Baby Basics Belfast: mission's new initiative to support new mothers

Connor Diocese's North Belfast Centre of Mission has launched a new initiative aimed at

supporting families in need by supplying essential items such as toiletries and clothing.

Working from the Connect Base in Shankill Road, Baby Basics Belfast is a volunteer-led project aiming to support new mothers and families who are struggling to meet the financial and practical burden of looking after a new baby.

It is the first in Ireland and is part of a growing network of Baby Basics centres across the UK.

Baby Basics Belfast started in January and is led by Diocesan Children's Project Officer Jill Hamilton and Lead Pioneer Evangelist in the Centre for Mission, Sister Karen Webb.

Jill said: "Baby Basics Belfast works alongside health professionals from local Sure Start and Health Centres who refer families in need. We are then able to support the families by providing them with essential equipment, clothing and toiletries."

Baby Basics Belfast works in partnership with local churches and relies on donations from congregations.

"We ask participating parishes to support us for a month at a time by highlighting Baby Basics during the Sunday Service and asking the congregation to donate items that can be passed on to families in need," Jill said.

"Participating churches can request someone to come along to their church service or church group to explain what Baby Basics is all about and will be provided with leaflets containing all the relevant information about what to donate."

One of the first parishes to step up to the fourweek Baby Basics challenge was Glenavy, and Jill went to pick up the donations on Tuesday March 21. There were so many items waiting at Glenavy church hall it took two car loads to bring everything to the Connect Base!

"The congregation was so generous and donated an amazing array of items from the 'shopping list' provided," Jill said.

A presentation of all the donations took place at Glenavy Parish's Open Door Club lunch. Open Door is a monthly senior citizens morning held for all the community and more than 80 ladies and gents come along each month.

Knitting and crocheting are among the many activities, and these nimble fingered ladies donate much of their work to good causes including Church Army Homeless shelters and

premature baby units in hospitals. Jill said they were delighted to knit for Baby Basics.

"We received two big bags full of blankets, hats, booties, cardigans, coats etc, all beautifully handmade with love and skill," said Jill.

The rector, the Rev John Rutter presented the donations from the parish and Mrs Paddi Totten presented the knitted items from Open Door. Through Baby Basics, families receive a Moses basket or other container filled with essential items for mother and baby, and the project will also include items for dad and other siblings in the family if appropriate. Jill stressed: "The health professional who understands the needs of the family is an essential link in the chain to make sure families receive items that are useful to them."

The Priests album Alleliua to be rereleased in time for Easter

Finaghy Parish Priest Fr David Delargy, who along with Fr Martin and Eugene O'Hagan make up 'The Priests,' will be re-releasing their album 'Alleluia' in time, for Easter.

'The Priests' were catapulted to fame when they signed with Sony BMG in 2008 and have since collected gold and platinum discs from Ireland, the UK, Sweden, Spain, Belgium, France, Norway, Canada, Australia and New Zealand for their many albums.

One minute they were making their way to isolated farms to meet members of their local community, the next they were being flown to St Peter's Basilica, to record at The Vatican.

A film based on their lives, provisionally called 'Raising the Roof,' is currently in pre-production in Hollywood and 'The Priests' even got to meet their idol Lady Gaga.

'The Priests' first album was released in more than 30 countries and set a record for the fastest-selling classical debut album. They have collected gold and platinum discs across three continents ever since.

releasing those albums. The albums were released internationally which meant there was a lot of travel, which took us around the world.


"It was all very exciting. Sony invested a lot of money in the project and they were giving us the full celebrity treatment with lots of nice hotels.

"It was very interesting and pleasant but very demanding and tiring as well. We were trying to make sure all our duties in the parish were covered. After three albums, we decided it was time to reduce our travelling and spend more time in our parishes."

He said of the new album which will be rereleased by Easter, "We are delighted that we have the opportunity to record a new album. The last one was 2010, so it's been a while. "The whole process of trying to identify suitable music and get the creative juices flowing and arrange it so that it's suitable for us is very stimulating. "It's been very good fun to be back in the recording studio. We come to it now with a good bit of experience behind us. We are more relaxed about it, there's not the same novelty, now we just enjoy it." David said the fame has never gone to his head. He said: "We've tried to be ourselves and to be natural and I think maybe that has given people a different perception of religion than they might have been used to, and a positive one I hope. But we haven't set out with an agenda to do that. "That wasn't part of our thinking. If that's happened, it's good, but it's not been part of our process."

Thirdly, Brian Davies, Distinguished Professor of Philosophy at Fordham University, offers <u>Thomas Aquinas: A Very Brief History</u>.



These beautifully produced books are written by world experts - examining their life and impact.

As well as this trio of Very Brief Histories there are other releases in April 2017. From the widely respected and prolific Anthony Thiselton comes a new textbook, *Approaching Philosophy of Religion: An introduction to thinkers, concepts, methods and debates*. This comprehensive and accessible introduction offers a guide to students approaching these important areas of study, rooted in the authors decades of experience of teaching, and strong research and publication careers.

From Russell Stannard, Emeritus Professor of Physics at the Open University, comes <u>The Divine Imprint: Finding God in the Human Mind</u>. This book engages with the intriguing thesis that the evolution of the human mind reveals something of the nature of God.

Finally, for the SPCK April 2017 releases, comes a gripping new travel narrative. <u>Cycling out of the Comfort Zone: Two Boys, Two Bikes, One Unforgettable Mission</u> by Charles Guilhamon is the engaging tale of two French teenagers who cycled around the world visiting persecuted Christian communities. Inspirational, humorous, and very timely, <u>Cycling out of the Comfort Zone</u> is a book our staff have found hard to put down!

+++ Bach's Saint John Passion at St Patrick's **Dublin** - The Choir of St Patrick's Cathedral is giving a liturgical performance of Bach's Saint John Passion on Passion Sunday (April 2) at 6.00pm. All are very welcome to attend. Bach's St John Passion is one of the towering achievements of western music, and tells in music the story of the arrest, trial and crucifixion of Jesus. Originally concieved as a liturgical piece in Lutheran Germany, it combines the narrative from St John's gospel with reflective solo arias, dramatic choruses and chorales (hymn tunes), the latter of which are sung by the entire congregation. In this performance directed by David Leigh, the Schola (senior girls) and men of the cathedral choir are joined by an orchestra drawn from Dublin's finest professional players. All of the solos, including the evangelist, are

taken by members of the choir. Tickets are free, but advance registration is recommended.

+++ Greek refugee experience - Next Monday the Revd Abigail Sines, Dean's Vicar in Christ Church cathedral, Dublin, will travel to Thessoloniki in Greece to visit friends, who have been working with refugee families, to gain some experience of their work. They have worked on a small scale befriending families, providing food and cooking equipment, and helping them with enquiries to track down separated relatives. Most recently they have been preparing packs of school supplies and conducting simple lessons for schoolchildren who, in the last two years, have fallen behind in their schooling. +++Theresa May: wrong to label London attacks as 'Islamic' terrorism

Following her statement in the House of Commons on Thursday morning Theresa May was asked by Conservative MP Michael Tomlinson whether she agreed that the term was inappropriate.

He asked her: "It is reported that what happened yesterday was an act of 'Islamic terror'. "Will the Prime Minister agree with me that what

happened was not Islamic, just as the murder of Airey Neave was not Christian, and that in fact both are perversions of religion?"

Ms May replied that she believed it was not right to use the term, suggesting that such ideology was "perversion".

In a statement Muslims United for London said: "The British Muslim community stands with the community during these difficult times and extends their support in raising funds to help with the immediate, short-term needs of the families of Keith Palmer, the other victims and the families of the victims.
