# C of I parish church included in Dublin pilgrim walk for WMOF2018



## St Minchan's Parish Church in Church Street, Dublin, will be one of the stations in the WMOF2018 Pilgrim Walk.

The organisers say the theme for this station is the fostering of forgiveness among families and that the inclusion of the church is part of the ecumenical dimension of the Pilgrim Walk. This is an event being organised by the Dublin Diocesan Preparatory Committee and which is supported by the WMOF2018 Office.

From Saturday 18 August to Saturday 25 August, pilgrims are invited in a single day or over the period of the week, to undertake the WMOF2018 Pilgrim Walk.

This will involve visiting seven designated churches, spending time in prayer in each of them for a special intention related to families and finishing the visit with the WMOF2018 prayer.

Each pilgrim will be issued with a pilgrim walk passport, which will be stamped at each station, in the ancient tradition of the Camino of St James. A pilgrimage certificate of completion will be stamped when they arrive at the last of the seven churches. The churches can be visited in any order. Families, groups, individuals, adults and children are all invited to participate in the pilgrim walk. There is no charge to participate.

- St Teresa's Carmelite Church, Clarendon Street.

- St Michan's, Church Street

The theme for this station is fostering the gift of forgiveness among families.

This is an Anglican Church, and its inclusion is part of the ecumenical dimension of the Pilgrim Walk.

St Saviour's, Dominick Street
 The theme of this station is God walks with families when times are tough.

St Francis Xavier's, Gardiner Street

# Catholic theology off the cards for Trinity students

A religion department in Dublin's Trinity College will no longer be offering an undergraduate degree in Catholic Theological Studies following significant internal changes between departments within the university.

The Loyola Institute, which was established in 2012 following an agreement between Trinity College Dublin and the eight religious congregations associated with the Milltown Institute of Theology and Philosophy, will not have a new intake of undergraduate students for the degree in the upcoming academic year.

Speaking to The Irish Catholic, Director of the Loyola Institute, Dr Fáinche Ryan, said that there will be a new degree in Religion with an option to pursue Theology, which will have its first intake of students in September 2019. "Confederal School of Religions, Peace Studies and Theology had its five-year review last year.

"As a result of the review, some changes are taking place, namely the change of title, so we will now have the School of Religion, and all of us are going to cooperate in offering one undergraduate degree. The degree will have three different exit routes, one of which will be an exit route in theology," she said.

Dr Ryan added that the Loyola Institute will still have some input in the undergraduate degree, but that the main focus of the department will be on postgraduate research.

"The Loyola institute will continue to offer some teaching in the theology area of this undergraduate degree. The Loyola institute will focus henceforth on postgraduate teaching and research.

"So we're continuing to offer our successful M. Phil in Christian Theology which can be taken full-time or part-time and were developing that. We are continuing to increase <a href="mailto:churchnewsireland@gmail.org">churchnewsireland@gmail.org</a>

our number of doctoral students, our research seminars, and of course, our normal outreach: conferences, lectures, etc.," she said.

### Edinburgh church splits from Scottish Episcopal Church over gay marriage dispute

One of the biggest churches in Edinburgh has left the Scottish Episcopal Church (SEC) over a disagreement on the definition of marriage.

According to yesterday's Sunday Telegraph, St Thomas parish split from the SEC because of the Anglican body's decision to endorse same-sex marriage.

The Rev David McCarthy, Rector at St Thomas' told the newspaper the decision was extremely difficult.

"We have not done it easily. We have had many tears and many sleepless nights. It is a tragic necessity," he said.

"But it is the Episcopal Church who are leaving us. They are leaving orthodoxy."

In June 2017, the SEC voted to amend canon law and allow same-sex couples to be married in church.

The move made it the first branch of the Anglican Communion in the UK and Ireland to allow same-sex marriage.

SEC members voted to remove the doctrinal clause which stated that marriage is a "union of one man and one woman", replacing it with a clause which asserts that clergy who do not wish to preside over same-sex weddings will not be compelled to do so "against their conscience".

The Anglican Communion, the international association of the world's third largest Christian denomination, punished the SEC for its decision last year.

Now SEC leaders are not be allowed to represent the Anglican Communion and cannot take part in any votes the Communion holds regarding doctrine or new rules.

In response to the discipline, Most Rev Mark Strange, Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church, said it was a decision that was made with much prayer, theological debate and personal testimonies, but in the end the Church decided to allow those of different views to "walk together".


# Pope Francis to join with recently engaged and married couples at Saint Mary's Pro-Cathedral

As part of Pope Francis's visit to Ireland for the ninth World Meeting of Families this month, he will join with recently engaged and married couples at Saint Mary's Pro-Cathedral, Dublin, on Saturday 24 August.

# Christians called to join in on 100 days of prayer

Christians across England have been encouraged to start a journey of 100 days of prayer.

The Archbishop of Canterbury and Presidents of Churches Together in England have called on churches to pray for peace and reconciliation to mark the 100th anniversary of National Day of Prayer starting on 4th August.

On 4th August, 1918 when King George V and Queen Mary joined members of the House of Commons and the House of Lords at the Church of Saint Margaret, Westminster; 100 days later the Great War ended.



Catherine Butcher from Christian charity Hope Together, which has organised the campaign, commented that Christians should pray for "personal peace, peace in our families, peace in our nation and also in other nations".

She added that Christians can also use the 100 Days of Prayer as an evangelism tool.

"A huge percentage of the population say they pray at some time or another but they don't always know who they're praying for," she said.

"It's an opportunity for us as Christians to be talking to people during these 100 days and say 'do you pray?' and people mostly say 'yes' and when you ask people 'would you like to me to pray?' I've never had anyone say 'no don't pray for me'."

Buckingham Palace also recognise the significance of the National Day of Prayer.



## MU Footballer gives back to hometown church

It's been revealed that Manchester United footballer Nemanja Matic has been generous to a church in his Serbian hometown.

According to the BBC's World Football podcast, Matic has financed repairs for an Orthodox church in the small village of Vrelo.

Last year he paid for a new roof, spire and fence for the historic church. He also donated money for it to be repainted, and for new clocks to be installed.

According to locals the new clocks were special because they "run on time which hasn't happened in for a good 100 years".

The footballer also donated a fountain to the church, in which he was married in and where his children were baptised.

The priest of the church said Matic is a humble person and he's sure the footballer would rather not have had his name on a small brass plaque marked on the fountain.

A local man said: "He's a world star but he's the same guy he was ten or 15 years ago. He's modest, always ready to talk to you, to help you."

Matic's philanthropy also includes paying off debts that villagers owed at a local grocery store and building a football stadium in the area.

+++Youth2000 Festival cancelled - One of the biggest events for young Catholics in Ireland has been cancelled this year due to low bookings and slow fundraising with volunteers and attendees opting to focus on the World Meeting of Families this August. Although there is some disappointment among organisers, they will now set their sights on the WMOF. Youth 2000 National Leader, Lana Wilson-O'Driscoll, said it was a once off occurence "and to be honest, it's perfect, we're happy to do that because it's an important event taking place, and with the Pope coming as well it is very exciting". Youth 2000 will have a booth during the WMOF congress in the teen space at the RDS in Dublin. "In hindsight, when the Pope had announced his visit, we should have tried to maybe move it to another date," she added. All other Youth 2000 events will remain unaffected, with their next event taking place in autumn.
