers. "We will call the names of those who came to help after the attacks and who have since died," Trinity Wall Street said.

At 7pm in the churchyard, a programme of words and music will be held as an act of remembrance of those who died in the 9/11 attack and as a result of mass violence worldwide.

The day's events will conclude with a candlelit Compline service in Trinity Church. "These are

the church's bedtime prayers, and they mark that transition from day into night," Trinity's priest for liturgy and pilgrimage, the Revd Daniel Simons, said. "We pray Compline on Sunday evening as a transition before the beginning of the week, as a way to reflect, renew, and refresh."

Other services and events to mark the anniversary will be held elsewhere in the US and around the world, including in Sydney, Australia, where former Prime Minister John Howard will join the US ambassador to Australia, John Berry, and other diplomats for a service in St Andrew's Cathedral, to remember the victims of the attack.

"9/11 was a catastrophic event on American soil, but it has affected the whole international community," the Archbishop of Sydney, Dr Glenn Davies, said. "62 countries lost people in this devastating attack. The ramifications have been global and put the world on alert for a new form of destructive, annihilistic terrorism which has sprouted groups like Boko Haram, ISIS and Al Shabaab.

"This service provides us with an opportunity to ponder the gravity of so many deaths where the forces of evil appear triumphant. It also enables

us to renew our hope, knowing that God is in control and, through Jesus, offers true peace for a broken and divided world."

Dr Davies will preach at the service, which will take place at 10.30am AEST (12.30am GMT) on Sunday. Mr Howard, who witnessed the attack on the Pentagon as he was in Washington on 11 September 2001, will deliver a reading from the New Testament. A cathedral bell will be tolled 15 times to mark the anniversary.

RTE to broadcast new Mass setting by Irish composer

RTE Television and Radio are set to broadcast live a new Mass setting by an Irish composer/ musician which pays tribute to St Michael's Church in Portarlington. This new Mass setting is scheduled for live broadcast on RTE One TV and RTE Radio 1 Extra on 30 October.

The work, titled 'St Michael's Celebration', is penned by Portarlington born singer, songwriter, and pianist Tom Conroy (Piano Man Tom).Work on the new music and hymns began in the middle of 2015 and was completed in August 2016.

According to Tom Conroy, "St Michael's Church is a towering presence on Patrick Street in Portarlington and continues to be an inspirational place of prayer and worship for anyone who enters."

Portarlington's population has increased substantially over the last decade and according to the composer, "Many new faces have been warmly embraced by the community and by the church."

This is the second Mass setting that Tom Conroy has composed.

'The Brittas Mass' was created in Clonaslee, Co Laois from 2011-2013 and was broadcast live on RTE One TV in July, 2013 as part of a special mass in honour of the bicentenary of St Manman's Church in Clonaslee.

Fr Pat Hughes will lead the worship and St Michael's Folk Choir will feature singers from Portarlington, as well as from Clonaslee and the surrounding areas in Co Laois and Co Offaly.

After over a year's work, Tom also recently released his second full studio album of his own original songs called 'Make A Wish', which features the popular 'Diana's Royal Child' as well as nine other songs.

Rev Isaac Delamere (Rector) said, "We are delighted to be broadcasting a Service to coincide with the Championships. A tremendous amount of work has been done in preparation by Ms Eva Draper (Organist), the Parish choir and many others. The involvement of other choirs will make it a real community celebration".

The theme of the Service will be Come and See the Fruits of His Creation. Rev Delamere will lead it. Bishop Storey (Bishop of Meath & Kildare) will be the preacher.

Christian Aid welcomes MPs' answer to tax crisis highlighted by Apple

MPs are suggesting a simple way in which the UK could help end global secrecy around the finances of multinationals such as Apple, says Christian Aid

MPs are suggesting a simple way in which the UK could help end global secrecy around the finances of multinationals such as Apple, says Christian Aid

"The Apple case shows the importance of shedding light on what multinationals are really up to around the world and the MPs' proposal would be a massive step towards that," said Toby Quantrill, Christian Aid's Principal Advisor on Economic Justice.

"Apple is far from the only company using tax havens to slash tax bills in the UK and in many of the poorest countries around the world. But until we can see far more about firms' global activities, we can't know which are the worst offenders", he added.

Well over 50 MPs from all the UK's major political parties have proposed an amendment to the Finance Bill (which implements the Budget). The amendment would simply give the government the power to make public the country-by-country reports that companies are privately submitting to UK tax authorities.

Mr Quantrill added: "We urge the Government to accept this simple, cross-party amendment to its Finance Bill. The principle of publishing companies' key financial indicators such as taxes paid in each country where they work is agreed by all major UK political parties. This amendment would give the government the power to implement this simple but powerful reform when it chooses to do so.

"Furthermore, the move would be popular with the UK public and benefit developing countries – where people would finally be able to see what taxes are being paid by big companies in their countries. Developing countries currently lose terrifying sums to multinational tax dodgers – money that is badly needed for education, health and policing.

"Investors would also benefit from public countryby-country reports, because they would be able to see any potential risks linked to a company's tax strategy. "There can be no more excuses for multinationals hiding what they are really up to. All the evidence shows that when they can hide, they do things they wouldn't want us to know about."

Protection of children priority for Governing Body of Church in Wales

The protection of children, young people and vulnerable adults in churches will be on the agenda of a key meeting this month.

The Church in Wales is launching a new safeguarding policy at the meeting of its Governing Body which takes place on September 14-15.

Members will be asked to endorse the policy and to recognise the importance of promoting safer practice for people at risk within church communities. The Governing Body is made up of 144 lay and ordained people from across Wales and will meet at the University of Wales, Trinity Saint David, Lampeter. It will begin with a key note address by the Archbishop of Wales, Barry Morgan, as President of the Governing Body. This will be Dr Morgan's last presidential address as he will retire in January.

Other items on the agenda include:

• A motion to raise the normal pension age of clergy from 65 to 67 from next January;

• An update on the Church's 2020 Vision – a strategy for growth;

• A report on Evangelism;

• A report of the Anglican Consultative Council meeting held in Lusaka in April by the Church in Wales delegate, Helen Biggin;

• A Bishops' pastoral letter on admission to Holy Communion.
