The Ark, a chest containing the Ten Commandments, represented the presence of God. The prophet Nathan tells King David that no grand place is needed to house it, because God's promise is to be with his people for ever, and a great new king will be born of David's line.

### Romans 16 : 25-27

Paul's letter to the Roman Christians end with glory to God, because the mystery of salvation, secret for long ages past, is now disclosed. Jesus Christ is present with us, and this revelation is for al people everywhere.

### Luke 1 : 26-38

The angel Gabriel's visit to Mary announces the coming of Jesus. He is the one to whom will be given the throne of David, and his kingdom will be without end.

## COLLECTS OF THE DAY Collect One

Lord, we beseech thee, give ear to our prayers, and by thy gracious visitation lighten the darkness of our hearts by our Lord Jesus Christ;

who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Almighty God, Give us grace that we may cast away the works of darkness, and put upon us the armour of light, now in the time of this mortal life, in which thy Son Jesus Christ came to visit us in great humility; that in the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious Majesty to judge both the quick and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal; through him who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, now and ever.

This collect is said after the Collect of the day until Christmas Eve.

## **Collect Two**

God our redeemer, who prepared the blessed Virgin Mary to be the mother of your Son: Grant that, as she looked for his coming as our saviour, so we may be ready to greet him when he comes again as our judge; who is alive and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

shut and what you shut, no one can open. Come and free captives from their prisons

O Dayspring, splendour of eternal light and Sun of justice, coming bearing light

to all who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, we remember especially those

who are sick and those who mourn \_\_\_\_\_.

The Spirit and the Bride say come.

#### Come Lord Jesus!

O Ruler of the nations, you alone can fulfill their hopes. You make opposing nations one.

The Spirit and the Bride say come.

#### Come Lord Jesus!

O Emmanuel, hope of the nations, hear our prayers and come soon to save us.

Amen.

# **LECTIONARY NOTES**

## 2 Samuel 7:1-11, 16:

David feels bad that he's living in a nice house while God travels via tent in the ark. So he offers to build God a cedar house. And God says, "who says I need a house? I've been doing just fine without one!" I think David's impulse is ours - wouldn't it be nicer if we could put God somewhere where we would always know where God was? But we get into trouble when our wanting to know where God is turns into wanting just to control God - period.

What would it mean if you would just led God travel through your life, and not try to restrict God to only a part of your life?

### Romans 16:25-27:

"the mystery that was kept secret for long ages" - I've never thought of Jesus as a secret that was kept until his coming in human form. Is that what Paul means?

Maybe we keep Jesus a secret or mystery today, by not clearly sharing who he is and who he calls us to be. What do you think?

"my gospel" Paul says. He boldly claims the gospel as his own. Is the gospel yours too?

### Luke 1:26-38:

Gabriel twice names Mary as favoured in this passage. Do you think she felt favored? Being favored by God in the Bible usually gets people into trouble!

I can't imagine reacting as coolly as Mary does. Could you take it all in like she does? Say, "Sure, ok." I just wouldn't believe it to begin with. And yet...Mary's nobody special before this happens to her. She's from a certain family line, but so are lots of people. She's just a faithful follower of God.

"nothing is impossible with God." Do you believe this? We have only 2 options really: we believe that *really*, things aren't always possible for God. That God's power is limited, because somehow, we are *beyond* God's power. *Or*, we believe that anything is possible for God, so God could make anything work through us. Those are really the only two possibilities. Which do you choose?

## **ONLINE SERMON SOURCES**

## Day 1 - Its not about Mary. Luke 1:26-38

Begins with: "The story is told that one day in heaven Jesus approached Peter who, acting in his roll as admissions officer, was sitting at the pearly gates. Jesus complained about the quality of people Peter was admitting into heaven, noting how many of them were of significantly questionable reputation. Peter responded, "I know Lord. But what am I to do? They come to me here and I turn them away. So they go around to the backdoor, talk to your mother, and she lets them in."

The focus of this sermon is that, "A theological look at this lesson reveals something startling: it's not about Mary. To be sure, without her, there would be no gospel. But that said, this story is far less about Mary than it is about God." It is about the wondrously impossible things God is going to do in and through this child. The second theme this story reveals is that the God of the impossible is also the God of grace. What does it mean to respond to such grace? Here is the third great theme we lose when we try to make this about Mary. We have so focused on the prosaic "Let it be to me," that we have missed the precondition to those words. Mary's first response is an acknowledgement: "I am the Lord's slave."

## America - People of the Promise

"The Lord God will give him the throne of David his father" (Luke 1:32). The promise to David is explored.Early Christians, like the Evangelist Luke, believed that God's promise to David was in fact fulfilled in Jesus, the Son of David. At the heart of the narrative of the announcement of Jesus' birth to Mary is a reminder of God's promise to David, "The Lord God will give him the throne of David his father, and he will rule over the house of Jacob forever, and of this kingdom there will be no end." The unlikely recipient of this promise is Mary of Nazareth, a young Jewish woman without a husband. She has to overcome her initial turmoil and confusion. She asks, "How can this be?" Given the sign of Elizabeth's pregnancy with John the Baptist, Mary accepts her mission with trust, "May it be done to me according to your word."

The concluding doxology appended to Paul's Letter to the Romans captures the early Christian conviction that in Christ the promises of God were being fulfilled. The covenant of grace established by God with David about 1,000 years before was reaching new definition and new clarity in the person of Jesus. The readings for the Fourth Sunday of Advent remind us that God's promise is best fulfilled not in buildings or even great kings like Solomon but rather in those, like Mary, who in the midst of turmoil and confusion trust in God's promise.
