



Armagh choristers to give final recital of series

On Friday 15 June 2018, the Choristers of St Patrick's Church of Ireland Cathedral, Armagh will give the final

recital in this year's series. The recital will be held at 7.30pm in the Music Hall at 9 Vicars' Hill, Armagh.

Director of Music, Dr Stephen Timpany, said, "Members of the Choir will perform a variety of instrumental, vocal and choral items from a wide range of styles. They include classical to popular, with music by Handel, Joseph Corfe and Eric Clapton." He continued, "Our Choristers are a group of very talented musicians, most often heard singing sacred music in the Cathedral. This end of year concert will showcase their many musical talents in the less formal setting of the Music Hall. It is sure to be a memorable evening which should last around forty-five minutes."

As with all the recitals in this series, admission is free, with a retiring collection towards the further endowment of the Cathedral choir through the Archbishop's Choir Fund. Dr Timpany and members of the Choir thank the recitalists who took part throughout the year, as well as the audience who support the Choir in this way. Planning is underway for a new recital series which will begin in the autumn.

'New-look' Presbyterian General Assembly opens next week

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland will have a 'new look' to it when it gathers in Belfast on Monday (June 4) for its annual weeklong meeting. The decision making body of the all island church - the largest Protestant denomination in Northern Ireland – will discuss a number of major issues facing the Church and society, including assisted suicide and euthanasia, climate change, the political stagnation in Northern Ireland and the recent churchnewsireland@gmail.org Page 2

referendum on the Eighth Amendment in the Republic of Ireland. The Assembly will also focus on the central calling of the Church - to proclaim and live out the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ in a needy world.

In discussing these and other issues, the Church has introduced a number of significant changes this year to the times that it meets and its membership, to make the Assembly more accessible.

Clerk of the General Assembly and General Secretary of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, Rev. Trevor Gribben said, "The changes are not cosmetic, but a genuine attempt to make our debates and decision-making more accessible to those entitled to attend, especially for church elders who have other commitments during the day, which is why we have introduced later evening sittings.

"Another significant change means that for the first time churches can send an additional member of their congregation, aged 30 or under, to sit and deliberate. As we discuss major issues facing both the Church and society, we hope these changes will enable more people to come and younger voices to be heard," he said.

The General Assembly is the principal decision-making body of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. From its oldest congregation in Ballycarry in County Antrim to its newest in Donabate in County Dublin established nearly 400 years later in 2010, around 1,000 ministers and elders from the Church's 500-plus congregations across Ireland will come together for a week of fellowship, worship, prayer, Bible study, celebration and debate. churchnewsireland@gmail.org

Monday's Opening Night will see invited civic dignitaries and corresponding church representatives from denominations at home and overseas witness the formal election and installation of Rev. Dr. Charles McMullen, minister of West Church in Bangor, County Down, as the new Moderator of the General Assembly.

Rev. Trevor Gribben explained that business before the Assembly is contained in the '*Blue Book*', which this year includes reports from the Church's 124 councils, committees, panels and task groups, which have led to around 100 resolutions.

"Decisions that we take next week will set the direction for the life and ministry of the Church over the coming year and beyond, and this year we have some significant reports and resolutions. The report on Climate Change, for example, develops a biblical position on its causes and effects while setting out seven principles of being good stewards of God's creation. It also looks at what practical action and lifestyle choices can be made by churches and our members to be good stewards," Mr. Gribben said.

"Along with a range of in house and routine business, we will also discuss a major report on euthanasia and assisted suicide, asking the General Assembly to strongly oppose the introduction of either, while calling on governments to ensure the adequate resourcing of research and delivery of palliative care."

The Clerk of the General Assembly said that it will also discuss education in Northern Ireland, in particular the low morale and sense of disillusionment felt amongst school churchnewsireland@gmail.org Page 4

governors, principals and teachers caused by the ongoing political uncertainty and financial situation. The ongoing political stagnation in Northern Ireland will feature, as will the new generic model for hospital chaplaincy in Northern Ireland, which is being proposed by some health trusts. Members will also discuss the recent referendum on abortion in the Republic of Ireland.

Trevor Gribben also said that a number of doctrinal papers will be brought to the Assembly, including one on the Church's participation in multi-faith events. PCI's memberships of inter-church groups will also be discussed, the amalgamations of some congregations and its relationship with other denominations, including the Church of Scotland.

The role that Religious Education plays in the spiritual, moral and intellectual development of children and young people will also be on the agenda, as will the under provision of services for young people with a learning disability after they are 19.

Outside of the general debate and discussion that takes place, on Wednesday (June 6) the new Moderator, Dr. McMullen, will lead the traditional Wednesday Evening Celebration, which is open to all. Themed 'Building Relationships' the speaker will be the developer of the popular Christianity Explored course, the Rev Rico Tice, senior minister (evangelism) at All Souls, Langham Place in London.

work and witness in a changing and more secular society. This obviously has its challenges and we will discuss and pray about many of them next week," explained Mr. Gribben. "The local congregation is the key and the vital mission unit of PCI, where ordinary Christians share the Good News of Jesus Christ with their neighbours, in both word and deed.

"Our situation in this changing world and the mission of our Church is simply encapsulated in one of the reports before us next week. Comments by one observer summed it up in just in four simple words: 'Difficult task - Active hope'. We need to accept and manage both realities, built first and foremost in the hope that we have in Jesus Christ and as beacons of His light."

Dr. McMullen's installation service as Moderator on Monday evening is open to the public and will be broadcast live on BBC Radio Ulster 1341 Medium Wave from 7pm. The installation and most of the other public sessions will be streamed live at www.presbyterianireland.org. You can also follow a live Twitter feed @pciassembly using the hashtag #PCIGA18. Business commences at 10.30am on Tuesday June 5and will close on Friday, June 8 at 1.30pm.

Iona Community nears 'Miracle in May'

The Iona Community is making a final push to raise £300,000 this month, which could enable it to complete work on accommodation at its historic abbey early.



The Community tweeted yesterday that it was 'so near' to the target of its Miracle in May appeal.

The money is needed to reconfigure the accommodation in the Abbey. Combined with what the Community calls 'another very significant contribution we are hopeful of securing in the near future', the £300,000 would enable the Community to complete the work at the Abbey a year earlier than planned.

The works form part of a £2.5 million project addressing issues around the Abbey's accessibility, flexibility and sustainability. The work includes new access and doors, installation of a lift, improvements to the kitchen and refectory, new toilets and showers, reconfiguration of bedrooms, improved lighting and insulation and a new heating system.

The Iona Community was founded in 1938 by the Rev George MacLeod, who took unemployed craftsmen to Iona

to rebuild the medieval abbey. The new work is hoped to make the accommodation for visitors and staff fit for the 21st century.



Irish Author Patricia Byrne has launched her latest novel 'The Preacher and the Prelate: The Achill Mission Colony and the Battle for Souls in Famine Ireland' this week. The book, which is published by Merrion Press, got its official Limerick launch in O'Mahony's on Thursday, May 24.

Speaking at the launch, Patricia Byrne said,"Researching and writing this book took five years of my life. It was an obsession really for those five years. The story is raw, tempestuous, tragic and trauma-filled. It is the story of one man's attempt to transform an island"

Limerick poet and playwright Mary Coll launched the book, while Achill expert Reverend Canon Patrick Comerford also spoke at the launch.

'The Preacher and the Prelate' tells the extraordinary story of an audacious fight for souls on famine-ravaged Achill Island during the nineteenth century. The flood of hostility between Edward Nangle and John MacHale exposes the fault-lines of religion, society and politics in nineteenthcentury Ireland.

Patricia Byrne is a Mayo-born writer who lives in Limerick, Ireland. Byrne writes narrative nonfiction and personal essays and is a graduate of the NUI Galway writer programme. Her first novel 'The Veiled Woman of Achill: Island Outrage and a Playboy Drama' was published by The Collins Press in 2012 to great acclaim. Byrne's work has featured in New Hibernia Review, The Irish Times 'Irish Woman's Diary', Sunday Miscellany, Irish Story and a range of other outlets.
