

Worship resources 7th Sunday of Easter

If it is possible to celebrate Ascension Day mid-week, then this Sunday becomes a powerful bridge between the Ascension and Pentecost which follows next week. Part of what creates this meaningful journey is the focus, in the readings for Easter 7A, on Jesus' longing for glory, and the gift of glory which he brings to his followers (which in this context is almost synonymous with 'home') and the 'refugee status' both of the incarnate Christ and of his followers who await the coming of God's reign in fullness.

May our worship give us a glimpse of home, and lead us into a willing commitment to the life of a refugee for the sake of the Kingdom.

INTRODUCTIONS

For use by lectors, in order of service, parish bulletins and magazines

Acts 1:6-14: The disciples question Jesus about the timing of God's restoration of Israel, but Jesus promises the Holy Spirit and then ascends into heaven as they watch. Then two white-robed men tell them that Jesus will return in the same way they saw him leave.

<u>Psalm 68:1-10, 32-35</u>: A psalm of victory and praise, celebrating God's might in military terms, and rejoicing in God's protection of the weak and vulnerable, and in God's provision of a home for God's people.

<u>1 Peter 4:12-14; 5:6-11</u>: Peter encourages the persecuted believers, reminding them that they have witnessed Christ's suffering and share in it, and that they have the hope of seeing Christ's glory, and sharing in that as well.

John 17:1-11: Jesus prays for himself that God will take him back into the glory he shared with the Father. Then he prays for his disciples, who have received Christ's message and have believed and given him glory, that they may be protected by God's name and may be one as Christ and the Father are one.

LECTIONARY NOTES 1

REFLECTIONS ON THEME:

It may sound like a strange connection to make, but this week's readings bring together two ideas that appear disparate – glory and refugees. Jesus was, in a sense, the ultimate refugee - choosing to leave behind his home in glory in order to live without a home (See Matthew 8:20) and to proclaim God's Kingdom as a home for all. In the light of this, his prayer to return to glory reveals a poignant longing for home. In a similar way, in Acts, Jesus, in a cryptic, round about way, invites his disciples to give up on their hope for an earthly kingdom as home, and to recognise that God is their home. The angelic message that they will see Jesus return in the same way he left is reminiscent of Jesus' words in John 14:2-3. For the Psalmist, God's victory brings a place of safety and belonging to the most vulnerable and to God's people. Peter encourages the believers to endure persecution because, as they share in Christ's suffering, so they also have the hope of sharing in Christ's glory – Christ's home. So, even as Jesus the Refugee longed for home, and opened the way for his followers to find a home in God's Kingdom (God's glory) so we live as refugees, at home in God's glory, but, walking in this world, unable as yet to see and experience it completely. And as Christ the Refugee sought to provide a home for refugees – the marginalised, the poor, the excluded and the suffering – so, as we are called to follow him, we are called to be one with Christ and the Father, not just in their glory, but also in their home-building mission.

CONNECTING WITH LIFE:

GLOBAL APPLICATION: The plight of refugees is never long forgotten in our world. Almost daily we are faced with images of those who have lost homes through war and conflict, through natural disasters, through political exile or through the impact of poverty. Millions of people find themselves as refugees, and the majority of them (75% I believe) are women. The impact of homelessness on the dignity and humanity of those who live it is immeasurable, and is a massive challenge to those of us who seek to follow Christ. But, there is much that we can do. We can support calls for international assistance in places of conflict that cause the displacement of people. We can lobby for the cancellation of unjust debts that cripple third world countries and leave many of their people destitute. We can vote for and work for more equitable international trade regulations that enable poorer countries to compete on a level playing field, and that can help to boost their economies. We can help, through our influence, our voice and our

participation in political processes, to ensure that aid that is promised to poor countries is delivered. We can speak out against the corruption in international business deals that would line the pockets of a few and stop benefits reaching those who most need them. Perhaps we can even travel to refugee camps (or local homeless shelters) and offer comfort, food and compassion to those who feel rejected and forgotten by the world. Whatever we may choose to do, we cannot follow the Refugee Christ and turn a blind eye to those who are displaced. And then, along with whatever social and material help we may offer, we can continue to invite people into the home that is God's glory, God's reign, where all people are equally welcome at the table, and all belong equally.

LOCAL APPLICATION: If the church is called to be anything it is called to be a home to the homeless and displaced. This does not just mean those who lack a physical home, but those who find themselves alone without a family, without friends, without a spiritual or emotional home. Unfortunately, though, it is too often the Church that leaves people as refugees, turning them away from the community of faith for no reason other than that they are different – in gender, sexuality, colour, culture, language, theology or appearance. Every community has people who long for a place to find a home in God's grace and God's Kingdom. These refugees are deeply loved and unconditionally welcomed by Christ, and we are called to manifest this as we open our doors and our hearts to them. More than this, we are called to seek out those who long to know the promise of God's Spirit. This calling has a huge impact on how we identify ourselves as Church, on how we understand our mission, and on how we worship. As William Temple said, "The Church is the only society that exists for the benefit of those that are not its members." The challenge for us is to recognise that we are a refugee community – one that does not find its home in the kingdoms of this world, or by controlling political power structures (as the disciples had to learn), but one that waits for, that longs for, a return to glory, to a home that is eternal and that is both manifest now and yet to be realised fully in the future. Once we have truly grasped this, we find we cannot help but stand alongside and seek to serve those who find themselves to be refugees of every kind. What might it mean for your church to view itself as a refugee community?

LECTIONARY NOTES 2

In our Gospel reading Jesus looks towards heaven and speaks to the Father, summing up what's about to happen and praying for His disciples and for all believers. In verses 1 - 5 Jesus reports that he has completed the task of making the Father known and asks to return to the Father's glory. In verses 6 - 8 He amplifies His report. He has passed on to the believers that which he

received from the Father. But the focus is not about communicating information but about the establishment and confirmation of a special relationship with God. In this relationship is life itself, here on earth and for eternity, in the world and beyond the world. And for all those who have entered into this relationship, they too are special. Special because they belong to the Father through this new relationship, and because of this they are invited to share in the task which the Father gave the Son. As we are called to carry on this task today, we, like them will face many challenges, the same challenges that Jesus highlights in His report back to the Father. The challenge of a hostile world, the challenge of temptation to give up when the going gets tough, and the challenge of disunity among believers. How could they, or we, ever succeed?

This passage from John is Jesus' prayer for what the Father will do for the world, through his risen Son, through the church. It is not a declaration of what is, but a heartfelt prayer for what shall be. It is not a blueprint for how unity will take form or mission take place, but a plea for the Father's strong name to protect those who are in the world who are called and open to the task of doing mission with joy and hope. A passionate appeal from Jesus to His Father that the believers may withstand the challenges which will lie ahead.

As Jesus ascended into heaven and left the earth in bodily form, the believers must have wondered what the future held. In an uncertain, sceptical and hostile world they must have felt alone and overwhelmed by the task to which Jesus had charged them. Paul, in his pastoral letter to Peter gives an indication of just how hard the task might be. It's not for the fainthearted. The enemy is prowling round like a lion, ready to devour anyone it can get its teeth into. For early Christians with memories of their friends and families being thrown to the lions by the Romans this can't have been a comforting image. Fortunately Paul goes on to say how these Christians can resist. They need to stand firm in their faith, confident in the hope that lies before them as God restores and strengthens them for the task in hand. It was a two way street. God would strengthen and restore them if they stood firm in their faith. Presumably the weaker their convictions, the more difficult it would be for them to stand firm. A challenge for them to be deeply rooted in their embryonic faith. Strength coming not from years of experience or tradition, but strength in believing that the God who came to earth in Jesus would do what He said and transform their lives and the lives of others by His gentle, yet all powerful touch.

As they stepped out in this fledgling belief, would they be ignored as irrelevant, ridiculed for trying to speak out about their faith, brushed aside as they tried to show God's love? Would they be paralysed by fear and uncertainty? Would the pressure to conform to the prevailing lax attitudes overwhelm them? Would they be split by arguments and dissention? Time would tell. It did. History shows that through the power of the Holy Spirit who did indeed strengthen them they, and countless others through the ages, were more than ready and able for the task. The question is, are we? *Sam Cappleman*

SERMON STARTER

"Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven?" [Acts 1:11]

The implication is that the disciples should now be looking in the direction where the

message of Jesus would lead them.

A moving meditation on this moment by an American theologian [Rev. Dr. Barbara K. Lundblad - Professor of Preaching, Union Theological Seminary, New York] asks what might have happened if, instead of looking upwards, the Disciples had looked downward and seen Jesus' footprints in the dust of the earth. Here is where their focus should be: on the footprints which remind them of everything Jesus said and did. Rather than looking up, waiting for something to happen, the Disciples are called to walk in Jesus footsteps and to be his witnesses - as they spread his good news throughout Jerusalem, Judea and Samaria and to the ends of the earth.

How often is our own faith journey marked by looking upwards to the heavens - waiting for something to happen, confused by change, looking for a perfect world and perhaps yearning for how things used to be?

Surely our Christian journey calls us to look across the face of the earth as we seek Jesus' footprints, measure our own steps against them, embrace transformation and empowerment, and decide where those footprints might be leading us.

Ascension is not a call to look upwards: it is a call to trust that Christ's promise is down - and in - and around - and among us.

NB If using this Sermon idea it is, of course, important to be mindful of Colossians 3:2, which says: "Set your minds on things that are above, not on

things that are on earth..." Seeking Jesus at work in the world is not the same as focusing on earthly things.

Often we can "set our minds on things above" by looking to where Jesus is active all around us.

SERMON OUTLINE

John 17:1-11 Jesus looked up to heaven... It was a traumatic evening.... the night that he was betrayed – and in this time of mental turmoil, Jesus turns to his Father in what is known as "the High Priestly Prayer"..

- 1. The Prayer of the Lord:- Father, the hour has come; glorify your Son bring glory through my death and victory over sin & Satan & death... His desire is to fulfil the Father's will and complete His Salvation Plan to give eternal life to all whom you have given him. 3And this is eternal life, that they may know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent.
- 2. The Presence of the Father:- 5 So now, Father, glorify me in your own presence with the glory that I had in your presence before the world existed in the days of pre-history a restoration to Jesus' pre-earthly glory before Creation a fantastic concept stupendous thought so difficult for our finite minds to comprehend the claim of a **lunatic** or the **Lord?** I am coming to you returning home meanwhile....
- **3. The Protection of the Disciples:-** the 12 and all followers in subsequent days 6 'I have made your name known to those whom you gave me from the world. They were yours, and you gave them to me, and they have kept your word. 9I am asking on their behalf; I am not asking on behalf of the world, but on behalf of those whom you gave me, because they are yours. They belong to you your children by faith what a wonderful concept! 7Now they know that everything you have given me is from you; 8for the words that you gave to me I have given to them, and they have received them and know in truth that I came from you; and they have believed that you sent me in the world, Holy Father, protect them in your name so that they may be one, as we are one...

CHILDREN

Children's / All-Age Talk

A simple re-telling of the Ascension story as found in Acts 1:1-11 is a possibility. An old Church of Scotland Summer Mission trick is to read the story through properly asking the congregation to listen carefully – telling them that on the second reading you will make some changes. When it comes to the second read-through you can make obvious changes, silly changes and subtle changes. The children, in particular, will love pointing out the mistakes you have made. This is a good way of reading and learning a Bible Story in a fun way.

Talk about those things that are unseen but all around us: air, electricity etc. Draw the comparison with Jesus. When he walked with the Disciples in

Galilee, Jesus was restricted to being in one place at any time – just as we all are – due to the laws of space and time. Now because of the Ascension, Jesus can be with us always. We may not see him, just as we do not see air or electricity, but we can know his loving presence.

Kingship is another possibility for an All-Age or Children's Address at Ascension time – especially if you don't mark Christ The King Sunday as a congregation. Make several cardboard crowns with the names of famous kings and queens on the front. Give them to willing volunteers. One of the crowns should say: JESUS. Then read out the names of kingdoms [or show a map or picture on a screen] and ask which of the kings/queens ruled over that Kingdom; for example Robert the Bruce and the Kingdom of Scotland. Leave "The Whole Earth" Psalm 47 till the end. Talk about the faults
