The Lectionary moves from Mark's Gospel to a journey through John Chapter 6 for the next few weeks. In the Old Testament semi-continuous readings we remain with David for the time being. This week, the question of faith becomes the focus as we contrast David's lustful self-interest with the faith of Jesus in feeding the crowds and appearing to the disciples in the storm. The challenging question that this week's readings raise is this: What will be the driving force of our lives – faithful trust in God's ways, our own self-interest. It sounds like an easy choice to make, but the realities of our daily lives show how hard it can be.

May our worship encourage us in faith and give us the strength and courage to faithfully trust the ways of God's Reign this week. For use by lectors, in order of service, parish bulletins and magazines

INTRODUCTIONS

2 Samuel 11 : 1-15

Our weekly story of King David continues with the affair of Bathsheba. The Bible is often very honest about the failings of its heroes, and tells us here that Israel's greatest king was guilty of adultery and murder.

or 2 Kings 4 : 42=44

This brief account of a miraculous meal makes us think of Jesus feeding the crowds. Elisha took a small quantity of bread and grain, and God made it more than enough for a hundred people.

Psalm 14: Those who are foolish and wicked say that there is no God, and God sees how society has become corrupt. But, God is with the righteous who are "eaten up" by the wicked, and will save Israel, leading the people to rejoice.

OR Psalm 145:10-18: God's people bless God and give thanks to God, telling everyone about God's power and glory, and God's everlasting Reign, because God is trustworthy and supports, provides for, and rescues all who call out to God.

Ephesians 3 : 14-21

Paul's theme in this letter is the unity of Jew and Gentile in the church, acting as Christ's body. He has expressed his joy that the Christians of Ephesus are fellow-citizens with all Jewish believers, and is now moved to prayer and praise.

John 6 : 1-21

For a few Sundays now, we interrupt the sequence from Mark, and hear John's teaching about bread - bread as necessary daily food and Jesus himself as bread from heaven, food of eternal life. It begins with the miraculous feeding of the five thousand.

The love of God has won. The new life has begun. Amen.

Hear our prayers, God of power, and through the ministry of your Son free us from the grip of the tomb, that we may desire you as the fullness of life and proclaim your saving deeds to all the world. Amen.

As you heard the prayer of Isaac and Rebekah, O God, and guided them in the way of your love, so listen now to those who call upon you.

Intercessions may be made, concluding with:

Move us to praise your gracious will, for in Christ Jesus you have saved us from the deeds of death and opened for us the hidden ways of your love. We ask this through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Lord God, friend of those in need, your Son Jesus has untied our burdens and healed our spirits. We lift up the prayers of our hearts for those still burdened, those seeking healing, those in need within the church and the world.

In your compassionate love, O God, you nourish us with the words of life and bread of blessing. Grant that Jesus may calm our fears and move our hearts to praise your goodness by sharing our bread with others. Amen.

Sustainer of the hungry, like a mother you long to feed your children until each is satisfied. Turn our eyes to you alone, that, aware of our own deepest longings, we will reach out with Christ to feed others with the miracle of your love. Amen.

Generous God, forgive us for the fear and lack of trust that allow us to see scarcity where you have provided abundance. We don't want to be like the disciples by the Sea of Galilee who saw only problems and not possibilities. LECTIONARY NOTES 1

2 Samuel 11:1-15:

- Uh-oh. Things were going so well. Then David saw Bathsheba. Today we get part one of this story of temptation and sin. What tempts you? When have you given into temptation? What do you think makes you take that 'plunge' into committing a sin you know you shouldn't?
- Poor Uriah is the big loser all around in all of this. Cheated on, by the king. Tricked. Murdered.
- No where in the story when David is having Uriah set up does someone question his intention/authority. No doubt, people would fear questioning the king. Still,

wasn't their someone who could step in and ask David what he was thinking? Could you question authority in a way that would bring risk to yourself?

Psalm 14:

- "Fools say in their hearts, 'There is no God.' <u>Chris Haslam</u>, my first stop for quality exegesis, says that this verse doesn't indicate *atheism* for the *fools*, but those who doubt that God actually cares about human affairs and behaviors. A lot of fools today, eh?
- "There is not one who does good, no, not one." This statement is perhaps exaggerated, or, if not, at least *extreme*, unless only in the sense that we are all sinners. But it reminds me of the quote from Augustine: "If we have understood, than what we have understood is not God." Likewise, we are not good, not even one of us, because God is good. If God is good, we are only a shadow of that...
- I wonder about the context of this psalm the psalmist seems to have something very specific in mind - specific folks upon whom the psalmist wants God's 'terror' poured.

Ephesians 3:14-21:

- "rooted and grounded in love" Great imagery. Roots run deep underground, and are often invisible above the earth, except in bits. And yet, though they often look fragile, compared to the thing they give root to, they are essential for the livelihood of the plant/tree. What are your roots made of and grounded in?
- "breadth and length, and height and depth" just more great imagery.
- "surpasses knowledge" In today's age, it is hard for us to deal with things that surpass knowledge. I know personally I like to have all the answers to everything. Can we accept that God's love for us is so great that we truly can't 'get it' all?

John 6:1-21:

- This text begins a month-long series of texts from John 6 that all talk about Jesus and bread and feeding and bread of life and living water, etc., etc. The imagery is rich and meaningful and can communicate a great deal. On the flip side, I remember preaching on these texts three years ago when I was just starting at my first appointment, and wondering if I would ever get to talk about something other than bread!
- "he said this to" I always worry when the gospel writers try to explain why Jesus said something. Do they really know, or are they giving us their own guesses?
- Feeding so many, by magical multiplication or by a generous stirring of hearts of the crowds is truly a miracle, given that so many go without.
- "But what are they among so many people?" How often, like Peter, do we look at what we've got and see only "not enough" to be worthwhile? We, in our abundant society, live like we have a culture of scarcity.
- The people follow Jesus wherever he goes. Today, it seems only movie stars have such command of a crowd, and our attention. Who today are you willing to follow? Really?
- "do not be afraid." A phrase so often communicated to us by God through the scriptures. We need these words.

LECTIONARY NOTES 2

REFLECTIONS ON THEME:

This week's readings offer us a startling contrast. On the one hand, there are the familiar stories of God's provision. In the related Old Testament passage, Elijah feeds a crowd with small rations, and in the Gospel reading from John, Jesus does the same with a much larger crowd – possibly because the generosity and faith of one small boy led to greater sharing and mutual care from the entire group. Furthermore, as the disciples wrestle in the storm, their fear is removed when they know the presence of Jesus, and they are able to find their way back to land safely. In the letter to the Ephesians, Paul reminds the believers of God's provision and grace, and prays that they may learn to grasp how abundant God's love is, and that they allow this knowledge to strengthen them and open them to God's life within them. These narratives of God's grace and provision are echoed in Psalm 145 where God is praised as the trustworthy one. On the other hand, there is the story of David's lust and deception. The infamous story of his adultery with Bathsheba and the murder of her husband speaks loudly of the consequences that result when we move away from trust in God's grace and God's ways, and begin to operate from our own selfinterest. Although God had given David everything he could have desired, in his unfaithfulness and selfishness, it was not enough, and so he took things into his own hands and brought tragedy on others and (as we ill see next week) himself. The focus, then, of this the Lectionary this week, is on learning to trust in God's grace and God's ways, and learning to live out of that faith in every choice, every decision and every moment. It's a timely word, since so much suffering is caused when we operate from fear, lust, greed and self-sufficiency. Faith in God's ways and God's gracious presence may sound naive and impractical, but, when we take the risk and live as faithful followers of Christ, we discover that the principles of God's Reign really are the best way to live.

CONNECTING WITH LIFE:

GLOBAL APPLICATION: There are tremendous challenges facing our world, and there are millions of people working daily to address these challenges. However, so much of our work for justice and peace is motivated by fear, or by the sense that it all depends on us alone. And so much of our work is plaqued by the influence, or direct resistance, of interest and lobby groups. When it comes to dealing with the very real crises of our world, faith may feel like the most irrelevant thing, but without it we risk missing one of the most important resources and guiding principles at our disposal. Human wisdom and selfsufficiency drove David's destructive lust. Human wisdom inspired Philip's incredulous question about where food could be obtained to feed the crowds. But, when the values of God's Reign are brought into play, we can truly believe in a different way, which often leads to surprising solutions to our problems. When a crowd is hungry, faith means that a boy's lunch can be the catalyst that ensures that everyone is fed - most likely through the simple miracle of sharing. When the disciples face a storm alone, their fear threatens to sink them, but when they realise that Jesus is with then, they find the way to land safely. These narratives may be interpreted miraculously or not, but either way the principle remains: the miracle of God's Reign is that we begin to believe that we can feed crowds, we can navigate storms and we can discover ways to live that liberate us from the prisons of our own self-interest, lust, and self-sufficiency. The key challenge this week, then, is to risk believing in God's Reign enough that we embrace its values as the primary driving force of our lives, and as the guiding principle for addressing the crises of our times.

LOCAL APPLICATION: In every life a choice must be made in which we decide the principles that will guide us. In our relationships, our neighbourhoods, our communities, our work and play we can choose to allow our own self-interest to be primary or we can www.churchnewsireland.org

trust that following the ways of God's Reign truly do lead us to life. The challenge is that we would love to believe that following Jesus guarantees prosperity, health and safety, but this is not what this week's readings promise. Rather, we are offered a vision of God's grace and presence that calls to the grace and compassion within us. We are shown, through David's story, what can happen when we turn our backs on faithfulness, integrity and self-restraint, and we are challenged, through the Gospel story, to believe that generosity and trust really can help us to enjoy shared abundance and navigate the storms that we will inevitably face. One of the tragedies of the contemporary church is that we have failed to live the faith we proclaim. Where have spoken about forgiveness and grace, we have been vindictive and condemning. Where we have spoken about trust and generosity, we have been fearful and cowardly. If the world is to believe our message, we are going to have to manifest it in our lives and communities, and when we do, we may well discover that we contribute to wholeness and peace in our world.

SERMON OUTLINE

Prop12B Jn 6:1-21 the other side of the Sea of Galilee

One of the most memorable miracles of Jesus...

1. The Crowd 1-5: ²A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick – kept growing > 5000 men (v10) - & Matthew adds (14.21) beside women & children = 10-15000 people?

2.The Crisis 6-13: As he sat on the hillside he *saw a large crowd coming towards him* swollen by Passover pilgrims...

a) the fear – a multitude of starving people, so Jesus said to Philip, 'Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?'⁷Philip (from Bethsaida & with local knowledge) answered him, 'Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little.'
b) the food - Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, ⁹'There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?'- useless!! But not to Jesus with his amazing divine power...

3. The Christ 14-21: his Messiahship is demonstrated to a) the Crowd:- ¹¹Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. ¹⁴When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, 'This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world.' Not only were they fed – they were filled!!

b) to the Disciples:- His power is further displayed to the disciples who had begun to row across the Sea alone.. However ¹⁸The lake became rough because a strong wind was blowing. They were frightened when they saw Jesus walking on the lake and coming near the boat... and they were terrified. Jesus however reassures them:- 'It is I; do not be afraid.' So too does he reassure us today....
