

# Church organist tuning up for 12 cathedrals fundraising challenge

A motorcycle-loving church organist from Co Armagh is getting ready to take to the roads in a race against the clock as she bids to perform 12 concerts in 12 cathedrals in just one day, the News Letter reports.

Musician and keen biker Elise Crean will don her leathers for the unique challenge, which will take her to venues across Northern Ireland, on July 21.

Helping Elise make the 270-mile dash around the 12 cathedrals will be her husband, Dessie Moorcroft, who will be giving her a lift on the back of his powerful Suzuki motorbike.

Elise, 35, from Darkley, the resident organist at First Armagh Presbyterian, is aiming to raise money towards the £70,000 required to rebuild the church's historic organ.

Members of public are being invited along to each of the concerts, while bikers are being encouraged to ride alongside Elise and Dessie on all or part of their journey. "This may be the first time a church organist has been seen in motorcycle gear and I am hoping that a combination of curiosity and generosity will help generate audiences for each concert," Elise said.

"Each stop will be exactly 30 minutes long. We have to stick very strictly to the schedule so that we can complete the round trip through each of the six counties on time. "I think it is going to be a challenge, but as an organist it is a fantastic opportunity to get to play some of the finest instruments in the Province."

Elise, who has already been practicing on the various organs that she'll encounter on the day, will be playing a programme of favourites from across the centuries including Pachelbel's Canon in D and Elgar's Nimrod. Each concert will also feature an organ and bagpipe duet of Highland Cathedral. # Corpus Christi College Choir begins tour of Ireland

The choir of Corpus Christi College, Oxford, will be in Dublin, Belfast and Enniskillen this month for a series of concerts. Under the direction of Matthew Murphy, from Enniskillen, as Senior Organ Scholar and Theodore Hill, the Irish tour begins on Tuesday, 3 July in Dublin. There, they will be leading Evensong in Christ Church Cathedral on 3 July and 4 July and on 5 July in St. Patrick's Cathedral. On 6 July, the choir will be performing Sung Mass in St. Patrick's Cathedral (RC), Armagh, and Evensong in St. Anne's Cathedral, Belfast.

On Saturday, 7 July, the choir will be performing at a lunch—time concert (1pm) in St Macartin's Cathedral followed by Sung Mass (6pm) in St. Michael's Church, Enniskillen.

They finish the tour with Choral Eucharist in Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin, at 11am on 8 July.



Since the foundation of the college in 1517, choral music has played an important part in the worship of Corpus Christi College Chapel.

The original college statutes made provision for a choir of just five members to sing daily services. Today, the Choir is made up of 30 students drawn from across the college community who provide music for sung services each term—time Sunday as well as for important feast days such as Ash Wednesday, Ascension Day and Corpus Christi Day. Under the direction of the Organ Scholars, the choir sings a range of music spanning over 450 years from the English cathedral repertoire.

# A Day of Prayer for a peaceful 'Twelfth'

A Day of Prayer for a peaceful 'Twelfth' and for healing in our land will be held in St George's Parish Church, Belfast, on Wednesday July 11.

The day will start with a Service of Holy Communion at 10.30am and will run until 2pm. People are welcome to come and go as they wish during this time and refreshments will be available.

This Day of Prayer around the period of the 'Twelfth' has been organised by Divine Healing Ministries (DHM) for a number of years. It also marks the completion of more than a year of weekday prayers for the city and the land which have been held in the Chapel of the Holy Cross at St George's.

Divine Healing Ministries believes that God has responded positively to the prayers offered up in previous years, with a marked reduction in violence particularly at flashpoint areas. The Day of Prayer is for people of all Christian traditions. Short reflections will be held every 30 minutes with silent prayer to follow. Personal prayer will be available for anyone who wishes to receive it.

Fergus McMorrow, Director of Divine Healing Ministries, said: "We are very pleased that St George's is once again hosting this Day of Prayer with DHM. It will be a special privilege to begin the time of prayer with Holy Communion at 10.30. We come confidently to God to ask His blessing on our land and this city of Belfast for a peaceful 12th July again this year."

# Young people to join US diocesan camp

Twelve young people from the Diocese of Down and Dromore, and two adult leaders, will fly out to their link diocese of Albany in upstate New York on Friday where they will spend two weeks helping at Beaver Cross Ministries Summer Camp.

This expression of the link between Down and Dromore and Albany has been happening since a team of young people



travelled to Beaver Cross in 2003. Since then a number of groups have travelled in each direction, with Down and Dromore regularly hosting American teams at Summer Madness.

The Revd Adrian Dorrian will be leading the Down and Dromore team.

He said: "This is the first time in several years we will have sent a team out to Albany. It's wonderful to see so many of the team members coming up through our own Kilbroney Adventure Camps (which owe much of their structure to Albany's model), but also to see interest from young people who are active in their own parishes but don't necessarily connect with our camps.

as the new President of the Methodist Conference, taking over from the Revd Loraine N Mellor. The induction took place on Saturday 30 June.

It is the first time in the history of the Methodist Church that a woman has been elected to succeed a woman President. During the ceremony, the new President receives a Bible that was used by John Wesley.

During his lifetime John Wesley chaired the Methodist Conference but after his death the Conference determined to elect a President annually.

Michaela was ordained in 1997 and is one of the Chairs of the London District. She is a regular contributor to *Pause* for *Thought* on BBC Radio Two, Chair of Trustees for Methodist Central Hall, a trustee of *Making Herstory* and a trustee of Southlands College.

Having chosen 'radical grace' as her theme for the year, Michaela is looking forward to helping the Methodist Church consider the radical nature of God's grace and the ethic of hospitality and love-centred mission that flows from that grace.

During her Presidential address, Michaela commented: "God's grace is radical. It goes beyond what is only fair, to a prodigious reckless generosity. It is prevenient grace, which flows from the Lover's desire to see the beloved flourish, to be whole and to live in delight.

"We need to let go of our tendency to 'niceness' and, prompted by just how uncomfortable God's grace is, make a nuisance of ourselves again in the market place and in the public square, refusing to remain silent in the face of systems that reinforce injustice, and oppress vulnerable people."

# Former Moderator accepts honorary doctorate with historic Gaelic address

Former Moderator Very Rev Dr Angus Morrison received an Honorary Degree from the University of Glasgow on Tuesday 26 June, addressing the audience in both English and Gaelic for the first time in the University's 561 years.

The University of Glasgow cited "his contribution to championing Gaelic, refugee and asylum seekers and changing attitudes within the Church to same sex relationships" as their reasoning for his commendation.

Speaking at the ceremony, Dr Morrison said, "Today is a day full of joy and excitement, and to be sharing it with my family means a huge amount to me.

"This is my first University, I was an Undergraduate here in the 70s. Now to come back to receive this award, it's deeply humbling and absolutely thrilling. It's a wonderful day."

# A 'deep love' for the Gaelic language

Dr Morrison, the Convener of the Gaelic Group at the Church of Scotland, is a champion and keen advocate for the Gaelic language.

During his address to the audience at the ceremony, he became the first person in the history of University of Glasgow's 561 years to address the graduation audience in both English and Gaelic.

Speaking of his love for the language, he said, "Although I'm not a native speaker of Gaelic, my parents were both from the Isle of Harris. They tended not to use it in the home to their children, but I made up my mind I was going to learn it as a boy, and took it as a subject in school and University.

"I've always had a deep love for the language and I've done my best to promote its use. Within the Church of Scotland, for example, I've been convening the Gaelic group of the Church in recent years and we now have a Gaelic plan in place, which is very exciting.

"I think Gaelic is a wonderful part of our national heritage. It's a wonderful language and well worthy of our support!"

# A 'prophetic voice for a number of causes close to his heart'

Dr Scott Spurlock, the University of Glasgow's Senior Lecturer in Scottish Religious Cultures, presented the honorary degree to Dr Morrison.

During his introductory speech, Dr Spurlock said, "Angus provided a prophetic voice for a number of causes close to his heart.

"In 2016 he voiced grave concerns over plans to cut Gaelic medium education in Edinburgh schools, stating 'I fear that if <a href="mailto:churchnewsireland@gmail.org">churchnewsireland@gmail.org</a> Page 11

Gaelic is allowed to wither in Scotland's capital, it becomes very fragile'.

He concluded his address stating, "Drawing from the Scripture that has shaped him and in the language that he loves, let me finish with an exhortation befitting Angus Morrison and his life of service. 'Is math a rinn thu, a sheirbheisich mhaith is dhìleis.' (Mata 25:21) [Well done, good and faithful servant!]"

The Politics web site reports - Legal recognition has already had a transformative effect on Scottish and Irish society. In Scotland, humanist marriages gained legal recognition in 2005, and have risen in number from 85 in the first year to over 4,900 in 2015, overtaking the Church of Scotland in the process. In the Republic of Ireland, humanist marriages gained legal recognition in 2012. In 2016 around seven percent of legal marriages were humanist, more than three times as many as there were (Protestant) Church of Ireland marriages.
