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Kildare local, Trudy Jeffers, received a special recognition award from Christian Aid Ireland recently for her charitable work over the last 20 years with the aid organisation.

Christian Aid Ireland's Church and Community Officer, Jane Burns said; "We are eternally grateful to Trudy for the incredible work and support she provides for us year on year. Without people like Trudy, we would not be able to provide help to those in most need, so it's hugely important to recognise the efforts of special people like Trudy in eradicating poverty. We'd like to say a big thank you to Trudy and everyone in Kildare for their continued support."

Trudy has been a church representative for Christian Aid Ireland for over 20 years and has organised many shopping centre and street collections all over the county, raising thousands in the process. Her tireless efforts have not gone unnoticed by the aid agency, and this month she received her award certificate.

This year's Christian Aid Week, which took place in May, focused on the organisation's work to support people who have been forced to flee their homes by conflict or extreme weather in countries like Haiti, but who are unable to leave their country.

"There are 43 million people worldwide who have been forced to flee and they suffer many of the same types of abuses and unstable living conditions that refugees face," said Jane Burns. "As they have not crossed an international border, they are largely ignored by the international community and are denied the official protection afforded to refugees. Jesus is going to win - central message of Down Bible Week

The essential message of the Book of Revelation is Jesus is going to win according to Bishop Grant LeMarquand who is leading Down and Dromore Bible Week at the end of August.

He says, "Revelation holds a fascination for many Christians who for two millennia have sought to understand the often confusing and difficult imagery.

"But don't be put off, for this is a book that's extremely relevant for our time."

Bishop Grant explains: "It was written to a group of people who were facing oppression and suffering – a group of people whose faith was being challenged by the authorities

and by those within the church, so it's a book that has so much to say to us today."

Grant will be leading four studies looking at the throne visions in Revelation.

He says, "The throne is the central image of this book and the fact that God is on the throne helps us to understand that God is sovereign, that God is in control, no matter what's going on in the world."

"So, we'll be exploring these different passages in the Book of Revelation which assure us that no matter what is happening to us, no matter what is happening to the Church, no matter what is happening in the world, God is in control.

"Jesus is going to win!"

Zimbabwe's Churches call for calm following post-election violence

Christian leaders in Zimbabwe have appealed for calm in the country following post-election violence in which at least three people have been killed. "Life is more important than everything else," the Zimbabwe Council of Churches said on its Facebook page.

"Let us desist from acts of violence." Official results from Monday's poll – the country's first without Robert Mugabe in almost four decades – gave President Emmerson Mnangagwa from the Zanu-PF 2.46 million votes (50.8 per

cent); and MDC opposition leader Nelson Chamisa 2.15 million votes (44.3 per cent). Chamisa has said that the MDC intend to launch a legal challenge against the official results.

Yesterday, ZCC's President Bishop Lazarus Mpande Khanye joined Archbishop Thomas from the Catholic Bishops Conference at a press conference in which they called on church leaders to "responsibly influence values that guide people into peaceful conduct." They also "encouraged continual call on to God for peace to prevail in the nation."

"Tonight, we note with sadness the recent violent development that is unfolding in our dear country," Bishop Lazarus said. "It is clear that there is a section of our population which is dissatisfied with the way the election has been handled. This has resulted in several incidents of violence being reported in some parts of Harare.

"As bishops and church leaders we re-emphasise that key to the gospel of Jesus Christ is the development of peace, peace, and peace. Our nation, having been through similar incidents in the past, we cannot allow ourselves to undergo another period of violence. I know wish to make clear that violence won't get us anywhere."

Yesterday, in a message on its Facebook page, the ZCC said: "Peace is the fundamental block in nation building. Violence only leaves the nation in pieces. Let us unite for peace in peace."

Bishop Fintan Monahan urges road safety this bank holiday weekend

'Blessing of Roads' ceremony to take place at Cathedral

Bishop Fintan Monahan is urging all road users to take extra care over this August bank holiday weekend.

Bishop Monahan's comments come as Garda statistics show 87 people have died on the roads up to 31 July. Data released this week also shows that over 60,000 motorists have been caught speeding in the first six months of 2018 while over 5,000 motorists drove while intoxicated.

Bishop Monahan said, "I firmly believe that prayer and reflection can change our driving behaviour, calm our aggression, remind us of the spiritual, moral and physical importance of what we are about to do.

"Bank holiday weekends are high risk times on our roads. These statistics show how important it is to make driver safety, and the safety of others on our roads, a priority at all times. Road deaths are preventable but care, attention and vigilance must always be at the forefront of the minds of road users – motorists, motorcyclists, cyclists and pedestrians – if this is to happen. It is always a heartbreak and a tragedy to hear of another life lost on our roads. We must be conscious that each of us has a responsibility when we get behind the wheel to ensure we are not putting our lives or the lives of others at risk".

Bishop Monahan continued, "In this special month, ahead of the 9th World Meeting of Families and the visit of Pope Francis, I am inviting parishioners to pray for families who have lost loved ones as it is the family who must carry the burden in such tragic circumstances".

After 6.30pm Mass in the Cathedral of Saints Peter and Paul in Ennis, Co Clare, this Saturday Bishop Monahan will lead a 'Blessing of the Roads' ceremony and offer prayers for the safety of all road users.

Bishop Monahan recommends the following dedicated prayers for motorists which can be said before driving: 17th century *paidir as Gaeilge* In ainm an Athar le bua, In ainm an Mhic a d'fhulaing an phian, In ainm an Spiorad Naoimh le neart, Muire is a Mac linn inár dtriall. Áiméan!

A contemporary prayer in the English language Holy Mother, hear our prayer, Keep us in your loving care, Whatever the perils of the way, Let us not add to them this day. So to our caution and attention, We add a prayer for your protection, To beg God's blessing on this car, To travel safely near and far. Amen.
