INTRODUCTIONS

It may come as a surprising thought that the 'blessings' we receive and enjoy have the potential to make us less Christ-like, but, depending on how we understand God's promises and the goodness God gives, this can be the case. When we view wealth, success or power as unquestionable signs of God's blessing, we are in danger of departing from the Gospel's call to align ourselves with the least, and to find God's blessing in community and sharing. This is the challenge of the readings this week in the Revised Common Lectionary.

May your worship this week lead you into a new sense of connectedness with others, and a new generosity in sharing the grace and mercy of God.

For use by lectors, in order of service, parish bulletins and magazines

Isaiah 1:1, 10-20: Isaiah prophesies against God's people, expressing God's displeasure at their worship and sacrifices while injustice remains among them. God invites the people to repent and confess, and if they do, God promises to cleanse and restore them. OR Genesis 15:1-6: God promises that Abram will have descendants as numerous as the stars. Abram's faith in this promise is considered to be the basis for his relationship with God (or is counted as righteousness).

Psalm 50:1-8, 22-23: God comes in judgement on God's people, inviting them to offer genuine sacrifices of thanksgiving, and promising God's salvation if they will do this. OR Psalm 33:12-22: Strength, military might, magnificent horses cannot save people. Only waiting on God and trusting in God's mercy is a safe refuge.

Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16: Abraham is an example of faith, giving up his homeland and living as a foreigner in a strange land for the sake of a God-given inheritance.

Luke 12:32-40: Jesus promises God's kingdom to those who follow Christ, inviting them to give up temporary, material security and wealth for heavenly security and riches. He encourages them to stay awake and be aware of God's coming.

LECTIONARY NOTES 1

Alert to the Good News

Genesis 15:1-6; Psalm 33:12-22; Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16; Luke 12:32-40 It is easy enough, given modern affluence, to imagine that "it doesn't get any better than this." It's tempting, in our complacency, to judge that things will continue as they are. It is

persuasive, in our despair, to conclude that the world is a closed system with no gifts yet to be given.

Against those ready seductions of affluence, complacency, or despair, the gospel news is that God can and does enact newness in the world. Indeed it is peculiarly God's work to make new when it is thought not possible. Gospel folk are alert to the newness from God that is always about to break in.

The gospel reading summons to readiness like a slave who alertly awaits the return of the master. Psalm 33 celebrates the world as God's world and invites us to "hope in God's steadfast love" (verse 18), to "wait for the Lord" (20). The index of "hopers" in Hebrews 11 takes as its champion father Abraham. Three times in these verses it is "by faith" (8, 9, 11). In trust Abraham traveled, lived in a foreign land, and bore a son. The Genesis narrative fills out the details of Abraham the hoper.

"Sojourners" in the gospel refuse both complacency and despair. They commit to the subversive act of alert hope, not doubting that God "delivers" and "keeps alive in famine" (Psalm 33:19).

LECTIONARY NOTES 2

Isaiah 1:1, 10-20:

- + I like this passage. The text makes a lot of sense to me. If you read through Leviticus, the first many chapters are filled with detailed codes for sacrifices to God for the community of faith. In this text from Isaiah, God doesn't say through the prophet that the sacrifices are meaningless or wrong per se, just that they're worthless because they obviously are meaningless to the ones offering them to God and because of that have become meaningless to God.
- + God says, literally here, "I have had enough!" Enough of your offerings that are not matched by your actions. Enough of your worship when you don't actually do what I say when it matters. Enough ritual and show of faith when you don't live your faith. You can't fool God your words and rituals don't match your actions and your living.
- + God says, back to the basics. This is what you need to do: Wash yourselves clean. Stop doing evil. Do good instead, by seeking justice, looking out for the oppressed, protecting the orphan. That's it.
- + "The mouth of the Lord has spoken." I like that visual emphasis on 'mouth.' Straight from the source. (Of course, I also think of "the mouth of Sauron" in the extended version of the film Lord of the Rings: Return of the King, but I think Isaiah is going for a different picture :))

Psalm 50:1-8, 22-23:

- + For once I like what they leave out of this selection better than what they leave in. Do check out verses 9-21 they seem to me to leave out some good verses and to make the first section of text sound abruptly chopped off when these verses are omitted.
- + "Our God comes and does not keep silence." That's comforting God speaks. God speaks for God's people. Even when we don't want to hear God's words!
- + God as Judge. How do you picture God judging?

+ "Not for your sacrifices do I rebuke you; your burnt offerings are continually before me." Again, like Isaiah's text, the people here seem to be doing a good job of following the law and custom to the letter. But still God is unsatisfied, because they are totally missing the deeper meanings.

Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16:

- + This text from Hebrews is a favourite of many in elementary school at church we had to pick a favorite passage to read in worship as part of my Sunday School class this was the text I chose the account of the faith of that "great cloud of witnesses."
- + "Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." What do you believe in that you have not seen? Why, when we believe in so many unseen things, is it hard to do the same when it comes to faith in God, faith in God's goodness, faith in God's love?
- + Disappointingly, but not unsurprisingly, this faith account details only the faith of the men in these stories, all of which had women in roles in the Old Testament. Too bad! Sarah and Rachel and Leah and Rebekah and Miriam were all part of these stories of faith too don't forget them!

Luke 12:32-40:

- + Always be prepared a good summary of this text! But there's more in it than that.
- + Would it be common practice for a master to serve the slaves, even if the master was pleased with their diligence? Yet read verse 37 the master is serving the slaves. Jesus is twisting roles around here!
- + "For where your treasure is, there you heart will be also." This well-known verse packs a punch if we don't trivialize it into a little proverb. Try reversing the order: Where your heart is, there will your treasure be also." It doesn't work that way correctly, or as well, does it? There's a reason why Jesus says what he does. We start by examining our life and asking, "what is it that we treasure, honestly?" That's where our heart is. So we must be careful what we call 'treasure.'
- + If it is the Son of Man who comes unexpectedly, like the thief, who plays master and who plays slaves? Interesting...

LECTIONARY NOTES 3

REFLECTIONS ON THEME:

Much is made of the promises of God in some circles, but little is said about the 'cost' of receiving God's promises. Essentially this cost arises because God's promises are always offered to the community, not just to the individual. And so, Abram is promised innumerable descendants, but must give up his homeland to live among foreigners (as the Hebrews readings explains). In Isaiah's prophecy, God's people can be cleansed and restored, but they must embrace justice and mercy. In the Psalms, God's salvation is offered to those who, like Abram, will trust in God's mercy. Finally, Jesus promises the Kingdom to his followers, but they have to release their faith in human or material resoucres, and commit to remaining always awake and aware to God's coming – which, if we read the verses following the set section, is strongly linked with how we view and treat others. A great 'hook' for this week is the phrase "descendants of Abram", for Abram's story is the model for the faith we are called to this week – a commitment to trust in God and a

willingness to discover & share God's promises of grace and mercy in and with the "other", the foreigner, the ones who seek justice, the ones we are called to serve.

CONNECTING WITH LIFE:

GLOBAL APPLICATION: There are so many ways that the idea of God's promises and blessings intersect with the realities of our world. When we embrace a view (as so many do) that God's blessings are given primarily to individuals, and that wealth, power and beauty are signs of God's blessing, we will inevitably begin to strive for these "manifestations of blessing" for ourselves. The result, all too often, is that we grow selfish. self-centred, uncommitted to justice, and may even view poverty or suffering as signs of God's judgement. When, however, we realise that God's blessings are always given to communities, and that they are to be shared with the least - that the reality is that we have never really known God's blessing unless it brings justice, mercy and provision to all, especially the poor and weak – our striving becomes sacrificial and generous. We begin to find our place among the "foreigners", the impoverished and the marginalised, and we discover the richness of God's reign within and among us as we share the blessings that come through us with all. How does this idea of "communal blessing" speak to the distribution of resources in our world? In what way can our commitment to receive God's blessing in this way guide us as we vote, as we participate in civil processes, as we contemplate and petition the meetings of the powerful in our government, in groups like the G8, the G20, and the BRICS member states, and in the United Nations?

LOCAL APPLICATION: In so many ways we have developed a spirituality that hoards blessings, and keeps God's promises to ourselves. Even the way we view salvation – as a personal escape from hell that requires no engagement with, or responsibility for, others, and that recognises no other possible avenues of grace – is a hoarding of God's goodness and mercy for ourselves. And so, even within the church, we too easily hoard material wealth, facilities, people and opportunities, allowing our brothers and sisters in other communities, or other parts of our cities, to go without, to struggle and to suffer. How might our view and practice of Church change if we began to recognise that God's blessings are given to be shared, that we are called to live "among the foreigners" and that it is here that God's promises are fulfilled? How differently might we live if we chose to be "descendants of Abram" trusting God's Kingdom promises whole-heartedly, and laying aside our usual human structures of security and comfort in order to recognise God's coming through the least, the 'other', the ones who cry for justice?

SERMON OUTLINE

Lk 12:32-40 Don't be afraid, little flock..

an extract from Jesus' **Sermon on the Plain** - with *a crowd of many thousands (v1)* with teaching similar to that in the Sermon on the Mount. Jesus reassures them: *Do not fear, little flock...* They were indeed small in number compared to the world's masses, but they have something which the world/worldliness could never offer - security in the arms of their shepherd.

1. God's Pleasure:- *It is your father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom -* God's gracious gift to unworthy humanity! - to all who turn from their sin & trust in the Saviour! Amazing Grace!

So much of the teaching of Jesus focussed on the Kingdom of God - freely offered to all who turn to Christ in faith and trust.

- 2. Man's Treasure:- which no one can steal & which will never perish unfailing treasure in heaven (33) where no thief comes near & no moth destroys. Man has got to decide about true eternal values passing material wealth or eternal spiritual treasure. Worldly wealth can deceive/destroy... cf Parable of the Rich Fool was not rich toward God (12.21). Xians are called, by contrast, to be rich toward God sell your possessions & give alms help the poor & needy. Your true wealth lies with God where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.
- a) Be dressed for action (35) long robes tied with a girdle or belt ready for service with your lamps lit (cf Parable of the 10 virgins) be like those waiting for their Master to return from the wedding banquet don't know when he will come, but be ready anyway! cf expectancy of the Return of Christ!
- **b)** Be blessed for ever by God Blessed are those slaves (37) whom the master finds alert when he comes watching, waiting, working... So he reminds them & us:- you also must be ready for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour (40).
