Following on from last week, the Lectionary continues to call us to faith. This week the challenge is to recognise that faith in God's grace and abundance must lead us to action – to generosity and sharing of what we have received, be it gifts or resources. Essentially we cannot claim to be people of faith unless we live what we believe and proclaim in ways that touch the lives of others with grace and goodness.

May we grow a little more like our generous, compassionate God as we worship this week.

## 2 Samuel 11: 26-12:13a

Last Sunday we read of David's sin of adultery and murder. Now we hear the rebuke of the prophet Nathan. It introduces us to the family troubles which persisted through the rest of David's life.

## or Exodus 16: 2-4, 9-15

In their desert pilgrimage, the people of Israel missed what comforts there had ben in Egypt. Yet they were miraculously fed. Today's gospel will remind us that it was read from heaven which the Lord gave them.

#### Psalm 51: 1-13

David's repentance psalm in which he acknowledges his guilt over his affair with Bathsheba and pleads with God to forgive and restore him.

## or **Psalm 78: 23-29**

A song remembering how God gave manna to the people in the wilderness and sent birds to provide meat for them to eat.

## **Ephesians 4 : 1-16**

This letter is all about the nature of the church as Christ's body. This section calls us to our essential unity, despite our different gifts and personalities. We are to grow into a mature faith, bound together by truth and love.

## John 6: 24-35

Jesus made a small amount of bread enough for several thousand people - and they want more of the same. He teaches them the deeper meaning of the sign of the bread he gives: that he is himself the satisfaction of all our deepest needs.

## **LECTIONARY NOTES** 1

#### **REFLECTIONS ON THEME:**

There are two ideas that collide in this week's Lectionary readings. Firstly we are called to meditate on and give thanks for God's generous grace that sustains and unites us. In the wilderness, the Israelites are fed meat and manna, which is remembered in the song of Psalm 78. In the Gospel, the people remember this miracle and ask Jesus what he will do to show them that they should believe in him. His response is to offer himself as the Bread of Life that brings true sustenance. In the epistle, this same sustaining grace welcomes us into the united community of God, and gives us each gifts that we are to use to build our community up. The second idea that the Lectionary offers us flows out of the semicontinuous Old Testament reading, and reveals what happens when we ignore God's generosity and grace, and start to live according to our worst, most selfish and lustful natures. David, to whom God had given the most abundant of blessings in every way, used his power to seduce a poor man's wife and then put the man to death. God does not stay silent in the face of this, but sends the prophet to challenge and confront David. Fortunately David is able to repent, as Psalm 51 reveals, but even this does not stop the consequences of his actions – the internal conflict within his family that ultimately destroyed the unity of God's people and split the kingdom in two.

The message is simple, but also very challenging. God's grace is sufficient, and God does seek to sustain and provide for us. But, we have a part to play. As we commit to the unity of the community of faith so we each contribute our share from the gracious gifts God has given us – be it time, talents or treasures. When we do this, we all enjoy abundance and unity and the tremendous life and nourishment that flows as a result. However, when we refuse to do this and make our own personal needs and desires paramount, our unity breaks down, and we all end up hurting and in need. This is not a magical, "reward and punishment" view of faith or of the world. It is the simple reality that the Bread of Life has given us enough for all in the world, as long as we share what we have. When we hoard and take more than we need, we create lack and hunger, and our relationships inevitably break down.

# CONNECTING WITH LIFE: Global Application:

The tremendous conflicts and struggles that we experience in our world can all be reduced to one basic reality. Some people have more than they need and hoard it, and others have too little and are willing to fight to get more. Whether it's issues of power, in which some are disempowered while others cling to control as corporate, political or organisational dictators; or issues of economics in which some fight daily just to survive while others spend small fortunes on their whims; or issues of disease in which some struggle to get the medical care and medicine that they need because of their station in life, while others use their knowledge and opportunities to get wealthy through medical patents and careful distribution of necessary drugs; every justice issue, every war and every violent protest arises because of the inequality, disunity and lack of generosity in our world. God has supplied the manna we need to feed, house and care for everyone in our world. The Bread of Life has shown us the way to life, by believing in his sacrificial, generous way of simplicity. Yet, like David, we continue to grab what we can, even when it hurts others, and we continue to place our own needs and desires over those of others. We continue to sacrifice the unity of our communities on the altar of our own lust and greed - and the world continues to suffer. If we are to make any difference to the harsh realities of our times, we must embrace the generous grace of God – not just for us, but as a force that flows through us to others. Only as we begin to value unity, simplicity and sharing our contributions with one another can we hope to find peace, freedom and an end to poverty, disease and war.

## **Local Application:**

The unfortunate temptation of our time is the call to fill our lives with ever more "stuff." We are constantly bombarded with images of things we don't have – be it sexual partners, food, objects, or lifestyles – and we are constantly encouraged to forget about others as we go after these "bright, shiny objects" of our desire. We are constantly being told that we will only find fulfilment when we own enough, eat enough, experience enough, or know enough. However, in the process, our relationships and communities die, and our hearts grow increasingly empty. We all discover that we resonate with David's song as we recognise that, when our lusts and greeds are allowed free reign, we bring disaster on ourselves and others. But, we also all know that there is another way – the way of the Bread of Life who gave himself to feed us, and who calls us to believe in him and his way. As we embrace the way of faith in God's Reign, we find the freedom that comes from simplicity, the unity that comes from collaboration, and the abundance that comes from simplicity and generosity. But, beneath it all lies the crucial question: do we believe in the way of the Kingdom enough, do we trust in Jesus as the Bread of Life enough, that we will

risk living according to his way, and commit ourselves to seek the unity that can only come when we share whatever gifts we have with others.

#### LECTIONARY NOTES 2

#### 2 Samuel 11:26-12:13a:

- Today is part two of the story of David's act of adultery/deceit/murder/etc.
- I wonder how much room to disagree Bathsheba had in this whole affair. Could she
  refuse the king? Did she know of his plotting to kill her husband, or think it was a
  strange coincidence? Did she want to marry David? As usual, unfortunately in the
  scriptures, we hear less from the women than I at least would like.
- "You are the man!" Nathan helps David to see, by showing him the sin in another.
   We are so much better at seeing the sins of others, aren't we? But as Jesus would later teach, we first have to check for planks in our own eyes...
- :12 David's 'private' sin is shown by God to be a public thing. Is individual sin only
  public for leaders, like David, or like Bill Clinton? Or is part of being in a community
  of faith realizing that all of our sin is in part a public act?

#### Psalm 51:1-12:

- Ah, a favourite psalm. A confession. This psalm is one I'm mostly likely to use if I'm feeling the need to come before God in a confessional mode. Do you have a confessional prayer in church every week? We do not, and I think as Protestants, we sometimes get nervous about confession, even corporate. But even if we don't share sins with a priest, confession is a necessary part of our relationship any healthy relationship, really.
- Where I disagree with the psalmist, (thought to be David writing after the sin with Bathsheba) is in his claim: "against you, you alone, have I sinned." Rarely do our sins only affect God - that's the worst about them - our sin hurts others. David's sin, for instance, resulted in a man's death, and a child's death, according to scriptures.
- This psalm usually shows up during the penitent Lenten season. Today it shows up in connection with the Old Testament lesson. How does reading this psalm in a different season change your understanding of it?

## Ephesians 4:1-16:

- "live a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called" Paul follows with a
  list of high standards for us to live by. When we respond to a call from God to
  ministry, ordained or otherwise, to mission, to whatever, that call comes with
  responsibility too.
- one, one. Notice a theme? Repetition. Paul wants us to get the message. ONE. In a church that is so divided over ritual, liturgy, theology, social issues, politics, etc., how do we live as the ONE body of Christ?
- gifts one of many great passages on the unique and varied nature of God's gifts to us. Great Sunday to talk about gifts, encourage use of gifts, or discovery of gifts.
- "no longer be children, tossed to and fro and blown about by every wind of doctrine." We may feel like this is a concern today, but it is a concern as old as the church! We have such short attention spans, always following the next new fad, even in faith matters. Paul says that's simply immature.

#### John 6:24-35:

- This text continues with week two of a month-long series of texts from John 6 that all talk about Jesus and bread and feeding and bread of life and living water, etc., etc. The imagery is rich and meaningful and can communicate a great deal. On the flip side, I remember preaching on these texts three years ago when I was just starting at my first appointment, and wondering if I would ever get to talk about something other than bread!
- "but because you ate your fill of the loaves" you can take Jesus' statement two ways. le the people are coming just because they got a free meal, and are hoping for more. *Or,* in eating the bread, the people realized Jesus could fill them in deeper ways too. Perhaps a bit of both, but probably more of the former. Jesus hopes to teach them of the latter.
- "This is the work of God, that you believe" The people were expecting something a
  bit more. They wanted signs. Jesus tells them essentially that they have all the
  signs they need they are the signs this time. God in them is the sign.
- Jesus deflecting from his person to his source Jesus always turns credit away from him or other individuals to what he names as his source: His father.
- "I am" A theme in John, Jesus' "I am" statements. Here, Jesus is telling the people
   I've already given you what you are asking for. Now, live like it!

#### **SERMON OUTLINE**

# Jn 6:24-35 looking for Jesus

The discussion recorded here takes place on the day following the miracle of the loaves and fishes as the crowd *got into the boats and went to Capernaum looking for Jesus. (24)* 

- 1. The Miracle 24-27 performed by Jesus leads to Jesus questioning their motives in seeking him out was it because of a) miraculous sign feeding of 5000 with 5 loaves & 2 fish
- b) material satisfaction you are looking for me, (26) not because you saw signs, but because you ate your fill of the loaves. Jesus urges them to seek true & lasting spiritual satisfaction:- <sup>27</sup>Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. This raises the query- What must we do to perform the works of God? & the simple reply 'This is the work of God, (29) that you believe in him whom he has sent.'
- 2. The Manna 30-33: supplied in the wilderness.. The Jews again question the credentials of Jesus: 'What sign are you going to give us then, so that we may see it and believe you? What work are you performing? <sup>31</sup>Our ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness; as it is written, "He gave them bread from heaven to eat." The food that God supplied via Moses was localised & perishable, but Jesus has something better to offer the true bread from heaven <sup>33</sup>For the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world.'
- 3. The Messiah 34-35: Taking Jesus literally and thinking only of their stomachs, <sup>34</sup>They said to him, 'Sir, give us this bread always.' However Jesus directs their thoughts from the material to the spiritual and offers eternal satisfaction and spiritual salvation 35 Jesus

said to them, 'I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty – too good an offer to refuse!
